Both friends and foes of prohibition will find in the two reports of the royal temperance commission, presented to parliament last week, much that will help to confirm and strengthen their convictions. The minority report prepared by Rev. Dr. McLeod is just what the zealous prohibitionists wanted. It declares in substance that immediate prohibition is the only effective remedy for the evils of intemperance, and that parliament should enact and thoroughly enforce such a law without further delay. Dr. McLeod declares that all the information which the commission has been able to obtain has made it clear to him that the effects of the liquor traffic are a hindrance to the moral, social, and material interest of the nation, and that the measures adopted to repress or lessen the traffic have been entirely ineffectual. He also declares that the people of the various sections of the dominion have given expression to their opinions at the ballot-box, making it clear that a majority of them are in favor of the total prohibition of the liquor traffic. His report is quite lengthy, covering five hundred typewritten pages.

All the other members of the commission, however, appear to have arrived at an entirely different conclusion. Their report is an elaborate argument against prohibition and in favor of a system of license and regulation which they say has been the rule of all civilized nations for centuries. The report declares that the evils of intemperance are not the result of the liquor traffic, but of the excessive use of alcohol. It also declares that the measures adopted to repress or lessen the traffic have been entirely ineffectual. On Tuesday last, at Bear River, before Justice D. J. Miller, James Lewis and R. A. Kempton, of Matilda, were tried for, that on or about the 6th March last, in company, did hunt, chase and kill one bull moose in Dibley county, they having the two hind horns and their possession of the same from where the moose was killed and dressed, when met and questioned by the rangers doing forest police duty for the game society at the time. The service on the accused being proved by the evidence, and after examining the witnesses, the parties were fined in all \$150 and costs. Lewis paid his fine, Kempton is said to have gone to Boston since the service. The society's secretary, D. H. Taylor, brought in the moose horns and the moose was taken by all good citizens and farmers to disprove their neighbors from going hunting in close season, as the date shows this is a case of nearly two months after the season closed.

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It is extremely doubtful if the action of the Council at its late meeting in taking \$1,000 of the money received from the Western Counties Railway damages and using it as ordinary revenue, or for road money, would have the approval of a majority of the electors of the county. The amount received from that source was a wind-fall, a special sum received under extraordinary and special circumstances, and we think it would have been much more satisfactory, not only to those who were instrumental in getting this money for the county, but to the ratepayers generally, to have seen some of it something of a more permanent nature. Besides, as we stated some time ago, while the provincial government pursues the policy of paying large sums of money for our roads and bridges, it certainly does not seem just to the part of our constituents to use the county's little nest-egg as an ordinary revenue. There is no reason to suppose that the last provincial loan still remaining to the credit of the county. The bridge money is all used up, but a part of the road money allotted to this county in the last borrowing bill is yet unexpended. If the county were really in need of an extra thousand dollars of road money, it would seem to have been better to have used some of the provincial road money to the credit of the county. That money is drawn from the railway damages was. It would only have been necessary to prove to our two local representatives that the expenditure was urgently needed to have had it expended. We will not be uncharitable enough to suppose that in deciding to expend this extra thousand dollars on our roads, during this season, our councillors were influenced by the fact that a municipal election is to take place in a few months, and that this sum would give each councillor a few more road commissions to distribute. We have always believed that our present councillors were moved by higher and more disinterested motives. Still, we think they have made a mistake in this instance, whatever were the motives which led to it.

What a truly wonderful transformation Japan has undergone within the last half century! The conditions under which she has brought the war with China to a close leave her the leader of Asia and the equal of most of the great European nations. There is now a new power in the world with which Europe has to reckon in shaping its Asiatic policy. Never before in the world's history has such a power come to the front so suddenly. Fifty years ago Japan was comparatively unknown to the outside world. She was then a civilized as well as a peaceful island against all other nations and peoples as the Chinese are to-day. The Mikado, who was regarded as little less than a god, was the sole and absolute ruler. Indeed, it was not until within the last year or two that other nations would allow her to regulate her own affairs, or execute her own laws, where foreigners were concerned. Today she has a free parliament and other representative institutions equal to those of the most advanced nations of Europe, while she now appears to be little if any behind those in all that goes to make up a civilized and enlightened and a progressive nation. Having conquered and humiliated China, she now proposes to reconstruct central Asia, and then open that vast continent to the civilization and progress which Japan has herself experienced. In becoming the leader of Asia she provokes the jealousy of Russia, which is protesting energetically against the terms of the late treaty of peace. The whole world is now waiting to see what France will do about it, and to see how she is to establish this new power in the east will be held on by the hands of Russia.

Mr. Mills, M. P., of Annapolis, will introduce this session his bill to disfranchise for Dominion purposes all provincial office-holders in any province discriminating in any way against federal public servants.

Agricultural.

A Model Poultry House. A fowl house is a necessity, for the successful poultry raiser never depends upon trees, bushes, fences, or what not as roosting places for the fowls.

The fowl house should be divided into apartments, one for sleeping, one for eating and day use, and a third for nesting places. Roosting perches should be very nearly two inches wide, and smoothly finished.

The floor of the fowl house should be cemented. Cemented floors are easily kept clean, and are besides drier, and they keep the poultry from thieving vermin, and keep the glass intact.

The wooden shutters will be found a great protection in stormy weather, and the doors should be weathered and interlined just like the roof and sides of the building.
