PARISH NOTES.

During December special sermons were preached in this church on the following subjects: On Death, by the Rev. J. M. Davenport; on Judgment, by the Rev. Prot. Clark; on Hell, by the Rev. Canon Welch; on Heaven, by the Rev. C B. Kenrick. On the morning of Sunday, Dec. 7th, the Rev. Prof. Cody preached an eloquent and enthusiastic sermon on the new Canadian Church Missionary Society.

Several times during the present season the church has had to be closed excepting on Sunday, as the scarcity of coal is very serious, to say nothing of its dearness. Meetings have been held as usual, as the class-rooms can be heated by stoves.

At the children's service on Holy Innocents' Day, the offertory of \$7.50 was sent to the Sick Children's Hospital.

The Christmas decorations this year were prepared by members of the Sanctuary Guild, St. Agatha's Guild, and Mothers' Meeting. were of a very delicate and feathery description, and the dark green of the fir-tree set off the beauty of scarlet geranium and pointzettia. The clergy wore their new surplices and stoles for the first time, and new incandescent lights shed a purer light upon the scene. Christmas Day was ideal in point of weather, and a powdering of snow beautified all the landscape. Good congregations attended the services, and the music was bright and not too hard for the simple amateur. The poor also were well looked after; every family we came across seemed to be provided with the proverbial turkey and plumpudding.

There was a Watch-Night Service held here on New Year's Eve, and with solemn prayers and thanksgivings the old year was left behind and the new year welcomed.

A confirmation will be held in this church before Easter, and all desirous of being prepared should at once send their names in to the clergy.

The Churchwardens are embarrassed by non-payment of pew rents still in arrear. They would be greatly obliged if the current accounts were paid at an early date, as the expenses this season are unusually heavy.

The Finance Committee will meet on Monday, 12th inst., to consider the financial condition of the church.

On Christmas Eve, after church, a presentation was made to Mr. Hare by Mrs. Christopher Robinson, on behalf of the Guild. All the members assembled in the clergy vestry and listened, while their President in fitting words presented the surplice and white stole on which they had been engaged for so many months.
