

Engineer Ordered to Report on a New Scheme for Its Reclamation—The Devil's Strip to be Widened. At the Board of Works meeting yesterday afternoon a letter was read from Mr. Robert

At the Board of Works meeting yesterday afternoon a letter was read from Mr. Robert Grant, who had been awarded three contracts for paving, stating that in the tender for the Queen-street job, from Bathurst to Gladstone-avenue — a clerical error had made the amount \$21,235 instead of \$25,235. He also stated he had not expected more than one contract and would be unable to fulfil the whole three. On Ald. Lamb's suggestion Mr. Grant's deposit of \$53! was forfeited and the city will advertise for new tenders providing he still refuses to go on with the works.

Ald. Lamb moved a resolution that the Engineer be instructed to prepare plans with estimates of cost to carry out the following scheme re Ashbridge's Bay: A canal 300 feet wide through Ashbridge's Bay: A canal 300 feet wide through Ashbridge's Bay; the ends to be cribbed and sheet piled; the main canal to be earthwork with rip-rap stone protection; an allowance of 120 feet on either side for rondway and rail-way purposes; the streets on the north side to be continued to the roadway and the sewers to the canal; the cost of the work on the north side to be assessed as a local improvement, 5 per cent. to be charged on the property abutting on the canal, 50 per cent. to be assessed on the portion of Ward No. 1 as may be decided on; the south side to be filled in or reclaimed, wharves and docks to be constructed as required and the rentals to be applied to the cost of the improvements. The proposition was passed and referred to the engineer, in spite of Ald. Small's opposition against the taxation of Ward No. 1.

Ald. Lamb moved a resolution declaring that in the opinion of the city to pay any more for the new high level bridge over the Don than the cost of an ordinary low level bridge. Ald. Atkinson said this would be about one-third, while, in his opinion, the city ought to pay only 10 per cent. Ald. Burns said the city had been forced to pay in full for the Royceavenue crossing because the railway was there first. Applying the same argument, the railways ought

One clause which will affect the city at large was that recommending that the devil's strip on the railway track allowance be widened in the central portion of the city to 3 feet 6 inches and in the outlying districts to 4 feet. It is understood that at this width the tracks will only occupy the prescribed 16 feet track allowance.

Ald. Lamb moved that the width be made four feet all over the city, and Ald. Balloy wanted it three feet six inches, but the Engineer's recommendation was passed.

Copp. chairman of the Committee on Distribution of the Scriptures, reported that during the mouth of May over 500 New Testa. on Distribution of the Scriptures, reported that during the month of May over 500 New Testaments had been issued at half-price to the proprietors of the leading hotels of this city, to be pixode in the bedrooms for the use of the guests, also that Biblee had been placed in the cabins of several of the large passenger steamboats plying to and from the harbor, and that 25 large-print Testaments had been issued for railway caboose cars for the use of train hands.






