The court also ruled that the decision should carry with it neither costs in the Supreme Court nor in the courts below. The cross appeal by Delap was dismissed with costs. THE PRINCE OF WALES.

A Report Current in Eugland That Par-liament is to be Asked to Raise Bis Income. London, March 28.—A report is cur-rent, and gains credence in the lobby of the House of Commons, that the Government will ask the House to in-Government will ask the House to in-crease the allowance of £37,000 yearly granted to the Prince of Wales in be-half of his family. The request will be made on the ground of the heavy ex-pense of the establishment of the Duke of York, the Prince's son. The Prince of Wales has settled upon him by law an annuity of £40,000, and by an act pessed in 1888, receives £37,000 annu-ally in addition for the support and maintenance of his children. He has also an income, the revenues of the Duchy of Cornwall, which in 1894 yield-ed him £57,734. The Princess of Wales has settled upon her the annual sum of £10,000, which; in the event of her becoming a widow, will be increased to £30,000 annually. Thus the incomes of the Prince and Princess amount to a total of about £144,734, or \$723,670.

The following or-der was read in every police station in New York at 6 o'clock, when the men of the first platoon were lined up for roll call: "Notify proprietors of saloons in your precinct that free lunch must be dispensed with and obstruc-tions removed which might prevent full view of the interior from the street after closing hours. Proprietors must be seen in person, patrolmen to be held accountable."
