In New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland, the Eclipse will end near the setting of the sun.

IV. Sun.—A Total Eclipse. This phenomenon will be visible to all the Australian Provinces of the Empire, excepting Western Australia, and in the South eastern Pacific and Southern Oceans, and amid the silence, darkness, and ice of the Antarctic Pole, ending at sunset on the coast of Chili.

Venus (♀). The year commences with this Planet as an Evening Star, but from the middle of July to the end of the year will be a Morning Star.

Mars (♂) will be a Morning Star in the earlier part of the year: from about 1st March to 1st July he will shine as an Evening Star; but a Morning Star till the year's end.

Jupiter (♃) enters our year as a Morning Star, which he continues to be till 24th May, from which time he appears as an Evening Star until about 7th December, thence a Morning Star.

Sable Island.— $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from east end. Latitude $43^{\circ}d. 48'm. 40's. N.$; longitude $56^{\circ}d. 4'm. 0s. W.$ Octagonal, white and brown alternately. In thick and foggy weather and snow storms, a steam fog whistle 50 yards south of the Light house is sounded three times in each minute, as follows:—First, a blast of three seconds; then another blast and interval of the same duration; and then a blast of three seconds, with an interval of forty-five seconds, to complete the minute. The whistle will probably be heard, in calm weather or with the wind, from 10 to 15 miles; in stormy weather or against the wind, from 3 to 6 miles.

Sable Island (West end).—Lat. $43^{\circ}d. 57'm. 1's. N.$; long. $6^{\circ}d. 50'm. 0s. W.$ Revolves in three minutes, showing three flashes at intervals of half a minute, then a cessation of light during $1\frac{1}{2}$ minute in each revolution. Wood, octagonal, white. In thick or foggy weather and snow storms, a steam fog whistle is sounded eight seconds in each minute, leaving an interval of 52 seconds between each blast. The whistle will probably be heard in calm weather or with the wind from 10 to 15 miles, and in stormy weather or against the wind from 3 to 6 miles.

Yarmouth Harbour.—On end of reef off southwest point of Bunker's Island, east side of entrance to harbour. Lat. $43^{\circ}d. 4'm. 30s. N.$; lat. $6^{\circ}d. 8'm. 4's. W.$; with the lantern on a dwelling-house, built on a wooden pier, the whole forming a beacon. A red light, for the purpose of guiding vessels into the harbour. Visible from the southward between the bearings of N. E. by N. and N. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. It can also be seen over Stanwood's Beach, when bearing from S. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. to S. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., but cannot be run for on these bearings, the only entrance to the harbour being through Yarmouth Sound and round Cape East.

Cape Forchu Light.—On Cape Forchu, on the Western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova Scotia), in lat. $43^{\circ}39', N.$ long. $66^{\circ}8', W.$ It exhibits a plain, revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 235 feet above the level of the sea.

Brier Island.—Situate on the western side. A fixed white light, 92 feet above sea level, visible 15 miles. Octagonal white building. A Steam Fog Whistle on Whipple's Point, S. W. of light.

Westport.—On Peter's Island at the S. entrance of the E. side of the Bay of Fundy. Two white fixed lights, placed horizontally, to distinguish it from Brier Island Light, 40 feet above high water mark, visible ten miles, and is intended to lead vessels into Westport, or through Grand Passage. Square white building.

Boar's Head.—N. entrance Petite Passage, Bay of Fundy. Alternate flashes, red and white, at intervals of 6 seconds. Square white building.

Digby Gut.—On Point Prim, at the entrance of the Gut. A fixed white light, 76 feet above high water, and visible 13 miles. Building square—painted red and white vertically. A Steam Fog Whistle on Point Prim, in thick or foggy weather, sounds 8 seconds in each minute, making an interval of 52 seconds between each blast.

Port Williams.—Two fixed white lights, 10 feet apart, perpendicularly, visible from all points of approach. Square white building. Port Williams is distant from Digby Gut Light E. 2 miles; and from Black Rock W. 28 miles.

Margaretville.—A red fixed light, visible 10 miles from all points of approach. Building square, painted in white and black horizontal stripes. Margaretville is distant E. 37 miles from Digby Gut Light, and W. 15 miles from Black Rock Light.

Black Rock.—A white fixed light, 55 feet above the level of high water, and visible 12 miles. Square white building.

at this point, on the northern shore of Cobequid Bay, near the head of Minas Basin.

Apple River Light.—On Hetty Point, N. side entrance to the River, and three leagues to the eastward of Cape Chignecto. Two fixed horizontal lights, 40 feet above high water, visible 10 miles. Square white building.

Parrsboro.—On the W. side of the entrance to Parrsboro' River—a fixed white light, 30 feet above high water, visible 9 miles. Octagonal white tower, standing close to high water mark on the beach.

Horton Bluff.—A white fixed light, 95 feet above high water level (rise and fall 4) to 47 ft.), visible in clear weather over the greater part of the Basin of Minas (after passing Cape Blomedon) and above the Five Islands and up to Windsor River, until intercepted by the continuation of the Bluff to the southward of it. Square white building, standing 66 feet from the Bluff.

Burnt Coat Head.—The lantern is erected on a square tower attached to the main building. A white fixed light, 75 feet above high water level, and visible from all points of approach.

Gannet Rock Light.—This light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands, off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a light of the Fourth order, Heliophotal system—fixed white light 45 seconds, eclipse $5\frac{1}{2}$, flash $5\frac{1}{2}$, eclipse $5\frac{1}{2}$. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white. A gun is fired to answer signals during a fog. Dangerous rocks extend four miles eastward of the Lighthouse.

Bearings and Distance by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House.
This Light bears from the Light House on Brier Island, N. N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W, 22 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor, E. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., distance 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E., 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W., $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N., $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To the Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, W. S. W. 2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W. and by N., $\frac{1}{2}$ N., 12 miles.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker, called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., $18\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable Seal Islands S. and by W., $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed white lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, one elevated about forty-five feet above high water; the other a new tower, erected last season, fitted with a 3d Dioptric light, stands 69 feet above high water level, and visible from all points of approach for a distance of 25 miles in clear weather; and bear

W., distant about 170 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast (British or American.) Both the buildings are painted white. A fog whistle has been erected on the island, which will be sounded as follows each minute:—Two blasts of five seconds in each minute, with an interval of 25 seconds between each blast. The following are the bearings from them, viz.:

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge (St. Mary's) E. S. E., easterly.

“ Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S., 13 miles.

“ Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

“ Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.

“ N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.

“ Little River Head, N. by W.

“ Libby Island Light House (American), N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the Lights.

[It is recommended that the Ships' Compasses should be well compared and adjusted particularly in new ships, before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westery, (or $1\frac{1}{2}$ points), it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay, South Channel, between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledge, is S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S.; but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order, after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light (American), on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campobello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed *white* light. The building is painted white, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preaux Lights.—Upon this projecting head land, two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet. Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, they where may be useful—both are fixed, and *white*. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

A Steam Fog Alarm has been placed in this Station, which will sound twice in each minute.

South-West Wolf Island.—On south-east point of south-west island. Lat. 44d. 56m. 30s. N.; long. 66d. 41m. 10s. W. $1\frac{1}{2}$ min. between each flash. Can be seen in clear weather 17 to 20 miles. Lantern surmounts keeper's dwelling, which is a square wooden structure, painted white. Visible from all points of approach.

White Head, Bliss Harbour.—West of Bliss Island. Lat 45d. 1m. 15s.; long. 66d. 51m. 0s. Can be seen 12 miles in clear weather. Square, wood, white. Red fixed light.

Campobello Island.—North point of Head Harbor. Lat. 44d. 57m. 49s. N.; long. 66d. 54m. 10s. W. Can be seen 15 miles in clear weather. Octagon, white, with red cross. Variation in 1869 $18\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ W.

Port St. Andrews.—North point of entrance. Lat. 45d. 4m. 10s. N.; long. 67d. 2m. 50s. W. Can be seen 10 miles in clear weather. Octagonal, white. Visible between the bearings of S. W. round S. to N. W. Variation in 1869 17½° W.

Partridge Island Light.—This Light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed *white* light and that the Light House and Keeper's Dwelling are painted red and white, in vertical stripes. The Steam Whistle on this Island is sounded ten seconds in every minute during foggy or thick weather.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Ear, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a Fourth Order Dioptric Light, visible ten miles, is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed *white* light. The house is white and black, in stripes vertically.

Quaco.—A revolving *white* light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red, in horizontal stripes.

Revolving Light, Cape Spencer, Bay of Fundy.—Lat. 45 deg. 12m. 30s. N.; Long. 65 deg. 54m. 0s. W. A revolving Red and White Light, elevated 207 feet above high water, shewing Red for 45 seconds, and White for 45 seconds, with an interval of 45 seconds between each appearance of the Light, and making a complete revolution in three minutes. In clear weather the Light should be seen at a distance of 20 miles. The Lighthouse is a square, white building, with a Tower erected on it, and is 27 feet in height from base to the centre of the Light, and 35 feet from base to the top of the lantern. The illuminating apparatus is Catoptric. The Light will be visible between the bearings from E. S. E., round by South to W. N. W.—The Light will serve as a guide for vessels entering Saint John Harbour, Partridge Island Light bearing by Compass N. W. by W. half W. Northerly, the distance being 8 miles from Light to Light.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the Point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain *white* light. The house is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark. Light visible 13 miles. The Steam Whistle is 150 feet north-east of the Light House, and is sounded during thick weather, fog and snow storms, for eight seconds in each minute, with an interval of fifty-two seconds between each blast. The Whistle is heard in calm weather or with the wind at a distance of ten miles, and in stormy weather or against the wind from three to five miles, according to the state of the atmosphere.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the St. Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Grindstone Island Light.—An Octagonal Tower, 60 feet above the level of high water on Grindstone Island, in Chignecto Bay, in lat. 45° 43' 13" N. Long. 64° 37' 25" W. The Tower is painted white, as is also the Keeper's House, one story, situate about 50 feet to the Eastward of the Tower.

Bearings and distances of several places from the above Light House: Cape Enrage Light, by compass, S. $61\frac{1}{2}$ W., 10 1-7 miles.

Highest Point of St. Mary's Ledge, by compass, N. 40 W., 6-10 mile.

The point of low water off the Light House, by compass, S. 78 W., 2-10 mile.

Jones' Ledge, N. 10 W., 3-10 mile—it dries at low springs, and has about $2\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms on it at half tide.

A Sand Bank, S. 15 W., 6-10 mile; it has $1\frac{1}{4}$ fathoms on its shoalest part at low water springs.

Grand Manan.—There is a Light House and Keeper's house at the "Swallow Tail," on the North Eastern part of the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fundy. The Light is 45 feet from Base to Deck; the point on which it stands is 108 feet above high water, making 148 feet elevation. This is a conspicuous mark in the South Channel between Briar Island and Grand Manan. Both houses are painted white. The Steam Whistle is on the extreme north-west Head of the Island, and is elevated 80 feet above high water. In thick weather, fogs, and snow-storms, it will be sounded so as to give three blasts, of four seconds duration, in each minute, with an interval of sixteen seconds between each blast.

Little River.—On an island at the entrance of the River. A fixed white light, varied by flashes every 90 seconds, 40 feet above high water, visible 11 miles.

Richibucto Head Light.—This is a fixed White Light, situated on Richibucto Head, Northumberland Strait, in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence. The light is placed at an elevation of 70 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fourth order. The tower is square, about 50 feet high from base to vane, painted white, and stands in lat. $46^{\circ} 39' 40''$ N., long. $64^{\circ} 43' 30''$ W. of Greenwich.

Cape Jourmain, Straits of Northumberland.—Lat. $46^{\circ} 19' 00''$ N.; long. $63^{\circ} 51' 00''$ W.—Visible from all points of approach from S. E. around by N. to W. The Light House is an octagonal wooden pyramidal building, painted white, 40 feet high, elevated 72 feet above high water, and stands 66 feet from the extremity of the cliff. The Keeper's house, a one and a half story wooden building, painted white, is situated 50 feet to the westward of the Light House.

Goose Lake, Miscou Island, Bay des Chaleurs.—A revolving White Light, elevated 40 feet above high water, and shewing a flash every minute, is exhibited at this Light House, and is seen at a distance of upwards of 10 miles. The lighting apparatus has two faces, and makes a complete revolution every two minutes. The tower is a square wooden building, 29 feet high, with a dwelling attached, and painted white. The illuminating apparatus is catoptric.

Heron Island, Bay des Chaleurs.—This Light is a fixed White Light, elevated 66 feet above high water, is visible from all points seaward, and on clear weather is seen at a distance of 12 miles. The tower is a square wooden building, 20 feet high, and painted white. The illuminating apparatus is catoptric.

Caraquet Island, Bay de Chaleur.—Square Tower on Keeper's dwelling. White.

Point Escuminac Light.—This Light House is situated in Miramichi Bay, north latitude $47^{\circ} 4' 30''$; west longitude, $64^{\circ} 50' 30''$. It is a

Miscoon Island Light.—This Light House is situated on Birch Point, north latitude 48° 1' 00"; west longitude, 64° 30' 00". It is a fixed red light, elevated seventy-nine feet above high water.

Shediac Lights.—On Point DuChene Wharf, in the summer, north latitude 46° 14' 6"; west longitude 64° 31' 5". It is a fixed White light.

Two Fixed White Beacon Lights on Shediac Island, visible ten miles.

Miramichi River.—Light House on Portage Island. Fixed White Light, elevated — feet above high water.

Two Beacon Lights on "Preston's Beach," about five miles above Esenminac Light. Two Beacon Lights at Oak Point. Two Beacon Lights at "Grant's." All fixed *white* Lights. Visible ten miles.

Time for going through the Falls.

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the *flood*, and about two and a half on the *ebb*, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

TO PURIFY RIVER OR MUDDY WATER.—In a quart of warm water dissolve an ounce of alum, and stir it about in the proportion of a teacupful to each gallon. The impurities present will settle at the bottom, and the water will in the course of a day be quite clear.

TO DRIVE FLIES FROM A ROOM.—Mix with half a teacupful of milk a tablespoonful of finely ground black pepper, and the same quantity of tar. Put this about the places where the flies are most numerous.

 And so on—adding 5 cents for every additional half ounce.

Letters for Newfoundland, 6 cents; Bermuda, 6 cents · West Indies, via Halifax, 12 cents.

All Letters should be prepaid by Postage Stamps.

Printed Books, Periodicals, and Pamphlets, under 48 ounces in weight, can be forwarded by Post in the Dominion and to Newfoundliand, at the rate of one cent per four ounces.

Transient Newspapers require to be prepaid, at the rate of one cent per four ounces. Dominion newspapers for subscribers require to be prepaid, one cent per pound, if sent from the office of publication.

Pamphlets, Periodicals, and Books, to pass at the above rates, must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides or ends.

No words or marks (except the name and address of the person to whom sent), shall be written on any Newspaper, Pamphlet, Book, Periodical, &c.

Book Postage to United Kingdom, under 1 oz., 2 cents; 1 to 2 oz., 4 cents; 2 to 4 oz., 6 cents; 4 ounces and under 8 ounces, 12 cents; 8 ounces and under 12 oz., 18 cents; 12 oz. and under 16 oz., 24 cents; 1 lb. and under 1½ lb., 36 cents; 1½ lb. to 2 lb., 48 cents.

Periodicals printed in Canada can be sent to United Kingdom for 2 cents.

REGISTRATION.—The system of registration is applicable to all description of letters without distinction, whether they contain articles of value or not. It also applies to parcels. The charge in addition to postage is for letters 2 cents; to United States, 5 cents; parcels 5 cents; to England, 8 cents.

PARCELS.—Parcels closed at the ends and sides can be sent by mail throughout the Dominion, at a rate of 12½ cents per half lb. The weight of each parcel is not to exceed 8 lbs., nor the size to exceed 2 feet in length or breadth, and 1 foot in thickness. The parcel must not contain any glass, liquid, or any substance liable to do injury to the mail, under the penalty of a forfeiture of the parcel if discovered. The parcel is not to contain any writing. Parcels must be pre-paid by stamps. The sender, by writing his name on the outside, can have the parcel returned in case of failure to reach the person addressed.

Patterns and Samples under 8 ounces in weight, can be sent to the United States on the prepayment by postage stamp of 8 cents.

POSTAGE STAMPS.—Postage stamps are provided at the respective values of ½, 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, 10, 12½, and 15 cents: all bearing as a device the effigy of Her Majesty.

Patterns and samples are transmitted between the Dominion and the United Kingdom at the same rate as per book post. The pattern or sample must be open at the end or side, except in case of seeds, drugs, &c.; which can be sent in closed transparent bags.

Persons remitting money should obtain a Money Order, as the Department is not responsible for the loss of a letter containing money; and in no case should a money letter be sent without registration. No notice is taken of any unregistered letter.

Letters for the British and Foreign West Indies, Cuba, Porto Rico, Mexico, Central America, South America, China, Japan, the Sandwich Islands, and the Australian Colonies, are forwarded daily via New York, if so addressed and prepaid.

Mail Steamers for the United Kingdom, leave Quebec or Portland every Saturday; New York, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays; Halifax, every alternate Tuesday. The Mail Steamer for Bermuda, leaves Halifax every fourth Monday. For Newfoundland, leaves Halifax by steamer for England.

MONEY ORDERS.

The following Post Offices in New Brunswick are authorized to issue and pay Money Orders (under direction of the Post Master General), on Money Order Offices in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Ontario, Quebec, and P. E. Island for any sum not exceeding in one Order \$100: But when a larger sum is required, additional orders may be issued to make up the amount.

When Money Orders exceeding \$100 in aggregate amount are issued in one day and to the same person, by one or more Offices upon another Office, the Postmaster of the Office drawn upon (if necessary) may delay the payment of such Orders for five days.

All Money Orders shall be drawn upon Printed Forms supplied by the Post Office Department; and no Order will be valid or payable unless given upon the regular Printed Forms.

The Commission to be charged upon Money Orders shall be as follows:—

For Local Orders on Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, P. E. Island, British Columbia, and Manitoba—On orders not exceeding \$4, 2 cents; \$4, and not exceeding \$10, 3 cents. Exceeding \$10, and not exceeding \$20, 10 cents. Exceeding \$20, and not exceeding \$40, 20 cents. Exceeding \$40, and not exceeding \$60, 30 cents. Exceeding \$60, and not exceeding \$80, 40 cents. Exceeding \$80, and not exceeding \$100, 50 cents.

For Orders on Newfoundland—On orders up to £5, 25 cents. Over £5, and up to £10, 50 cents. Over £10, and up to £15, 75 cents. Over £15, and up to £20, \$1.

For Orders on the United Kingdom—On orders up to £2, 25 cents. Over £2, and up to £5, 50 cents. Over £5, and up to £7, 75 cents. Over £7, and up to £10, \$1.

For Orders on British India—On orders up to £2, 30 cents. Over £2, and up to £5, 60 cents. Over £5, and up to £7, 90 cents. Over £7, and up to £10, \$1.20.

For Orders on the United States—On orders under and up to \$20, 25 cents. Over \$20 and up to \$40, 50 cents. No single order granted for a larger sum than \$40, Canadian currency.

The person to whom an Order is payable, can have it paid to a second person by writing on it, "Pay to the order of ——— (the name of the second person to fill the blank), for value received."

TARIFF CUSTOM DUTIES.

NOTE.—By Act 36 Vict., cap. 47, on and from the first July 1875, "such duties of Customs and Excise as are now charged and collected by the WINE GALLON shall thereafter be charged by the IMPERIAL GALLON, in proportion to the greater capacity of that measure." The effect of this is that the importer must deduct one-sixth from the number of Wine gallons to ascertain the number of Imperial gallons for duty; and on the other hand, add one-fifth to the Tariff rate of duty to find the duty on the Imperial gallon.

All unenumerated Articles are subject to a duty of 17½ per cent.

The two following provisions are found in the Customs Act of 1871 :—
The Governor in Council may, from time to time, transfer to the list of goods which may be imported into Canada free of duty, any or all articles (whether natural articles or products of manufactures), used as materials in Canadian manufactures; and any such materials mentioned in any Order in Council in that behalf, shall be free of duties of Customs from the time therein appointed for that purpose.

The Governor in Council may authorise the admission, free of duty, of any machinery to be used in any Canadian manufactory, on satisfactory evidence that like machinery is not then manufactured in Canada.

TABLE OF PROHIBITIONS.

The following articles shall be prohibited to be imported under a penalty of two hundred dollars together with a forfeiture of the parcel or package of goods in which the same may be found, viz. :

Books, Drawings, Paintings, Prints, and Photographs of an immoral or indecent character.
Coin, base and counterfeit.

This Table, and the accompanying remarks, are the result of many years actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the Sun and Moon, in their several positions respecting the Earth, and will, by simple inspection, show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the Moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom found to fail.

SOAKING SEED WHEAT IN BRINE.—Having cleaned your seed, prepare a pickle of salt dissolved in water, sufficiently strong to bear up a potato, and for half a barrel of such pickle add half a pound of blue vitriol. When all is dissolved put in the seed, stir it well, and skim off all that rises to the surface; throw the remainder into a basket to drain; let this be done ten or twelve hours previous to sowing. Just before sowing spread it on a tight floor and roll in slaked lime to a powder, stirring it well with rakes. It is now ready to deposit in the soil. The 1st of September is as late as the seed ought to be sown, and in no case ought it to be delayed later than the 10th of the month. As the kernels of different varieties vary in size, some will require a larger quantity than others; so, also, if sown broadcast by hand or drilled by machine, the former will require more seed than the latter. From five pecks to two bushels, and in some instances, more, are used, varying with the mode of sowing, and with different cultivators. The grain drill, pro-

perly adjusted, deposits the seed more uniformly, covers it at an even depth, requires less seed, and usually give greater crops than when sown by hand; also, the work is done quicker, the seed comes up more uniformly, and is better prepared to resist any counteracting influences. Where seed is sown by hand it should be evenly distributed, and the harrowing should be both length and crossways the field, to cover the seed as uniformly as possible.

PASTE THIS IN YOUR HAT.—Here are a few items of information known to some, but to a great many yet to be learned: How to lay off a square acre of ground: Measure off 208½ feet on each side and you will have an acre within an inch. Contents of distances: An acre contains 4,840 square yards. Measure of distances: A mile is 5,280 feet, or 1,760 yards in length. A fathom is six feet. A league is six miles. A day's journey is 33½ miles. A cubit is two feet. A hand (horse measure) is four inches. A palm is three inches. A span is 10½ inches. A snace is three feet. A barrel of flour weighs 196 pounds. A barrel of pork is 200 pounds. A barrel of rice is 200 pounds. A barrel of powder is 25 pounds. A firkin of butter is 56 pounds. The following are sold by weight per bushel: Wheat, beans, and clover seed, 60 pounds to the bushel; corn, rye, and flaxseed, 56 pounds to the bushel.

A SUGGESTION AS TO THE MANAGEMENT OF SMALL POX.—When a case occurs in a family, as soon as it is ascertained to be small pox, remove every article of furniture, carpeting, and ornaments from the room to some out-of-the-way room, attic, shed, or barn: have nothing in the room except such things as are indispensable for the use of the patient. Now dissolve a small quantity of chloride of lime in hot water, strain it into a tub of water, and set it in the room. When you change the linen of the patient, or sheets and bedding (which should be done often in bad cases), put all into this tub of chlorinated water, until enough is accumulated to make a washing, and thus all contagion will be destroyed. Keep a good circulation of air in the room; keep the patient cool but not cold. If the case be a mild one, very little medicine is required; with a light, nourishing diet all will end well in from seventeen to twenty-one days. In more violent cases a more careful attention is required, and a skilful physician's attendance is important.

The manner of cleansing the patient is of the utmost importance for the public security. After every scale of the dried eruption is removed from the body, hands, feet, and nails, put the patient in a tub of warm water, with a little of the chloride of lime, and with a comb be careful to remove all scabs from the head; soap the hair well, and wash the whole person down, wipe d.y, and put on clean clothes, and the patient is free from contagion. If the patient is allowed to go among the people without a thorough cleansing, every flake removed from the thick skin of the feet will carry contagion with it.

All farm machinery should receive two good coats of paint whenever it has been sufficiently exposed to cause the paint to scale off and lose its glossy appearance. A few quarts of paint will go a long way in protecting machinery during the exposed period; and there is no doubt that when unprotected by paint when in use and by shelter when not in use more injury is done than by ordinary wear.
