WAR BARELY ESCAPED. Noteworthy Conversation Between Lansdowne and Beakendorf. London, Feb. 13.—The diplomatic correspondence regarding the North Sea fishing dispute was resumed this morning. An affidavit was filed by Hill was produced, but after a portion had been read it was objected to by prosecuting counsel. 

FOR MALICIOUS PROSECUTION.

Damages to extent of \$5000 Awarded—Civil Court Case.

In June, 1904, E. R. and Herbert F. Lee conducted a bakery in Wilton-street. When they disposed of their business they also sold a chestnut horse they had in their possession, J. F. Taylor & Co., grain merchants, who claimed the Lees had no right to sell the horse, owing to a chattel mortgage. Information was laid against the Lees, which is a matter of public record and was discharged. They have now suing in the civil court for \$5000 each for malicious prosecution. The case was not finished.

In the county court yesterday Mrs. Annie Cook, William and Robert Cahoon, executors of the estate of Lett Fisher, Abraham Cahoon, the amount claimed is \$225. The defence deny that there is anything due plaintiff from the estate. Judge Winchester reserved.

The action of Dr. W. H. Clapp against his wife for breach of contract was dismissed by Justice Street yesterday. Plaintiff claims possession of a house on D'Avenue, which he had before he married her to-day in the morning, which might have resulted fatally since then the husband and wife have separated. Judgment was reserved.

German woman indemnity. Berlin, Feb. 13.—The German settlers in Ontario have petitioned the Reichstag to do something towards obtaining for them payment of the £100,000 which the United States and Great Britain under the arbitration award of King Oscar of Sweden awarded to the German settlers in 1898, which is affirmed still remains unpaid, the settlers in the meanwhile being unable to rebuild their plantations.

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
