A Vivid Description of the Scenes and Incidents Which Are Taking Place at Rennes.

VINDICTIVENESS OF WITNESSES.

General Rogot Was Called as a Witness, But Made Himself a Cruel Persecutor.

Rennes, Aug. 16.—Writing of the progress of events at Rennes Mrs. Emily Crawford says:

The Bretons are first cousins of the Irish, though without Irish wit and gaiety, but they have a greater taste for personal adoration and picturesque costumes. The Transfer of Lebon.

Maitre Lebon had been in a house unsheltered from the sun, and in a rather noisy quarter. It is an old-fashioned homestead, built of granite and masonry, with a large and well-kept garden. The house is surrounded by high walls that might stand for miles.

Hopes Dashed to the Ground.

The seriousness of his state was hidden in the hope that the trial might be adjourned, pending his recovery.
