The Toronto journals that have twenty war correspondents in the field and that have chartered despatch boats of their own must have something to show for their enterprise. They fo'low the lead of the New York sensational sheets, telling the public from day to day what is going to happen, what might have happened, what never has happened and what never will happen. One half of the alleged news they present is mere surmice. The actual happenings are obscured amid a deluge of probability and possibility. In order to make an appearance commensurate with their boasting the 20-war-correspondent journals pad out every little event, so that the grain of wheat everyone is seeking is buried in a bushel of chaff. The World endeavors to edit the war news with care and intelligence, giving only information that comes from reliable sources and that describes actual events, not possibilities. The United States Senate on Wednesday adopted a esolution directing the Committee of Naval Affairs to make enquiry concerning the expediency of securing and establish ing coaling stations at suitable points in foreign waters and to ascertain what

should be the dimensions of each coaling station, the conditions and expenses of occupancy and maintenance, and the best method of securing the right to maintain such station. Some idea of

where these coaling stations are likely to be located may be obtained from the report of William A. Chandler as Secretary of the Navy in 1883. He then urged the acquisition of coaling stations at Honolulu, Samoa, Somono Bay or some port in Hayti, Curacoa, in the Caribbean Sea, Santa Catharina in Brazil, Straits of Magellan, La Union, Salvador or Amapola, Honduras, Tullear Bay, Madagascar, Monrovia, Liberia, Island of Fernando, Port Hamilton Corea and a naval station on the Isthmus of Panama. He also recommended the acquisition of Flamenco, Perico Cubebra and Ilenao on the Pacific side now owned by American corporations Even those Americans who are mos strongly opposed to the schemes for the establishment of a great colonial empire will probably not object to the United States acquiring coaling stations throughout the world. The proposal does not necessarily imply that the United States shall have sovereignty over a foot of earth outside the American continent, as is only necessary for the United States by treaty with the country in whose territory the proposed station

happens to lie to secure the privilege of coaling there at any time, whether in war or peace, on the payment of a stipulated price. The right of coaling would of course include the right of taking refuge in the harbor and remaining there at pleasure during a war without violation of the neutrality laws.
