### IRISH BILL IS READY FOR ROYAL ASSENT

Lords Have Agreed to All Arrest in Dublin Commons' Amendments to Home Rule Measure—Will Be Formally Resubmitted to House and Is Expected to Become Law in Day or So -Principal Changes in Bill.

London, Dec. 20.-The Irish home rule bill now is safe and will be placed on the statute books this week in a form only slightly amended from the shape in which it first left the house of commons. The house of lords today, after a brief debate, agreed to the amendments made to the bill the commons,

The only amendment discussed by the lords today was that passed by the lower house, providing that, if either area in Ireland refused to set up a parliament the executive could not make the offer a second time unless, within three years after June 1 next, both houses of the British parliament passed a resolution asking for Earl Middleton objected to this time-limit of 31/2 years and challenged a division on the question. He was defeated decisively by a vote of 91 to 14, upon which this and other commons amendments were agreed to without further discussion.

# PROTECTIVE TARIFF

Cutlery and Brush Firms Want Added Duties-Foreigners Compete.

#### **EXCEPTION** FARMERS

Kingston, Ont., Dec. 20 .- The tariff commission concluded its sitting here at six o'clock this evening and must have been convinced that Kingston and district did not want the idea of protection removed from the tariff. With the exception of A.U.F.O. delegation from Frontenac county, and J. O. Haycock, who represented the United Farmers of Lennox and Addington, all those who appeared be-fore the commission urged that protection be continued. In fact, two industries, the Canada Cutlery Co., of Kingston, and the Brush Manufacturing Co., of Hamilton, asked for the levying of increased duties.

Flood of German Knives.

C. E. Eaton of the Cutlery Co., said Canada was being flooded with cheap knives from Britain and other countries, including Germany, and asked for an increase in the general tariff of five per cent. and in the British preferential of ten per cent. Mr. Meakins, who represented the Brush Company, stated that practically all the tooth, brushes used in Canada are manufactured in Japan. He stated that the Japanese controlled practically all the camphor from which celluloid is made, and this latter product used chiefly in the manufacturing of handles. He pointed out that the Japanese were able to compete with Canadian prices because of the cheap labor they employ in manufacturing these brushes.



1. The immediate evacuation of 1. The immediate evacuation of Anatolia and Thrace by the entire Greek forces.

2. The unconditional return Smyrna to Turkish rule.
3. An immediate plebiscite in Thrace under the control of a neutral power.

4. Freedom of the straits of the Dardanelles under neutral control.

5. Modification of the financial and copomic clauses of the peace treaty

### DISASTROUS TO GERMANY

Berlin, Dec. 20.-Surrender to the allies of 800,000 milch cows, which have been demanded under the terms of the Versailles treaty, would have disastrous results in Germany, says a letter to the women of France from a committee of German women. Continued deprivation of the German people of the milk supply represented by these cows would result in weakening public stamina and individual re-sistance, and, therefore, operate to reduce the ability of Germany to fulfil treaty obligations thru necessary pro-

For nearly six years the populations of German cities have not had milk. the letter asserts, and owing to this fact, the death rate from tuberculosis has doubled since 1913, and 38,000 more children died in 1918 than in 1913. In Prussia alone there has been an increase in child mortality of 100

#### WILL BE FREE MARKET FOR CANADIAN BACON

London, Dec. 20.—Canadian bacon will be decontrolled in the British Isles at the end of February. The entire Canadian bacon output has been acquired by the ministry of food to the end of December, and as two months must elapse for the bacon to be cured and reach here, the arrangement now announced really means a free market for Canadian bacon killed after the end of the year.

#### Former French President Has Completely Recovered

Paris, Dec. 20.—Paul Deschanel who resigned as president of France in September because of ill-health, has completely recovered and will proceed to the department of Eure et Loir Tuesday, where he will inaugurate his senatorial campaign. This was disclosed today by Raoul Peret, president of the senate, upon his re-turn from a visit which he paid the former president.


