Canadian finance min-ister in London, will bring to light some start-ling revelations as to the manner in which a considerable number of the bonds represent-ing the debt have been placed upon the mar-ket by dishonest employee. It is believed this amount will exceed haif a million. Last year a bond of the 1860 issue for £1000 was negotiated in London, England, after having been stolen from the government vauits by a trusted official, since dead, who forged the signature of the government representative authorized to signif. It has now been discov-ered that a number of these bonds have dis-appeared from the government vauits, and there is little doubt that they are in circula-tion, and will come in for redemption within a few months. bers of the British Afghan frontier commision, with their military escert, have suddenly struck their tents and are marching rapidly toward Herat. REPULSED BY THE POLICE. Terrific Encounter With Strikers at

Cleveland. CLEVELAND, O., July 15 .- The antici,

pated collision between strikers and police occurred this afternoon at 4 o'clock. The meeting was held in Newburgh, and agely thrown out. After the meeting 700 irren, mostly Poles and Bohemians, formed into line and marched to the plate mill, into line and marched to the plate mill, which was in operation. The men in the plate mills were opposed to stopping work but were forced out finally by the foreigners and remained idle until yester-day, when the mill resumed operations. The mob increased in numbers as it pro-gressed, and when it arrived at the mill it appresented at least 1000 men. The

aggregated at least 1000 men. The strikers were armed with clubs studded strikers were armed with clubs studied with nails, pieces of iron and large stones. The fifty policemen on duty were supplied with maces twenty two inches long and self acting revolvers. Thirty-four rs replied that they were determined so the mill. 




