

REV. DR. W. A. MACKAY DEAD.

Prominent Presbyterian and Protestantist Passes Away. Woodstock, Nov. 28.—Rev. Dr. W. A. Mackay, for the past 30 years pastor of Chalmers church of this city, and ex-president of the Dominion Alliance, died this morning at 2.30 o'clock, after an illness extending over a year.

He is survived by his wife and the following sons and daughters: John P. Mackay, business manager of the Toronto Globe; Robert Mackay of Toronto, W. D. Mackay of this city, Mrs. H. G. D. Mackay, D. C. Coutts and Miss E. Mackay of this city.

Dr. Mackay was born in West Zorra, and received his primary education in Woodstock, after which he graduated from Toronto University. He was ordained in 1870, and 20 years he was president of the Oxford Prohibition Association, and was the author of several books, among them "Pioneer Life in Zorra" and "Zorra Boys Abroad."

OBITUARY.

A. M. Mackay. St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 28.—A. M. Mackay, a Conservative member of the Newfoundland Assembly for 20 years, is dead aged 72 years. Mr. Mackay was superintendent of the Anglo-American Cable Company. He was formerly in the Toronto office of the Montreal Telegraph Company in 1854, and was among the first operators to receive by sound.

THOMAS COSGRAVE.

The death took place Sunday night of Thomas Cosgrave at the home of his daughter-in-law, Mrs. W. H. Durand, 71 Montrose-ave. He had gone to bed the night before feeling fairly well, but was found dead the next day, having died from heart failure. He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. W. H. Durand, and two sons, Patrick and Thomas, living in Toronto.

The late Mr. Cosgrave was born in Limerick, Ireland, 65 years ago, and came to Canada alone at the age of 16 years to seek his fortune. He settled in Toronto, and has lived here ever since. In religion he was a Roman Catholic, and a member of St. Mary's church.

GRANTED LEAVE TO APPEAL.

Validity of Railway Liability Act to Be Argued. (Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, Nov. 28.—The privy council in Grand Trunk Railway versus the Attorney-General of the Dominion, granted special leave to appeal. Lord Davey expressed the view that the case was most important and should be argued on its constitutional points.

It is in the validity of amending the act passed in the session of 1904, which prevents any railway company within control of the Dominion, being relieved from liability for damages for personal injuries to workmen or employees in case they sign such conditions in an insurance policy with the company. The privy council in Grieve v. Tasker, ruled that the Newfoundland court was not competent to give the leave to appeal, it granted, and the renewed application here for leave is dismissed.



DEMAND EQUAL SUFFRAGE 200,000 WORKMEN PARADE

Poor Man's Vote Doesn't Count Much Now and Austrians Want Reforms.

Vienna, Nov. 28.—The Austrian parliament opened to-day one of the most important sessions in its history, as it will have to decide the questions of suffrage and the nation's attitude towards Hungary. As the members took their seats, a monster popular procession, variously estimated to number from 100,000 to 200,000 workmen, was marching past the parliament buildings with red flags and banners bearing inscriptions imperatively demanding equal, direct and universal suffrage. Emperor Francis Joseph spent the day at the Vienna Palace, from the windows of which he could witness the silent defiling of his people. Premier Baron Gautsch von Frankenthurn in the meanwhile was laying before the deputies the government's bill providing for equal suffrage.

Every Austrian male over 24 years of age has a vote, but the voters are divided into five classes, and the votes cast by certain classes, notably the landed proprietors, various chambers of commerce and urban dwellers, are infinitely more effective in securing the election of a deputy than the votes cast by the ordinary people. To the extent even that sometimes a dozen landowners' votes count as much as 200,000 votes cast by the ordinary people. The result of this system is that the well-to-do classes are over-represented.

YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS HIGH CONSTABLE RESIGNS

J. A. Ramsden Contributes One of Two Surprises at Yesterday's Council Meeting.

York County Council was yesterday called upon to deal with two important measures, each somewhat in the nature of a surprise. The first was the submission by J. W. Flavell of a proposal for a grant of \$35,000 to the new general hospital. Mr. Flavell addressed the council at some length. The matter was referred to the financial committee.

The other matter was the resigning of High Constable Ramsden from that office. Mr. Ramsden has been county clerk for eight years, during six of which he has been high constable. The reasons assigned were given by letter as follows:

The number of constables on the list in the county is about 300, many of whom are seldom called upon to perform the duties of the office. Of what may be termed active constables there are about 20 in number, one-half of whom are located in the city, and all of whom pretty thoroughly understand their duties. I am glad to see that there is a marked improvement in this respect, no doubt owing to greater experience and more constant employment.

I regret to state, however, that there is considerable jealousy among the constables regarding the distribution of work, which I think should be equitably divided among the constables. Four reports do not make it clear whether on the renewal of the grant the constables are to be available or not. Acting on the authority of a resolution of council passed last session, several convictions have been secured against persons violating the act regulating the running of automobiles on the highways, and reward amounting to \$15 have been paid by the county treasurer.

We started out in the hope that the fine in every case would be high enough to cover the reward, but after the first conviction the magistrate did not see fit to inflict a greater fine than \$5.00. The county, therefore, has paid out the sum of \$120.00 in rewards more than it has received in fines. I would suggest that if council has power to make the fine whatever amount may be payable to the person who lays the information and secures the conviction. At present the municipal authorities have power to prohibit the carrying of fire arms openly, and to cope with this question properly special legislation may be required.

The members of the Roads and Bridges Committee on Tuesday morning visited Markham Village with a view to conferring with the town council as to opening up of the 8th concession and the assumption of the new road by the county. The members favorably impressed with the proposal. Markham council will on Thursday submit a definite proposal.
