TWENTY-FIRST YEAR

OFFICE HAS WELCOME FOR KRUGER

And incidentally to Say Offensive Things, as Far as Official Regulations Will Permit, Against Great Britain.

At Lyons Denunciations of the English Drowned the Shouts in Favor of the Boers—One Fool Correspondent Fears Anglo-French Complications May Result.

LYONS, France, Nov. 23.—Mr. Kruger has become for the moment at least the popular hero of the French. His triumphant progress through the city from the station to his residence in the Bois de Boulogne was the occasion of a magnificent demonstration. He met with a tremendous reception in each town along the route which the train stopped, culminating in a scene of frenzied enthusiasm here this evening, culminated to the head of any man.

The population of Marseilles gathered in thousands this morning to escort him to the railway station, and gave him a rousing send-off while at Tarascon, Avignon, Valence, Lyons, Mâcon and Dijon, the inhabitants, who crowded the railroad stations, made the railway tremble with enthusiastic shouts of "Vive Kruger!" and "Vive les Boërs!"

**Sowed Wind, Reaping Whirlwind**  
One of the most important phases of the demonstration was the turn it took in an anti-British direction.

The few Englishmen whose ill-litteled levity at the Hotel de Lorraine, in Marseilles, exasperated the people in the streets there, never dreamed of the serious consequences of their act. They sowed the wind, and today the English people are reaping the whirlwind. The news of the insult to Kruger seems to have spread across France, and at all stations, but especially at Lyons and Dijon, shouts for the Boers were mingled with loud cries of "Down with the English!" Indeed, at Lyons, the denunciations of the English drowned the shouting for the Boers.

**A Fool Must Have Written This.**

**THE DEPARTURE FOR PARIS.**  
People of Marseilles Gave the Old Man and His Party a Great Send-off.

Marseilles, Nov. 23.—Heavy enthusiasm greeted Mr. Kruger's departure from Marseilles today.

Mr. Kruger was up at an early hour, and was ready and waiting when his train reached the hotel to see him to the railroad depot. He was accompanied by Dr. Lays and Messrs. Pearson, Wessels, Ellis, Fischer, Van Hülme, Rambaud and Herzog.

**KRUGER'S THANKS TO MARSEILLES.**  
Just before the departure of the train Mr. Kruger appeared on the steps of the railroad carriage in response to the shouts of the crowd, and said:

"Citizens of Marseilles: I thank the population of Marseilles for its warm welcome. I shall find the same enthusiastic sympathy in all the cities which I am going to travel thru, and I hope it will be followed by actions which will continue to seek and result in a speedy cessation of hostilities."

Extractive police precautions were taken this morning, and there was no disagreeable incident.

**Acclamations at Valence.**

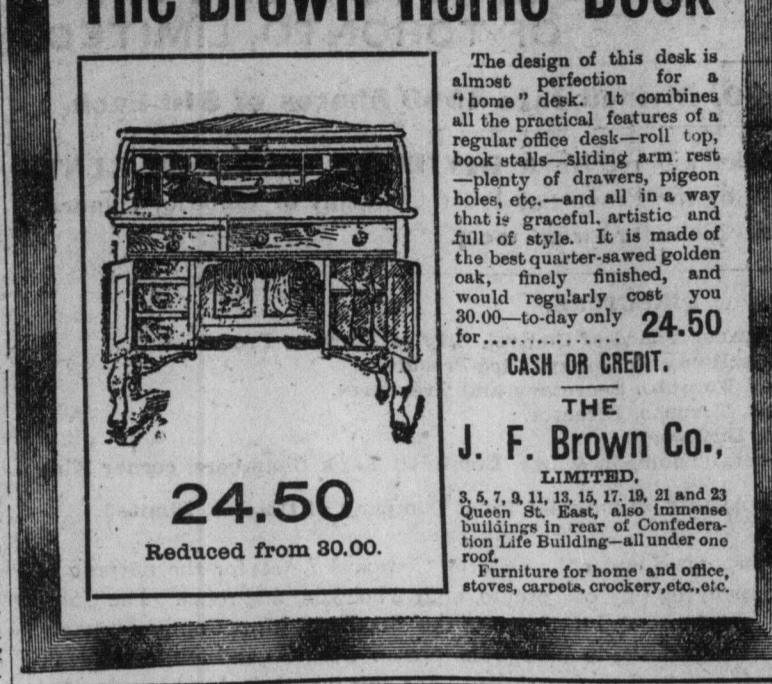

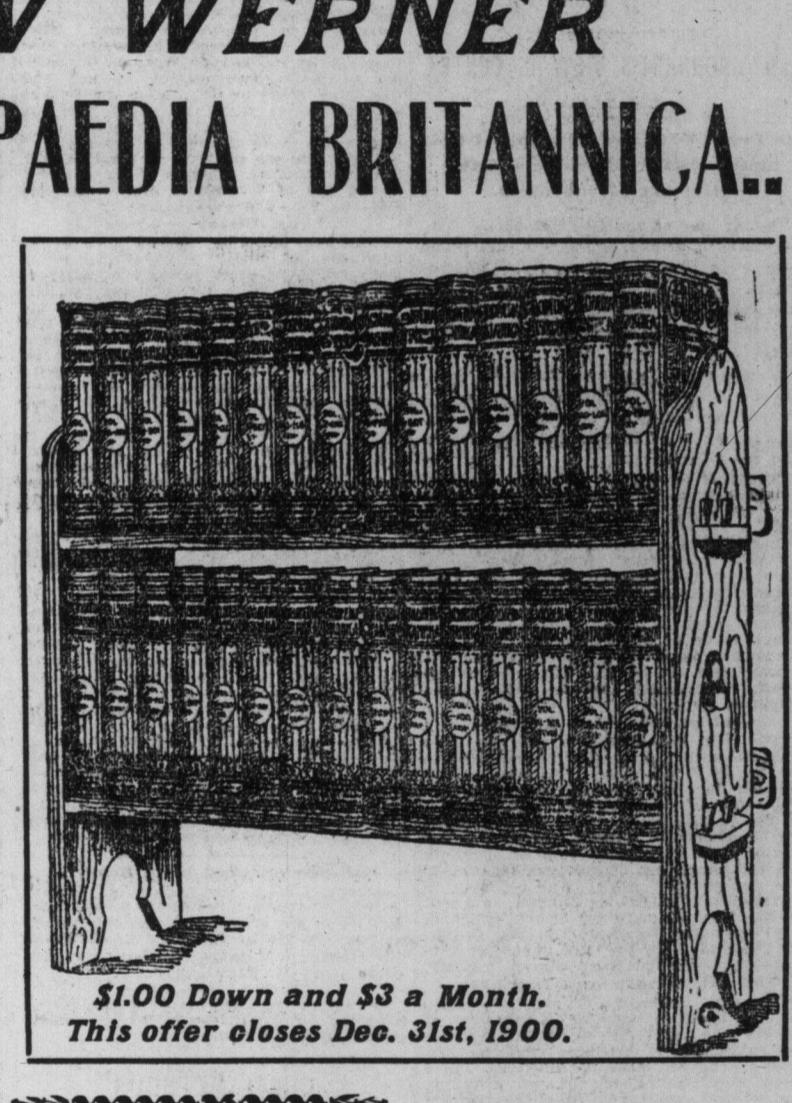

TORONTO CITY MISSION.

Annual Meeting Held in Bond Street Church Thursday—Record of the Work.

The annual meeting of the Toronto City Mission was held in the lecture room of the Bond Street Congregational Church Thursday.

Nearly 9000 persons have been visited in their homes, mostly in the poorer districts. Two hundred and six visits were made to our city prisons, and 203 services held in them and 700 of the prisoners personally dealt with.

With the Gospel carriage, 72 services have been held, 417 Gospel addresses have been made, and 508 workers have assisted at these services.

From the Poor Fund, \$504.82 was expended in giving assistance in urgent cases. Three thousand two hundred and eighty-eight articles of clothing and 63 bed quilts, mattresses, and other articles were provided for those in need from the "Outing Fund."

VICTORY FOR TRADE UNIONS

British Court of Appeals Decides That Picketing in Case of Strikes is Not Illegal.

THE TAFF VALE RAILWAY CO.

Sought an Injunction, But Without Success—Will Appeal to House of Lords.

London, Nov. 23.—Picketing as a means of conducting strikes has been legalized by the British courts. In dissolving the injunction secured by the Taff Vale Railway Company against the Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants, the House of Lords has held the action should not be maintained against the trades union, either for picketing or for damages sustained through the violation of the pickets.

The day's verdict was absolutely necessary, if organized labor is not to be reduced to utter impotence. It was not the legality of unionism which was at stake, it was the right of the unions to conduct a powerful strike.

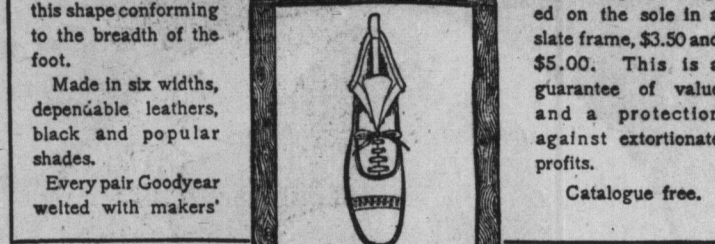

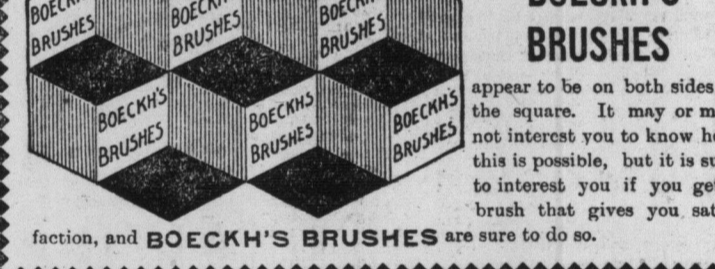
