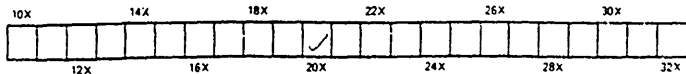

COUNTRY PRODUCE. Butter—There is a heavy demand for all the choice dairy offerings, the receipts are not large and the market is firm at 15c to 16c for top and large rolls, with perhaps 10c more for extra choice small lots. Medium butter steady at 11c to 12c. Eggs—Are in fair demand for fresh laid, which sell at 15c to 16c. Hild fresh are accumulating, and sell slowly at 15c. Potatoes—Are steady and unchanged. Onions on the track here are quoted at 55c. Onions out of store sell at 65c. Poultry—The supply is large; the demand is slow, and the market is easier at 25 to 35c for chickens, 40c to 60c for ducks and 50c to 60c for geese and 80c for turkeys. Veal is—The supply is fair; the demand is good, and the market is steady at 70c to 80c for calves and 11c for hunchers. Stated Hay—Quiet; oats on the track here are quoted at \$3.75 to \$3.85. Baled Straw—Dull at \$5 for oats on the track here.

FARMERS' MARKET. The receipts of grain on the street market today were small; prices were generally steady. Oats are higher. Wheat—Steady; 400 bushels selling at 84 for white, and 77 for red. Barley—Firm; 500 bushel selling at 29c. Hay—None offered; nominal at 15c. Oats—A cent dearer; 300 bushels selling at 27c at 28c. Peas—A cent higher; one load selling at 17c. Hay and Straw—Steady; 25 loads of hay sold at \$9 to \$9.75; straw nominal at \$9 to \$9.50. Hogs—None offered; nominal at \$3.75.

Wheat—Wheat was weaker to day, owing to private cables being easier and exporters were only bidding 80c for winter middle freight, and 81c for winter best, but sellers were asking more money. Manitoba wheat was higher at \$1.04 for No. 1 hard grinding in transit, and 80c to 90c for Guderich and M. hard. Corn—Is rather slow, but about steady; one of straight white in wood are quoted at \$2.90 to \$3. Millfeed—Steady at \$11 for shorts, and 90c for best. Beans—Quiet at 27c for No. 3 extra, 26c for No. 2, and 24c for No. 1 outside. Book wheat—Steady at 80c to 80c, cent. Rice—Steady, with sales at 44c middle freight and 45c north and west. Corn—Steady at 24c to 27c for old Canada yellow. Oats—Are in demand for export and firm, and white sold at \$2.25 north and west to-day. Peas—Steady, with exporters bidding 45c middle freight and 45c north and west.

On the following day after my arrival in company with my respected and obliging host, Mr Patrick Gallagher, I climbed to the highest point of the nearby hill top, and was rewarded by a view that delighted the eye and the senses.

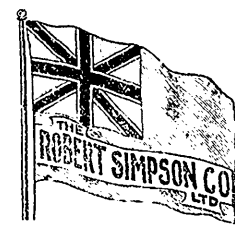
Then Mr. Gallagher is president of the cheese factory interests, an industry which is large and profitable now with promise of great expansion in the future.
