A DEMOCRATIC WATERLOO.

WILLIAM MCKINLEY RE-ELECTED GOVERNOR OF OHIO.

Republican Gains All Along the Line in Yesterday's Elections—Massachusetts, New York, Ohio and New Jersey, and Probably Iowa, go Against the Democrats.

Elections in thirteen states took place yesterday. In New York the principal issue centered in the candidature of Isaac H. Maynard, the Democratic nominee for the Court of Appeals.

In Ohio the Hon. William McKinley is a candidate for governor and carried the state by a majority exceeding 30,000.

In Massachusetts the battle ranged between Russell, Dem., and Greenough, Rep., and was fought on Federal lands. The state was considered a hide-bound Republic, but for the last three years elected a Democratic Governor; yesterday it returned to its old-time principles and elected Greenough by a plurality of more than 25,000.

Hon. James Abolmetye Bradley, a candidate for the State Senate, made an original campaign against race track gambling in New Jersey and the colored vote decided the day. Late disaffection among the colored vote has probably gone Republican and Bradley is elected.

The Same Story From Several States. BUFFALO, Nov. 7, 12.15.—At this hour it is merely a question of majorities. Massachusetts, New York, Ohio and New Jersey have gone over to the Republican column.

Ohio returns are too meagre to state safely any result, but it is surely Republican. The Southern States have not drifted from their old-time bearings and Virginia reports Democratic gains.

Pennsylvania shows Republican gains. Throughout the West disaffection against Overton Democracy in the North and West.

Governor Flower on the Result. ALBANY, Nov. 7.—To-night when asked for his opinion as to the result of yesterday's election, Governor Flower said: "The Republicans seem to have elected their State ticket. The Legislature is in the hands of the Republicans. There is no doubt a majority in the constitutional convention. The result has been general throughout the country and can be attributed only to the business depression and the thousands of men out of work."

25,000 Republican Plurality. BROOKLYN, Nov. 7, 9.40 p. m.—The returns so far received show that the New York Greenback has been elected governor by more than 25,000 plurality.

In South Dakota. YANKTON, N.D., Nov. 7.—The Republican candidates for judicial positions have been elected by the usual majority. The vote has been about one-half of that polled at the last general election of about 40,000.

NORTH BAY, Ont., Nov. 7.—The steamer Fraser, owned by Davidson & Hay of Toronto, took fire on Lake Nipissing at Goose Island, 24 miles from here, about 11 o'clock this morning.

The steamer was destined for Franks Bay and carried a crew of 22 men. Of this number only 7 escaped death. The remaining 15, including Captain Douglas, were driven into the water by the flames and all were drowned.
