OYSTERMEN IN THE OCEAN

TWENTY-SEVEN DROWNED OFF THE VIRGINIA COAST.

The Spanish-American Treaty-Grover

BANTIMORE, Dec. 12 -Officers of the steamer M. L. Weems, which arrived from Rappahannock river, Va., report fearful loss of life among colored oystermen in that river in the storm of Tuesday last. About twenty five colored men were out in boats tonging for oysters. The gale capsized almost all of them. The men were thrown into rough water and were unable to swim to shore. Many clung to boats for a time, but were finally washed away and drowned. Very few escaped. Eleven bodies have been recovered already, and as many more are said to be missing.

LATER—Additional particulars state fitteen cances started to go to the schooner to sell their oysters when the storm struck them. There were three or four white men among the party. 
