Troops Cast Themselves Before a Locomotive Rather Than Die by Jap Bullets.

Berlin, Feb. 13 .- Whatever the disposition of the Russian army as a nole, the army reserves in the Russian provinces bordering on Germany are not only disloyal but mutinous. New and serious disturbances have broken out among the reserves and conscripts who are being mobilized or who

are being sent to the far east. A large body of reserves looted the shops on the outskirts of Kieff, the great pilgrim city, which is called the "Jerusalem of Russia." . The raw soldiers killed the officer in command of the police who tried to restrain them,

the police who tried to restrain them.

Then a detachment of Cossacks fired on the reserves, killed eighteen and wounded more than eighty.

At Niefin, in the same neighborhood, a regiment of reserves was about to take train for the seat of war. When the train drew up these soldiers smashed all the windows in the cars.

When orders were given to get aboard and start the train, hundreds of soldiers gathered in front of the locomotive and swore they would not budge. Some even threw themselves on the rails, crying that they would rather be killed by a locomotive near their homes than by Japanese bullets in Manchuria.

At Hursk a party of reserves attacked the three officials who were directing their mobilization, killing one and badly wounding the others. After a summary their mobilization, killing one and badly wounding the others. After a summary trial the ringleaders were shot in the prison yard next morning.

If the Provinces of Podolia and Volhynia, 300 reserves, rather than start for the far east, fled into the woods, where they are wandering about in the deep snow. They must be suffering great hardships. Parties of Cossacks have been sent to capture them, with strict orders to shoot them if they resist.



The affair grew out of the recent discussion of the freight rate question in the house, when Mr. Sullivan inquired of Mr. Lamar of Florida, who was favoring the Hearst bill, why Mr. Hearst did not defend his own bill, this being followed by a criticism of Mr. Sullivan in The New York American and Journal, Several appeals were made to Speaker Cannon to cause the two men to desist in their abuse of each other.
