## CONGREGATIONAL STA'TISTICS.

The Committee on Statisties beg leare respectfully to report :
That the total number of Congregations in connection with the Chureh
 while 22 were vacant. $\dagger$

97 Returus-6 being double, as coming from Congregations, whose Ministers regularly ofliciate in two Churehes, and 12 from racant Con-gregations-have been received by the Committee. 16 Kirk Sessions having Ministers, besides 8 vacant Congregations, (some of which, however, onght perhaps rather to be regarded meanwhile, as Preaehing Stations than Congregations organised) have not only disobeyed the injunctions of Synod, as riven last year, but also the peremptory orders expressed by the Synod of the present year, through the Moderator, to defanters. These are
Thorah, Mnlmur and Searboro' in the Presbytery of Toronto.
$\ddagger$ Queber, Point Levi, Three Rivers and Leeds, in the Presbytery of Quebec. Grenville, Hawkesbury, Ormstown \& Lachine, $\ddagger$ in the Presbytery of Montreal.
Galt and Brantford in the Presbytery of Hamilton.
London, Woodstoek and Norwich, in the Presbytery of London, with the vaeant Congregations of Spencerville, Camden, Whitby, New Richmond, St. Enstache, Vankleek IIill, Beamsville and I'nslinch. The return from Riehmond (Presbytery of Bathurst) the Committee regret to find las gone anissing.

The greater number of those returns which have been received are more or less incomplete, while many of them are very imperfectly answered.

In connection with those Churches which bave reported, there are 7,510 Families, 11,377 Commnnieants (being a net inerease over the former year of 689) with an attendance on Divine Ordinances of $14,97.4$. In 5 returns the number of Families is not given; in 6 , the number of Commonicants ; and in 7, the attendance. The attendance given, it may be remarked, is that of the Morning, which, it aplears, is generally considevably larger than that of the Afternoon or Erening. It ought, however, to be noted that the actual attendanee is more than this, as the Ministers of the conntry charges, (and they are by far the more numerons) usually conduct Divine Service, as is well known, in different Churches or Preaching Statious in the after parts of the day to Congregations for the most part different, in very many cases, to Congregations entirely different.

[^0]In eannection with 89 Churches, there are 426 aeting Elders, being nearly five to eaeln Churelh, a large Stufl' of Assistants to Ministers in spiritual things, if they endeavour to diselarge aright the duties of their honorable office.

There is a Sablatly School in eonneetion with 60 Churches which have reported, shewing an attendance of 4,226 , being more than 60 to each school. 48 of these sehools are furnished with Libraries, the aggregate mumber of whose Volumes amomuts to 11,249 . liesides a Sabbath School, there is a Bible Class in eomection with 35 Clurcles, attended by 818 pmpils. Thcre is also a Congregational Library in conncetion with 35 Churehes, comprising 5,401 Voluncs. 23 Churches of those reported (having Ministers) have no Snbbath Selool at present. The great distance of familics from Church in many places, eoupled with the fact before notiecd that many of the Ministers oflieiate csery Sunday in two or more Clurcless or l'rcaeling Stutions, at distanees eonsiderably apart, having therefore little time to attend to the teaching of the young on that day, seems to be the chief canse of their not laving amongst them this nursery of the future Chureh. It is pleasing howecer to find that scecral Ministers are struggling to overeome the diffienlties of their prosition in this respect as well as in others, and are attempting to maintain Sublath Schools during the summer months.

During the year upwards of 1,700 little ones have been dedieated in Baptism unto Him who said, "Suffer the little children to eome unto me, and forbid them not."

In 19 Clurches which have reported to Your Committee, the Saerament of the Lord's Supper is dispensed once a year; in 54, twiee; in 7, three times ; and in 1, quarterly; while several do not reply to the query.

In 32 Clurelies, serviees on thrce several weck days are connceted with the observance of this solcmn ritc ; in 32, there are scrvices on two week days; in 14, there is service on only onc. The others do not furnishany information on the point. If praeticable, it is certainly desirable to have greater miformity in the practice of Chureles both in regard to the number of times the Lord's Supper is disp,cnsed in the course of cach year, and also as to the week days on whiela Serviecs are held in connection with the administration of this Ordinance.

21 Ministers hold a week day scrvice throughont the year, in niost cases an Evening Veeting for prayer, and 8 have a monthly Missionary Mceting, while a considerable number stete that they have oeeasional weck day Scrvices.

In referenec to Sabbath Observanee, the answers reeeived are upon the whole satisfactory, evidencing a bceoming respect for the sacred day of rest. Those regarding Family Worship are vague and inexplicit, betraying a marked uncertainty in the minds of Sessions, whether this very essential and incumbent Christian duty is observed or neglected by Families.

The total amount for the year of the ordinary Sabbath Collections of 66 Congregations is $\$ 6,660,03 \frac{1}{2}$. One or two of this number state that they have only recently eommeneed to take up, Ordinary Sabbath Collections. 16 others, of whieh 8 are in the Presbytery of Toronto, e:ther do not reply to the query at all, or say, that they do not make Colleetions, save for spceial purposes.

Besides the ordinary Sabbath Colleetions the sum of $\$ 5,213.46 \frac{1}{2}$ has been eontributed by 85 Congregations for Missionary and Synodieal purposcs. The contribution to Synod Fund, bcing by many Congregations paid ont of the ordinary Colleetions, shonld not in the case of those who do this, have appeared as a Spceial Collection or Contribution, as in this way it comes to be reckoned twiee; but in most eases, your

Comuittee had no means of knowing whether a Collection had been made for the purpose, or whether the amount had been taken from thie Sessional Funds. In addition to this sum of $\$ 5,213,46 \frac{1}{2}$, which is altoget her irrespective of the very large contributions of several Congregations of the Church to the General Home Mission Fund, $\$ 3,237.27$ have been contributed for "other purposes" or as named in the heading of general and classitied sheets No. 2, "Miscellaneous objects," making with ordinary Sabbath Collections \$15,119.77. If to this sum be added the amonnt of stipend received by Ministers, the total amoment raised for all purposes during the year, save those for Church Building and the General Home Mission Fund of the Chureh (of which the Committee have not been furnished with any correct or full statements) is found to be $\$ 38,926.50$, from which, if the Revenue aecruing from Property, $\$ 2,788.40$ be deducted, there remains $\$ 30,137.10$, being pure contributions.

While several Ministers officiate in two Churches, there are, besides, regular Preaching Stations at the following places:

In what proportions this debt is distributed among the varions Presbyteries will be seen by referring to classified Sheet No. 1, accompanying this Report.
The above mentioned delit is on the Church Property of 35 Congregations and in sums of, from $\$ 16$ to $\$ 30,000$. Efforts to liquidate it are at present being made hy 23 of these.
In connection with 31 Churches which have reported, there are no Mhuses ; in counection with 29, there are no Glebes; while 20 have neither Manses nor Glebes. The returns from five of these state, that efforts are being made to procure the one or the other.
The Committee would respectfully suggest to Syuod, that the attention of the Committe on Church Property should be called to the title of the Church of Dundee-to that of St. Juhn's, Hamitton (which is said to be disputed), and also to that of North Dorchester. They would likewise surgest to the attention of the Synod, that in their opinion, Congregations should be furnished anmally (as the Laws of the Province relating to Chureh Property now provide), with a report of the receipt and appropriation of al! revenues received by Trustees from all Glebes and other properties belonging to the several Congregations, and which are held in trust by such Trustees or Managers.
In 40 Churches from which Returns have been received, the sittings are let. In a few, the sittings have been sold either absolutely or under certain regulations. In all the other Churches, the sittings whitc free, are regarded as belonging to those who, for the time being, contribate to the mainteuance of Divine Ordinances. The rate of sitting in those Churches, in which the Pews are let, arerages from 80.50 to 84.06 . The avernge rate of sitting in the Bounds of each Presbytery will be seen by referriug to classified Sheet No. 1. That of the whole Church is $8164 \frac{1}{2}$.
The stipends of 22 Ministers, the Managers of whose Churches have reported, are derived from Pew hents.

The Stipends paid to Sinisters by their Congregations during the year, irrespective of any allowance which they may have received from the Temporalities Board of the Chureh, arerage from $\$ 43$ to $\$ 3000$.

The gross amount of Stipend paid by these 6.4 Congregations (being all who haver reported this item) is $\$ 23,806^{\circ} 73$, whieh gives an average Stipend to each Minister of $\$ 371.98$.
The average Contribution of e:tel Communicant in these Congregations (and they embrace 8742 Commmicants) for Stipend purposes is S2. Te, , and that of eath Family belonging to the same (and there are 10127) is \$2.3.

32 Congregations report arrears amounting in all to $\$ 6850 \cdot 37$. The Congregations in the I'reshytery of 1hanilton, oceny the unenviable pusition of being the largest in arrears to their Ministers, these being no less than $\$ 1960 \cdot 12$. The Congregations in the l'resbytery of Bathurst come next,owing $\$ 1380 \cdot 00$, those in Gle'garry next, owing $\$ 1 \geqslant 16 \cdot 00$. The Congregations in the Presbytery of Coronto, in proportion to their numbers, are the least in arrears, the anount of Stipend promised by them being $\$ 6186$, and the arrears only $\$ 1054$.

One Congregation in the Presbytery of Kingston reports arrears to the anomet of S506. The arrears of three Congregations amome to the sum of \$1475.79.

Besides $\$ 6850 \cdot 37$ arrears of 32 Congregations before mentioned, it is evident from tabular sheet No. 2, that the arrears of the past year (irrespective of auy of former years) of 6 others, though not stated, are $\$ 430$, making a total of $\$ 7230 \cdot 37$, arrears of 38 Congregations ; and it is equally evident that if those Managers who have withlefd information on this point, had honestly reported, the aggregate amount of arrears would have been even much greater.
The total arrears owing by those 38 Congregations are about one fourth of the amount of Stipends, promised by the whole Clureh.
The following Congregations have given no information whatever as

The Committee in conclusiris, wounh respectfully represent that in endeavouring to carry ont the views of the Synod, and the very generally expressed views of the Clurch at large in relation to Congregational Statistics they lave used all ditigence to obtain the necessary information. Their labors, though onerous, have been cheerfully directed to the end in view, and the only regret felt by the Committee is, that the absence of full Returns, considerably detracts from the value of these labors. The Committee are umanonsly of opinion that the objeet contemphatel in obtaining these Statistieal Returns is to present from time to tiane a comparative statement of the general efficiency and progress of tho Church, and that therefore it is unaccessary, indeed, that it would he very questionable policy to attempt obtaining such Returns ammally, but that the objeet wonld be more satisfactorily seenred by presenting such a statement at reguiar intervals, say of three years. As the Committee do not for a moment lonbt that this course will appear proper and desirable, they deen it muecessary to mivance any arguments in support of it. It is evident that in every Congregation there may be certuin temporary canses, $n$ falling off in some one point or mother, While an average, say, of threo years, might exhibit a steady prosperity "rou the whote.
The vague and imperfect answers returued to many of the queries renders it necessary that some more satisfactory method of ohtaining the desired information be devised, and to this end, the Committee respectfaily recommend, that whether the leturns be hereatier made yearly, or at intervals of three years, one or more competent pasisons in each Presbytery be appointed to aet as Ramerators, to wait upon the Session, and managers of each Congregation, and personally to obtain from them, full ume acenrate lieturns. The habors of the Committee wouh thus he materially lightened, and a full and reliable statement of the progress and prosperity of the Church would result. In the event of this suggestion meeting the approval of Symol, the Committee have no hesitation in stating their belief, that in each Preshytery, there are Laymen to be fonnd of sufficient intelligence, public spirit, and zeal for the Church, who wonld cheerfully devote the necessary time to this important work.

They also beg to suggest that the Synod appoint a Committee to revise the queries contained in the Schedule, and likewise to re-consider the form and order of the Tabular sheets.
