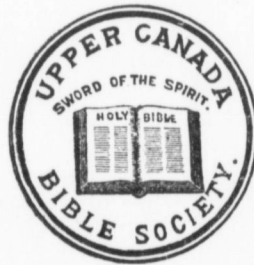


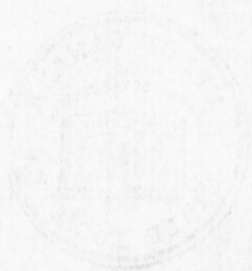

LAWS AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

As adopted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City of Toronto, on the third day of August, 1855; and amended at a General Meeting held on the 13th day of April, 1880.

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be denominated the "UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society—that is, the circulation of the Bible, without note or comment.

II. This Society shall endeavour to unite all Bible Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operations, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III. This Society shall maintain, in the City of Toronto, a general depot of Bibles and Testaments, from which all Societies in connexion with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures, at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV. The business of the Society shall be carried on by a Board of Directors, to consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Secretaries, and a representative from each Branch, as provided in Article V., together with twenty clerical and twenty lay members, so selected as to give the Board always, as before, a representative character as regards the principal religious bodies interested in the work of the Society, five of whom shall form a quorum. The five clerical and five lay members who shall have attended the least number of meetings of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election; except in cases where the non-attendance has arisen from illness or absence from the country, in which cases the Board may nominate such member or members for re-election.

V. Each Branch Society shall be entitled to a representative on the General Board. The President of the Branch shall be *ex officio* such representative, or any other resident member whom the Committee may appoint as a substitute, who shall be a member of such Branch.

VI. At any meeting of the Directors, the President, or, in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list then present, and in absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII. Each person paying annually one dollar shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying fifty dollars at any one time, either to this Society or to any of the Societies in connexion therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society, or who may have rendered important services, shall, at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII. Each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a certificate of membership, under the corporate seal of the Society, duly signed by the President and Secretaries.

IX. The Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of the Permanent Secretary, Agents, Depositary, Colporteurs, Bookkeeper,

and Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances ; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal, of the corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation.

X. The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business on the third Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7.30 p.m. Special meetings may be called by the Secretaries at any time, at the request of the President, or of any three Directors.

XI. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in the month of May in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors, for the time being, may deem best for the interests of the Society ; when the officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen ; a report of the operations of the Society during the foregoing year shall be presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depository's accounts, duly audited. Special general meetings may be called at any time by the Board.

XII. In case of the death or removal of any Director during the year, the Board shall at the next ensuing meeting thereof fill such vacancy.

XIII. No alteration in these By-laws shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the proposed alteration has been given to the Board.

RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RELATIVE TO GRANTS TO SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday Schools, the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the School ; the number of Scholars and Teachers ; the amount of funds at the disposal of the Managers ; who are its officers ; and why it is necessary to make such application :—all which should in every case be certified by a Minister of the Gospel, or some person of known respectability. And further, this Board recommends that the Secretaries make grants in future only to destitute settlements ; reporting the same to the next General Meeting of the Board of Directors.

RULES

RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES.

I. That a Society be formed in connection with the British and Foreign Bible Society, through the medium of the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment: the English copies being of the authorised version *only*.

II. That the Society be denominated "THE _____ BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY."

III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually, or five dollars at one time, shall be members of this Society.

IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee consisting of not less than _____ other members; five to constitute a quorum.

V. That all Ministers of the Gospel who join the Society shall be reckoned members of the Committee.

VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly or oftener; time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.

VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operations into Districts, and appoint visitors for each district, to solicit subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.

VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Society shall, after deducting incidental expenses, be remitted, yearly, to the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the Indian languages, and for supplying other nations, through the Parent Institution, with the pure Word of God: or for the purchase of Bibles and Testaments to supply the neighbourhood *at cost price*, or gratuitously to those who cannot purchase.

IX. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the _____ day of _____, in each year, at _____, when the accounts shall be presented; the proceedings of the past year stated; a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee if required.

X. That on the formation of a new Committee, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Upper Canada Bible Society.

The past year of the history of this society will probably be long remembered by many for the great gap which death has made in the ranks of her veterans. On the 4th of September the Revd. Dr. Lachlin Taylor passed away from this world of toil and care and conflict, in which he had so bravely battled. Dr. Taylor had been a Vice-President of the Society for twenty years, and, for ten years previously, its most effective Agent. Perhaps the Bible Society never had in any place a more enthusiastic advocate; and it would be hard to estimate how much it is indebted to his indefatigable labours, stirring eloquence, and indomitable zeal for the high position it holds in our Province. On the very next day the Society lost one of its oldest, most valuable, and most valued friends in the departure of another of its Vice-Presidents, Andrew T. McCord, Esq. Mr. McCord had been a member of the Board ever since 1837, and had always given much time and thought to its affairs, in which his business abilities and experience were of great value; and though he was seventy-five years of age, his natural vigour was such that the Directors expected to have had the benefit of his counsel for yet many days. On the 19th of February another Vice-President was taken from among us in the person of the Revd. Dr. Egerton Ryerson, at the advanced age of seventy-nine years. Of course Dr. Ryerson will be chiefly remembered for his valuable services to the Province in connexion with its system of education. But in the early history of the Society he was one of its active promoters, and he was the last survivor of those who addressed its first Anniversary Meeting in 1830.

On the 14th of March, Alexander Christie, Esq., after a brief illness quietly fell asleep in Jesus. He had been for many years a most faithful member of the Board, and for the last four had been its Minute Secretary, in which office his characteristic exactness had been of great value. Less than a week after Mr. Christie's death the Very Reverend Dean Grasett died at the old Rectory, where he had lived during his long and useful manhood. He was the Society's Senior Vice President, having been elected to that office forty-four years ago. He was also the Senior Pastor of the City, having ministered at St. James for nearly half a century. During the whole of this time he shewed a warm interest in the work of the Society, and always set an example to his flock by never being absent from its Anniversary Meetings when he could be present. He believed that, though they might not hear any startling novelty at these meetings, it was a good thing for Christians to manifest in the eyes of the world their unity and love for the truth by these annual rallyings around "the

common standard of their faith." In less than a week after the death of the Dean the Society's veteran Colporteur, Mr. John Lowry, had quietly left this scene of labour and gone to his eternal rest. Probably there have been few men, in any part of the world, who have spent long lives so entirely in the circulation of God's written Word, and few whose thoughts and prayers have been so full of the interests of the Bible Society in every branch of its world-wide work. His position was humble in the eyes of the world; but the stedfastness and faithfulness with which he fulfilled its arduous duties caused him to be highly esteemed by the Board and by all understanding the man and the realities of the glorious work in which he was engaged. The Society has also, during the year, lost old and valuable friends in different parts of its field. Among these was the Revd. J. G. Macgregor, President of the Elora Branch, who, for thirty years, had rarely been absent from a business meeting of his committee. The death, too, in London (Eng.), during last month, of the Rev. Dr. Gervase Smith—an intimate personal friend of Revds. Dr. Punshon and Dr. Ryerson, and an ardent lover of the Bible Society in England and Canada—is much to be deplored. These three beloved friends have gone home almost together, for they passed away within the Society's year. Such a death roll of notable names, and devoted labourers in the cause of the Bible, is a remarkable fact in the year's history of the Society.

But while so many of God's servants are thus being taken to their rest, His work devolves upon those who remain, and must go on. The Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society desire to give a brief but faithful report of that part of it for which they are responsible. The total income of the Society during its financial year just closed, has been \$28,852, shewing a decrease of \$321 as compared with the previous year; and the total number of issues 31,887, being 447 copies less than in the preceding twelve months. At first sight it is somewhat disappointing to find a decrease, however small, both in the total income and in the number of issues. But when the different items are examined it is found that there is really cause for encouragement. The decrease in the number of issues is not nearly as great as might have been expected, considering the remarkable demand for the revised version of the New Testament. The falling off in total income is more than accounted for by the fact that money received in the shape of donations and bequests has been \$950 less than in 1880-81. The larger donations which have come in have been in sums of \$50 each from Mr. John Black, of Blenheim, and Mr. John Newton, of Tweed. The bequests have been \$300 from the late Miss Allison McNab, of Rockwood, \$50 from the late Mr. A. T. McCord, and \$50 from the late Miss Foote, of Etobicoke, the last named sum being a second payment from Miss Foote's estate. A bequest from the late Mr. James McBride, of Brampton, amounting, with interest, to \$226, has been received since the closing of the accounts, and is not included in the above comparison of figures. The payment of this bequest had been very unjustly withheld by the executor, contrary to the wishes of the heirs, whom the Directors would here thank for their evident good will in the matter. But donations and bequests are always a fluctuating source of income. It is therefore, satisfactory to find that there has been an encouraging increase of \$1350 in the ordinary free contributions to the Bible cause. These free will-offerings of the people are not only the chief means upon which the Society relies for the prosecution of its work, but they are the best index of the desire felt by the people connected with our Auxiliary generally for the dissemination of God's Word.

BRANCHES.

New Branches have been organized at Bruce Mines, Comber, Corinth,

Glamis, Langton, Newark, Rainham Centre, Stoney Creek, Walsingham Centre, Waterloo, Windham Centre, and Wroxeter; and Depositories have been opened also at Coldwater, Fort William, Lion's Head, Michael's Bay, Morris, Sheguindah, and Silver Islet. On the other hand five Branches and one Depository have been struck off the list and one Branch has been reduced to the status of a Depository, making 405 Branches and 15 Depositories now effective on our list.

The Directors are glad to report that an increasing number of Branches are forming Sub-Branches, or holding meetings in surrounding villages, or are at least endeavouring to canvass more thoroughly the outlying portions of their fields. It is true that no great results from this are yet apparent; but the Board is satisfied that if this plan continue to be developed to any extent, the benefits will be very manifest in a few years. As an illustration of the healthful character of this feature of the work, the Secretary of one of these Branches mentions the case of a gentleman on his Committee, who formerly contributed but two dollars but who now gives five, because his knowledge of the work of the Society has been increased and his interest in it has been stimulated whilst helping to carry on these meetings. The Directors have been informed that the Committee of the Guelph Branch have held eight or ten such meetings; and Uxbridge, Clinton, and Paisley have also been reported as having made special efforts to cultivate the outlying portions of their fields. The Directors regret to report that each year there are some Branches which make no remittance whatever to the funds of the Society. The chief cause of this extraordinary neglect is the unwise manner in which office-bearers of Branches are sometimes chosen. Sometimes a Secretary is elected who has never been consulted on the subject, and who is entirely unwilling to undertake the work. Not only should so important a matter as the nomination of an efficient Secretary be arranged beforehand; but the Collectors should be appointed and notified of their appointment some time before the Agent's visit, so that they might have an abundance of time to aid in helping to secure a good attendance at the meetings, and be ready to prosecute their work immediately after the meetings—thus "striking the iron while it is hot."

AGENCY.

In September the Board sent out a circular to eighty-nine of the stronger Branches asking them do their work for the year without the help of an Agent, providing they felt confident that they could do so without disadvantage to the interests of the Bible cause. Thirty-three Branches undertook to do so. With one exception, these thirty-three Branches have made returns, which on the whole are satisfactory; although two or three of them would probably have done better had they been visited by an Agent. Hamilton has sent a larger free contribution than in any former year.

The visitation of the other Branches was assigned to the Permanent Agent and to eighteen Provisional Agents. For various reasons some of these gentlemen were late in finishing their work. The Board considers that this is generally detrimental to the Bible cause, as lengthened experience makes it more and more evident that in most places the month of October is the best time for visitation, and that whatever cannot be accomplished then is best done in January or the first half of February. Such an exceptional winter as the past has been especially disappointing to those who had delayed their work in hopes of good sleighing. This is referred to by several of the Agents, and some of the Branches ascribe to the same cause the want of more success on the part of their collectors.

In one respect there has been evident a very marked and general improvement. The Agents appear to have had much less reason than in former

years to complain of supineness on the part of officers of Branches, and some of them have been able to report that in their sections all their communications have received prompt answers, and their meetings have been well announced. There have, however, been some very provoking cases of trouble and expense caused by want of reasonable attention to duty on the part of Branch Secretaries; and there have been a few amusing and refreshing incidents, where an energetic Agent has been determined to succeed in spite of indifference or lack of courage in the local officials.

The Directors have been somewhat disappointed in the results of both agency and colportage operations in Manitoba; but they hope that arrangements will soon be made, which will prove more effective. In the meantime Mr. McPherson has offered to continue to look after the Society's interests in his part of the field gratuitously; and the Directors are glad to have a representative who has always shown such a real zeal for the Bible cause. In British Columbia the Directors are satisfied that, notwithstanding some expressions of disappointment in his letters, the Rev. Mr. Jamieson is doing good service, which he has liberally rendered gratuitously to the Society, whose affairs in that Province he has brought into a more hopeful state than they have been for some years.

In last year's report reference was made to the necessity of gaining and retaining the interest of the young in the work of the Bible Society. In accordance with the policy there intimated a circular was sent to thirty-four of the larger Branches, pointing out the importance of this matter, asking them to get up special meetings for the purpose, and undertaking to send a suitable Agent to address them. This work was assigned to the Rev. Mr. Botterill, who has proved himself very efficient, and whose praise has come to us from the officers of more than one Branch. Fifteen of the Branches answered the circular favourably, some expressing themselves as greatly pleased with the proposal. In one place the arrangements miscarried; in two the meetings were rather small; but in all the others they were decided successes. But these mere figures give a very bald idea of the result of this effort to enlist the sympathies of the children of our land in the work of the Society. In fact it is one of those efforts from which we expect the most important results in the future. But for some conception of the enthusiasm which appears to have been awakened in some places we must refer to the extracts from Mr. Botterill's report, which will be found with those of other Agents. The Directors therefore strongly recommend that further efforts be made in this direction in the coming year.

Considering that the simple but grand object of the Society is the circulation of God's Word, considering that it is always ready to do everything in its power to help those engaged in Sunday-school work, and moreover that it must tend to the spiritual good of the children themselves to become interested in such a work, the Directors feel that they may reasonably expect Superintendents and Teachers to do what they can to promote the meetings held for this purpose. They can also help to awaken an interest in Bible Society work among their children by promoting the circulation of the "Gleanings for the Young," the price of which has been reduced within the last few months, and is now probably the cheapest of juvenile periodicals, considering its beauty and excellence.*

* The "Gleanings for the Young" is a beautifully illustrated little monthly magazine issued by the Parent Society, containing such Bible Society news as is interesting to the young. It is now supplied by Mr. Young, the Society's Depositary, at \$1.50 per dozen copies per annum, postage paid, or single copies at the rate of 25 cents per annum.

In addition to the above contributions from Branches, the Board has granted \$500 to the Quebec Auxiliary, for work among the French Canadians of that Province.

DISTRIBUTION.

The number of Bibles, Testaments, and portions which have been issued from the Society's House during the year is 31,887, being 447 copies less than during the previous twelve months.

Of the above 2,512 copies were sold, and 1,029 issued gratuitously from the Toronto Depository; 23,195 were supplied to Branch Depositories, or sold to the trade; and 5,151 were issued to colporteurs. Of these 1,908 were in foreign languages, and six in raised characters for the blind. The larger issues in foreign languages are chiefly in stock supplied to Branches in British Columbia.

The total issues of the Society since its commencement is 1,179,105.

COLPORTAGE.

The total distribution of Scriptures by the Society's Colporteurs during the year, has been 5,218 copies, being 404 less than in the preceding twelve months. This at first sight may appear slightly disappointing. But when it is considered that this decrease is not quite eight per cent., whilst the aggregate time spent by the men in the work has been twenty-eight per cent. less, and the cost about twenty per cent. less, it will be seen that there is real cause for encouragement.

In addition to the above the colporteurs of the Tract Society have sold 821 Bibles and 394 Testaments of this Society's stock, so that during the year there have been distributed by this instrumentality 6,433 copies or portions of the Holy Scriptures.

Reference has already been made to the loss sustained by the Society in the death of its old and faithful colporteur, Mr. John Lowry. But when we look back on his work, we cannot but praise God for such a life; a long life spent in good service. Mr. Lowry had been for fifty-two years engaged more or less directly in the dissemination of God's Word; from 1830 to 1853 as a Scripture reader in Ireland, from 1853 to 1855 as a colporteur of this

Society, then as a city missionary in Hamilton, until 1863, when he re-entered the service of this Society, in which he continued to the day of his death. It is only within the last few years that any of the Society's colporteurs have equalled him in the amount of labour and the number of sales effected month by month; and even in his old age the amount of work he did was very remarkable. During the last year he had been working in the Counties of Elgin and Kent, and to a small extent in Toronto and Yorkville.

Mr. Badger has worked two months in the past winter for the Society, one among the lumbering shanties in the northern part of Muskoka, where he met with encouraging success, and one in the district where most suffering had been caused by the bush fires of last autumn. He had instructions to be free in his gratuitous distribution, and many of the people expressed their gratitude to the Society for sending him among them.

Mr. Taylor visited a number of the Agricultural Fairs, with his usual success and has since been working in the County of Wellington, where he has sold a great number of copies.

Mr. Jackson entered the Society's service in November. He has been working in the County of Huron, and has already proved himself an efficient colporteur.

Mr. Ness has been labouring for two months in the County of Haldimand. He has been faithful and zealous, and the Board expects him to become a very valuable colporteur.

Mr. David Armstrong was engaged by the Rev. Mr. Jamieson, in British Columbia. He proved himself both zealous and wise; but his physical strength was not equal to the arduous labour of colportage, and after about a month's work he had to give it up. In that month he circulated one hundred and forty-two copies. Five of these were Chinese Testaments, and some were French, German and English Bibles sold to Roman Catholics. Mr. Jamieson has not yet been able to get a suitable man to take Mr. Armstrong's place; but he hopes to get some good colportage done during the coming summer in the coal mining district around Nanaimo, and at the railroad works above Yale.

It was with much difficulty that a suitable colporteur was found to succeed Mr. Rouleau in Manitoba, able to speak both French and English. Having at last secured the services of Mr. A. P. Blouin, the Board sent him up and he began his work in the beginning of August. After four months of variable, but fair success, he left the Society's service at the close of November, with the consent of the Committee at Winnipeg, under whose superintendence he had been placed. The Directors were much disappointed when they were notified of this, and they have not yet been able to ascertain whether Mr. Blouin is ready to resume the work when desired. As before intimated, however, they hope that in the coming year better arrangements will be made for both agency and colportage in that Province.

In the course of the past year the Permanent Agent was sent to visit the Branches and inspect the Depositories in Algoma and Manitoulin, and also to report upon the need of colportage in that part of the Society's field. Guided by his report and the valuable advice of Mr. Ansley, the Secretary of the Parry Sound Branch, the Directors have made arrangements for Mr. Taylor to work at colportage in that region during the coming summer.

The extracts from the colporteurs' reports will be found on page 28.

SISTER SOCIETIES.

Not having received the reports of some of the Sister Societies in the Dominion, the Directors can only express their trust that they are prospering in their work. From a letter recently received from the Rev. R. Gavin, Sec-

retary of the Ottawa Bible Society, we learn that they have had five colporteurs working for two months in the past winter among the lumbermen in the bush. They met with a good deal of encouragement, and found some of the men eager to have the Scriptures read. They sold, altogether, 1,544 copies. The friends at Ottawa appear also to be cheered in the other branches of their Society's work.

The work of the Montreal Bible Society is encouraging, for though, like ourselves, they have to report a decrease in the total number of their issues, caused by the publication of the Revised Version of the New Testament, there has been an increase in their issues of Scriptures in the French language, and the general result of the labours of their French colporteurs are regarded as more satisfactory than in any former year. The Committee had also received testimony of the usefulness of the publication of the four Gospels in the Iroquois language. The Rev. J. A. Dorion, the active missionary among the Indians at Oka, reports: "The Iroquois version of the Gospels is rendering great service to our mission, and it was greatly wanted here."

From the Report of the Quebec Bible Society it is evident that at times our brethren there feel somewhat discouraged and disheartened by the many and great difficulties with which they have to contend, and which we in this favoured Protestant Province very partially realize. Still they keep battling bravely on, and they are able to report that in many places a strong spirit of inquiry seems to have been awakened, and that an anxious desire is more often manifested to possess the Word of God. They also report that they have had better returns than ever from their work among the French, and appear much pleased with the zeal and energy of their colporteur, Mr. Fresque. The Committee express in the report very hearty thanks for the support received from this Society, without which they say they would not be able to carry on this work.

The report of our great neighbour, the American Bible Society, has not yet been published; but the Revd. Dr. Gilman has courteously forwarded some of the proof sheets, from which we gather that their receipts from sales have also been decreased by the publication of the revised version of the New Testament. There are several interesting items in reference to several important translations and revisions which are being made either entirely or partly at the expense of the American Society. Special reference is made to the progress of the translation of the Scriptures into Japanese, in which the American Society bears the chief part; but shares it with our Parent Society and the National Society of Scotland. Special satisfaction is expressed at the completion of the Zulu version of the Bible, after the decease of several missionaries who had contributed to it. This version is needed for the evangelization of a large number of tribes in Southern Africa.

The report of the National Bible Society of Scotland, is both interesting and encouraging. In one part of it the Committee, in referring to our Parent Society, say "they rejoice in the growing intimacy and mutual consideration, in which the two Societies continue to labour for the great object both have at heart."

Amid the sore political troubles of Ireland, the Hibernian Bible Society had not relaxed its efforts, but was able to report a circulation of 68,108 copies of the Scriptures. Our Parent Society is co-operating with it in promoting a revision of Archbishop Daniel's version of the Irish Testament.

PARENT SOCIETY.

The last report of our great parent, the British and Foreign Bible Society, begins with the following remarks:—

The responsibility of preparing a Report like the present is great. To the

Members of the Society it is due that an adequate account should be rendered of the funds entrusted by them to the Committee. If those funds had been contributed with the shallow idea that the world's ills were to be cured by the distribution over its surface of an infinite number of books, it might be a sufficient discharge of duty to announce the circulation of so many millions of copies. But if the aim of the subscribers reaches far beyond this; if they value the numerical only in so far as they have ground for believing that the Divine Spirit illumines the minds of the readers, and that men, by obeying the Truth, are lifted to a new life of faith, hope and charity, then they will be satisfied only with a report which shows that such spiritual results are being attained, or, since results lie at the disposal of the Supreme, that the methods adopted are likely to produce them. If the methods be approved, then the statistics will be received with confidence, not misgiving.

No single Society again can assume to undertake more than a department of the great work of winning the world for Christ; and hence it would ill become your Committee to speak of their labours as though others were not actively engaged in the same field. Candour and modesty are virtues for societies as well as individuals, and the former are bound not less than the latter to do nothing through strife or vain-glory but in honour to prefer one another.

What, moreover, of those who are engaged in doing the Bible work which you support? What of those at home who go from place to place, enlisting old and young, and Christians of every name, in the diffusion of God's Word, and of those abroad who spend their strength far from the touch of sympathy and the word of encouragement, to whom the sole return of public acknowledgment that can be made by their brethren is an appreciative reference in the Annual Report? Where a Society sends out labourers like these, it comes under obligation to them to give a fair account of their efforts.

While admitting then the claims of brevity, brevity is not the highest recommendation of a report. If the work to be described be poor and superficial, the shorter the account of it the better; but if it represents a vast amount of self-denial directed to the noblest end, it may be as impossible to do justice to it briefly as it would be to paint the varied landscape in an hour.

The report goes on to give a most interesting account of the Society's operations during the year, of which the following extracts will serve to give an outline:—

The Free Income of the Society during the year had been £114,382, or nearly £4,000 more than in 1879; and this increase was the more gratifying as it was found in the more regular sources of support rather than the more uncertain. But inasmuch as certain special funds had been closed, and the payments for Scriptures sold had, in consequence of a check in the Continental circulation, declined from £99,000 to £95,015, the receipts from all sources amounted to £209,519, as compared with £213,000 reported twelve months before.

The expenditure, however, had been kept inside the income. Under the pressure of the period of scarcity, 1876-8, the Committee made every effort to reduce expenditure; and thus an annual outlay of about £225,000 was brought down last year to £193,000. The result was that it was announced last May that "the equilibrium between income and expenditure had been restored." Still it was not deemed prudent at once to shake the reefs out of the sail, lest some new blast of reverse should blow; and hence the expenditure for the year had been only £190,043.

But as the months passed by, and it became apparent that there would be a balance on the right side, the Committee felt themselves able to revert to the old prices upon some of the Continental Scriptures which had been

raised, and also to contemplate the undertaking of new work. After allowing for the expenses of the recently established agencies in Persia and Japan, which are only beginning to be felt, inquiries are being made with a view if practicable, to the formation of a distinct agency for Siberia, and another for North Africa ; while a Sub-Committee has been appointed to consider in what way the Society's rapidly increasing work in China may best be guided and developed.

The issues of Bibles, New Testaments and Portions for the year have been 2,846,029, being an increase of 65,000 copies, and making a total since the formation of the Society of 91,014,448 copies.

The Report refers to the death of the Rev. Mr. Davies, the Society's beloved representative at Berlin. The qualifications he possessed were extraordinary. The colporteurs honoured him as one who walked with God and inspired them with pure and cheering motives. His administrative powers were accompanied by a winning address, by ease and clearness in conversation, and by scholarly habits of mind. Through his marriage with a German lady of high family and of character like his own, he possessed an influence in German Society that is given to few Englishmen.

On April 28th, the members of the Committee had had the happiness of joining with Lord Shaftesbury's many friends in congratulating him upon the completion of his eightieth year. On the behalf of the Society to which he has rendered unnumbered services during the thirty years he had held office as its President, they have presented his Lordship a Bible, which may serve to remind him and his family of the honour and affection in which he is held in their midst.

PROGRESS IN THE WORK OF TRANSLATION AND REVISION.

Translations and Revisions were being advanced by the help of the Society with various degrees of progress in the following languages and dialects :— Afghan, Albanian Tosk, Amoy-Colloquial, Ararat Armenian, Bogos, Calmuc, Canton-Colloquial, Chipewyan, Chumba, Eskimo, Flemish, Greek (Modern), Haussa, Hebrew (New Testament), Irish, Italian, Japanese, Kazan-Tartar, Kinyika, Kumikian, Malagasy, Marathi, Mongolian, Niuean, Peruvian, Persian, Portuguese, Quichuan, Roumanian, Russ, Santali, Sesuto, Sindhi, Slave, Slovenian, Swahili, Swedish-Lapp, Tchuvash, Telugu, Tibetan, Transcaucasian-Turkish, Wogul, Wotjak, Yahgan and Yoruba.

There is not space here to give many interesting items connected with the progress of these translations and the people for whom they are intended ; but we cannot omit the following extract in reference to the Hebrew New Testament.

Dr. Delitzsch hopes to have his fourth edition of the New Testament completed by Michaelmas. The printing goes on slowly, owing to the extraordinary care taken to have the edition not only faultless, but as perfect an expression of the original as possible. The text of this edition is being stereotyped, and will be the standard version of the Hebrew New Testament.

When Dr. Delitzsch has examined all the suggestions submitted to him by eminent Hebraists throughout the world he sends his copy to the press. The first proof is read by a Hebrew scholar on the Rhine, and is then passed on to Dr. Delitzsch, who also reads it and returns it to the printer. The second revise is read by the scholar on the Rhine, and by Dr. Delitzsch as before. The third is read by Mr. Driver, of New College, Oxford, and by him is sent back to Dr. Delitzsch, who examines all Mr. Driver's suggestions and corrections before marking it "for press." The Committee of this Society, and the entire Christian Church, are deeply indebted to Dr. Delitzsch

for the manner in which he is trying to pay back the Christians' obligation to the Jews for the faithful preservation and transmission of the Hebrew Bible.

FRANCE.

Although France turns away with impatience from the teaching of the priests, she is not at heart opposed to religion. The journal recently started in Paris under the title *Ni Dieu ni Maître* found few readers, and soon disappeared; while, on the other hand, wherever the meetings of the Rev. R. W. McAll and his helpers are announced, crowds attend and drink in the good news. The Society's Agent, M. Monod, had found it well to detach colporteurs for the purpose of following up the impressions made at these meetings on working people who would never go to a book-shop or a pastor's house for a copy of the Scriptures. The Bible-classes, established as a link between the evangelistic services and the life of the churches, had been aided by the Committee with a large grant. Similar grants had been made to other workers in Paris. Of the eighty-six Departments of France, sixty-six had been visited during the year, by a staff of sixty-three colporteurs. Their influence is described in the following letter from a pastor in the Jura: "I have not yet mentioned our mission stations at S— and C—, which owe their existence to the passage through our district of your excellent colporteurs. They are chiefly intended for the scattered Protestants, but a number of Roman Catholics who received from him some good words, together with the Scriptures, attend the services. I feel myself much indebted to him." The circulation, 112,000 copies, would have been larger but for the eagerness of the people to get the new version of Segond. Although this version is incontestably superior in ability and clearness to those now in use, your Committee are not yet satisfied that some revision of important passages may not be needful before the Society can adopt it.

BELGIUM AND HOLLAND.

In Belgium, besides the work of the eight colporteurs supererintended by Mr. Kirkpatrick, some 70,000 Portions had been supplied at a considerable reduction to the Crystal Palace Bible stand for distribution at the Brussels Exhibition; and the Committee presented at Christmas a New Testament to every Sunday scholar in Belgium. This seemed a suitable way of taking part in the commemoration of National Independence; the path to the truest independence was indicated by the text inscribed in each volume, "The Truth shall make you free."

In Holland, notwithstanding ill-health, the Society's Agent and his six colporteurs had been doing bravely.

GERMANY.

The active brain that devised and perfected the machinery of the Society's work in Germany and Switzerland, and the warm heart that was its motive power, are at rest. The memory of Mr. Davies will be best cherished if the Society resolve not to relax its exertions for the land to whose highest interests his life was consecrated. To those who object that it is Protestant land, he replies in some of his latest words: "It is not so. One-third of its inhabitants are Romanists and Jews. But supposing it were, Romanist populations have a sort of cohesive bond without the Bible; . . . whereas, let the Bible once cease to be the book of our Protestant homes, and what remains to us? Let us not think lightly of work in our own and other Protestant lands. We are preventing the salt from losing its savour. The

day of judgment will reveal the good which Bible Societies have done, not only by aggressive action in superstitious or heathen lands, but by their conservative action in lands where, but for them, the Bible would practically have ceased to be the book of the people."

The dimensions of the Society's German work had suffered temporary curtailment from the measures rendered necessary by the financial deficiency of 1876-8. The staff of colporteurs were reduced to sixty, and the prices of several editions, though all still sold below the cost of production, were raised. Mr. Davies grieved over the effect this had on the circulation; and it was therefore a matter of thankfulness that on the occasion of his recent visit to London, the Committee were able completely to remove his burthen and make every modification he suggested. It is pleasant to know that during his last year he had been "struck with a great number of incidents in the journals of the colporteurs over which could be written the word *fruit*." One of the men had a discussion some time back with twenty or thirty fellow-passengers in a railway carriage. His bold, faithful words caused those who were on the Lord's side to avow themselves. "I will tell you," exclaimed one, "what this man with Bibles is like; he is an itinerant conscience, come to stir up our slumbering consciences." It was a winged word that hit off the character that should belong to every true colporteur. The "festal work" of the year was that done at the Dusseldorf Exhibition. Infected by Mr. Davies' sorrow that such an opportunity of doing good should be missed, the Society's friends in the town took up the project heartily. In the course of a few weeks 47,000 Portions were distributed, a sum of £130 was raised locally towards the expenses, and a blessing was felt to rest upon this, the joint enterprise of German and English Christians.

AUSTRIA.

The law relating to colportage in Austria is at present interpreted with great rigour, and hindrances of every kind are placed in the way of the fifty-seven men directed by Mr. Millard. Thus in Moravia and Bohemia they may only show samples and take orders; every book ordered must be sent direct from the depot, which may be miles away! In Bosnia permission had at last been given for the employment of one colporteur, but only one; while in the Tyrol the licences are absolutely refused. Nevertheless the men hold on courageously; and in some districts a spirit of inquiry is being aroused among the people which refuses to be baffled by difficulties. Especially is this the case in Bohemia, where 9,000 copies have been sold, and the opposition of the priests has tended only to prosper the work. Another sign of good is found in the fact that, whereas formerly colporteurs had to be sought from abroad, the Society's Agent now finds all he needs in Austria itself—men who for the most part were Roman Catholics, and not a few of whom owe their conversion to the teaching of the Holy Spirit attending the simple reading of the Scriptures. During the earthquakes at Agram one of their number remained at his post, and has since given Bibles to those who had suffered loss. A similar distribution has since been made in the Island of Chios. Finding that books granted to the prisons of Hungary rarely went beyond the chaplain's room, the Agent had in twenty-eight cases gained access to the prisoners, and, by getting them to pay a small portion of the cost, has secured their interest in the books, 900 Bibles and Testaments having thus found owners. Three colporteurs had been employed in Vienna. Their work had been steady, and, though scoffers abound, the jeers are not seldom to be construed as compliments, as, where a gentleman exclaimed, "Well, to be sure, there is that unhappy Bible Society again. Where in:

the world can a man go and not find these enthusiasts at work?" The total circulation of the Agency has been 104,139 copies.

ITALY.

One evening last winter one of the Society's colporteurs in Italy came to a village and was making for the inn, when he saw a group of people at the door of a house. Inquiring what was the matter, he was directed upstairs. On entering the room he found a woman evidently at the point of death, and a priest asleep at the bedside. He roused the latter, reminding him that the time was precious. This is not an incident alone, but a parable. Italy herself is in sore case; the priests are in attendance on her, but they sleep, and others must come in and point the way to God. Under Mr. Bruce, the Agent at Rome who has since gone to his eternal rest, forty colporteurs had been at work, from the villages of Venetia to the unsettled parts of Sicily. The circulation, which was 50,000 in 1878, had risen this year to 59,000.

SPAIN AND PORTUGAL.

The establishment in Spain of a new Ministry, in which the Portfolio of Grace and Justice is held by one who has before now befriended the Society, had given new hope to the Society's representative, Mr. Corfield; and already the law relating to religious manifestations is being construed in a sense which, as it is grandly expressed, shall "render homage to the inviolable rights of the human conscience." The sale of 30,000 copies, chiefly through the persevering labours of twenty-three colporteurs, was an advance upon the year preceding; and as every new appointment of the local magistrates is for the better, there is a prospect, by the Divine blessing, for further increase.

The priests in the more remote parts of Portugal fear two things—the railway and the Bible. The former opens their parishes to the breath of the outer world, and breaks the bondage of their people. Said a priest, as he watched a line being made, "Flee, my men, it is the devil's work;" and not less vehement is his denunciation of the colporteur. But as the country folk live to see the priest travelling in the very train he once cursed, they go on to conclude that the other object of his rage must be good too; and so the Bible finds unconscious or unwilling allies. In Portugal, Madeira and the Azores nine colporteurs had been employed under the Rev. Robert Stewart, who reported a circulation of 9205.

DENMARK, NORWAY, AND SWEDEN.

A quarter of a century ago, when the Society's work in Denmark began, a circulation of from three to four thousand copies by the native Bible Society seemed to satisfy all wants. It is an example of how the desire for the Scriptures grows with the supply, that now the Society's issue from Copenhagen are more than 35,000 a year. For a pocket Bible which the Society is preparing, 7000 orders have been received from persons, many of whom derived benefit from the religious services conducted by Mr. Reginald Radcliffe. Your Agent, the Rev. J. Plenge, has extended his efforts during the year to the Faro Islands.

Good work continues to be done by your Agency Committees in Norway; and in the sister kingdom of Sweden the duties so long and faithfully discharged by the late Dr. Rohtlieb, have been undertaken by the Rev. R. H. Weakley, whose services on the Turkish Revision of the Scriptures are well known. The Queen of Sweden, when in England, had shewn her interest

in the Society by qualifying herself as a Life Member, and desiring that its Reports should be regularly sent to her.

RUSSIA.

The three agencies between which the Society's work in Russia is at present divided had a joint circulation of 275,000 copies, in a great variety of languages. The agents at St. Petersburg, Odessa, and Tiflis are devoted and able, and their reports abound in features of interest. In parts of the Empire where distress had prevailed, where many had died of hunger, and peasants had been dragging ropes over the standing grain to keep off swarms of destructive beetles, the Word of God had been made welcome, and mothers had come to buy Gospels for their children when they had scarce money to buy bread. The spread of education is rapidly adding to the number of readers in Russia, and even now at the Nijny fair a colporteur is able in a few weeks to sell 8000 copies. For some years it has been felt that justice could not be done to the territory of Siberia by continuing to treat it as an appendage of European Russia. The advance of railways, coupled with the splendid river system, is fast opening up the country; and the Committee were anxious to find an Agent qualified for this distant charge, who could be sent out as the connecting link between the Bible work of the West and the East.

TURKEY AND PERSIA.

The soil in Turkey is not so barren as many suppose. Though parts are in a lawless condition that checks all Christian efforts, and recently cost one of the colporteurs his life, yet a larger number of Scriptures had been sold during the year, and the 1088^l. paid for them by the people is no inconsiderable token of interest. Of the various nationalities, the Turks are reported as the most ready to listen to the claims of the Bible, ready often to buy where others only dispute, and not seldom expressing wonder at the opposition of so-called Christians to their sacred books. The Society's Sub-Agent in Cyprus has sold 2500 copies, helped by most of the clergy of the island. Indeed, to oppose Mr. Back seems to be a serious matter. On one occasion, when the village priest asserted his books to be false, he threatened an action for libel, and so alarmed the priest that the charge was immediately withdrawn. In Greece the modern Greek version is still excluded from the public schools. Dr. Thomson fails to perceive any progress in the Greek Church; it is to those who have separated from it that he can alone look for a beginning of better things. The issues in Palestine had been increased in consequence of a Bible tour taken in the Hauran by the Rev. F. Bellamy, and by a distribution made at Jerusalem by Miss Beamish among the Eastern Pilgrims.

Mr. Bruce's time had been given largely to the revision of the Persian Scriptures, but he had made a long journey to Bagdad for the purpose of establishing a Depot and installing colporteurs; and along the route he found, with characteristic zeal, many opportunities of usefulness.

AFRICA.

Dr. Livingstone used to say of Africa, "When the geographical problem is solved, we shall be only on the threshold of the Christian enterprise." So much light is being thrown by travellers on the Dark Continent, that the charm of mystery will soon be gone; but for the Christian the charm will only increase as new tribes are discovered, their habits of mind and religious ideas studied, and the gospel brought to them in their own tongues. The

Society must here act as minister to the missions that boldly strike into the interior, and take up the translations they make, so that no time may be lost for lack of material. Some versions, like the Yoruba, Sesuto, and Sechuana, are completed; others, like the Swahili and Yao, are in progress; while others, such as the Ruganda, are yet to follow.

INDIA.

The auxiliaries in India and Ceylon report a growing disposition on the part of the people to purchase and read the Scriptures, and an increase in the contributions of the native churches. Last year in the Madras Presidency, the Bible was introduced into forty-one schools, conducted by non-Christian teachers; and in the Telugu country, one missionary speaks to his knowledge of a dozen cases of conversion through the reading of the Scriptures. More than a hundred colporteurs were employed under missionary superintendents, and the aggregate circulation had been 210,000.

CHINA.

The very solidity of character that makes the Chinese hard to win, renders them the more valuable converts when won. The indications drawn from Bible work are of an encouraging nature. When a single missionary sells on one tour 11,000 books, when the Peking colporteurs at local fairs sell nearly half of that number, and when accounts of steady success and of earnest inquirers come from many parts, there is every motive for pressing boldly forward. Cheered by a donation of 1500*l.* for colportage in China, the Committee had instructed their agent, Mr. Dyer, to extend the arrangement with the China Inland Mission so far as to engage the services in part of twelve missionaries for tours of Bible distribution. Arrangements had been made for work in almost every province in China; and a proposal was under consideration to send into the Southern provinces, on the borders of Annam, two missionaries to study the peculiar dialect there spoken, and prepare themselves for doing Bible work. The circulation in China had been 146,000 copies.

JAPAN.

With a view to that more vigorous action in Japan that seemed due alike to the claims of the country and to the British missionaries in the field, the Committee had sent out during the year an Agent, the Rev. I. J. Taylor, who has had experience of mission-work in India. In the reports sent home of the five native colporteurs employed there was ground for encouragement. One of these says: "In the four counties through which I have travelled, I was never greeted with one word of insult or abuse." The Committee at Tokio add that contracts for printing the Christian Scriptures can now be made at the Government printing-offices, and observe that "such facts show how the whole country is now open for the circulation of the Word of God." The New Testament in Japanese has been completed during the year, and the standard or authorised edition published by a committee representing the missionaries on behalf of the three Bible Societies—viz., the American Bible Society, the National Bible Society of Scotland, and our Parent Society.

SOUTH SEA ISLANDS AND SOUTH AMERICA.

The peoples of the South Seas show a thirst after the Word of God that must rejoice the heart of all Christian men; the willingness of the dwellers in the New Hebrides, and the other groups, to pay the full value of the edi-

tions prepared for them, is a striking evidence of the spirit of self-reliance inculcated by their missionary teachers. In South America aggressive work was being done by the Valparaiso Bible Society, aided by our Parent Society. The translation of one of the Gospels for the Yahgans of Tierra del Fuego had been printed. The Society's Agent for the Argentine Republic, the Rev. F. N. Lett, had been penetrating with his seven colporteurs into the heart of the southern part of the great continent; the sales had been 5691 copies. The Brazil Agency, under the care of Joas dos Santos, of Rio de Janeiro, had employed five colporteurs; the year's circulation had been 8399 copies.

The report closes with the following paragraph:—"The night cometh" with rest and grateful shade to those who have borne the heat of the day, with solemn close of opportunity to those who might, like their Master, be working the works of Him that sent them. Yet in a deeper sense it is light that is coming, not darkness; "the night is far spent, the day is at hand," when the Word of Him with whom is no darkness at all shall be more widely read, shall be better understood, shall be unreservedly obeyed; when the truth shall be done and spoken in love; when the Cross of Christ shall be the meeting-place of merchant, scholar, and artizan; and when He shall see of the travail of His soul, who came, the Lamb of God, to take away the sin of the world.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion the Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society would express their praise to God for His servants who have departed this life in His faith and fear, and their hope that all connected with the Society may have grace to be followers of their good examples, especially in seeking to disseminate the incorruptible seed of God's Word, that with them they may be partakers of His heavenly kingdom through our Lord Jesus Christ.

EXTRACTS FROM AGENTS' REPORTS.

Rev. E. M. C. BOTTERILL,—*Port Hope*.—Here the Secretary poured his heart's love and strength into the work, and therefore, although the evening was very unfavourable, we had a glorious meeting. Dr. O'Meara, one of the warmest friends of children I have ever met, presided over our gathering, and prepared the way thoroughly for your Agent. I was very much amused on the following morning by overhearing, all unnoticed, a brisk conversation among some large boys about the gathering of the previous evening, and especially at the unanimous verdict expressed by one in language forcible, if inelegant—" 'Twas a 'boss' meeting." Port Hope gladly acknowledged that the assistance that meeting had rendered would be felt for a long time. Your Agent had by this time grown familiar with incredulous head shaking, passing into sunny smiles, and these into hearty congratulations, so that he rather enjoyed meeting those who were doubtful and ready to halt. The children's hearts and hands are ours for seeking, and by such early associations with them, our society will be recognised in years to come, not as an interference with any church, but as the joyful, generous friend of every worker for Jesus in the world.

East Westminster.—When I left the train at Wilton Grove, I confess to the presence of a good deal of fear. A church and three or four farm houses was all I could see. However, I hid my fear away in my heart and spoke hopefully of past gatherings. Our old friend, President Fleming, charmed with the idea of our Society taking root in the affections of the children, evidently had prayed for and was expecting a large gathering; and the young people came miles some of them to hear and give. The happy faces of the young folks was not the least attractive part of that church scene. The night was one of those very memorable ones in a history which makes one glad to be a co-worker with God in any undertaking.

Beverley.—After a walk of eleven miles I reached this village of Kirkwall, where the annual meeting was to be held. I found the largest congregation of young people I had met in my visitation, all waiting to enlist themselves under our banner. The Rev. Mr. Thynne very efficiently presided, and in a few well chosen words drew the meeting in sympathy very near to your Agent. I was glad to carry over to our ranks so many of the warm-hearted, energetic young men and maidens to our holy work. I predict for Beverley Branch a long life of increasing strength. None rejoiced more in the new departure in Bible Society work than the fathers who are just passing home.

Fergus.—No Bible S. Branch has a grander Secretary than A. D. Fordyce, Esq. He is likely to fulfil that Scripture which declares "that the child shall die a hundred years old," for he grows younger with the years. He from a hand press prepared slips for the meeting, and by a zeal that was untiring, he did much towards filling the largest Presbyterian Church in the town. Ours was a grand meeting.

St. Catharines.—Our gathering, though postponed once, was a red letter one in the history of Bible Society work. The energetic Secretary entered heartily into all the suggestions made by your Agent, and drew to the Baptist Church an eager crowd.

Cooksville.—Too much praise can scarcely be given to the Society's steadfast friend, James Galbraith, Esq. Cooksville Branch, with its official staff, will, in a little while, be, as in days past, a tower of strength to us.

Erin.—The officers of Erin Branch are choice men, who have a contagious zeal and consecration about them. They deserve well of the parent Society. The President of the Branch, Rev. Mr. Fowlie, of the Canada Presbyterian Church, inspired the meeting with his own intense admiration for our Society and his confidence in all its operations. Erin Branch is strong, healthy and aggressive.

Scarborough.—This purely rural district gave us a gathering that would have rejoiced any heart. St. Andrew's Church was filled from 2 to 4.30 p.m. The Rev. Mr. Middleton (Methodist) presided, and being heartily at one with our new work, gave me great assistance. Your Agent received a hearty vote of thanks and an earnest request to come next year. Among the happiest friends of our Society was father Thomson, an old Christian of eighty years.

Yorkville.—Great praise is due to the untiring devotion of Rev. Mr. Wariner and the executive at Yorkville. One incident in connection with our meeting deserves more than passing notice. The young people of Bloor St. Methodist Church were prevented from being present at our gathering, but sent to the meeting a liberal collection. All honour to the pastor, superintendant and school, who, though absent from our meeting, gave, and gave liberally, towards the painful pressing need of the unchristianized mass around us. All I can say personally is, that in the whole of my public life I have never done work that has so richly compensated me as this. I have never spoken under circumstances of such intense pleasure before, and if I have served you, and through you, Him to whom I owe everything, my joy is full.

The Rev. JAS. CARMICHAEL,—*Collingwood.*—Was the next point, Nov. 2nd. A good meeting, though small. Several of the ministers of the place were present—the president, Rev. R. Rodgers in the chair. On Saturday your agent returned to Collingwood and preached there, and in Nottawa and Dunroon on the Sabbath, driving about twelve miles over roads not the cleanest in the world. Monday, the 7th Nov., drove to Stayner and held the meeting in the Presbyterian church. The local ministers of the Methodist, Baptist and Presbyterian churches were present. Meeting was lively, full of interest, giving promise of a good contribution to the Bible Society.

Craigvale and Victoria.—An excellent meeting. The Rev. Mr. MacConnell and Rev. Mr. Totten were present and rendered good services.

Painswick.—A very good meeting in the Canada Methodist church, with the pastor present. The field had been only partially canvassed last year, but they promise better things this year.

Rev. W. H. A. CLARIS,—*Langside.*—There is no rail or stage connection with this place, and as no horses were to be had at Kinlough, either to borrow or hire, I had to walk a number of miles through mud and slush. I found the president's house by 2 p.m. The meeting was good. The president conducted the meeting with much interest; all seemed to pay the best of attention to your agent's account of the work of the society. The collection also was good.

St. Helen's.—A seven miles ride through mud and storm brought me to this field. The branch here is well conducted and highly appreciated by the people in the community; meeting was small, owing to the storm and bad roads. The Rev. R. Leask presided; officers and collectors appointed; collection good.

Molesworth.—The meeting held in the Presbyterian church well attended. The Rev. Mr. Johnson presided, and greatly assisted in making the meeting

a success. The collection was somewhat better than last year. Everything speaks of thorough interest and good management. As usual the officers were appointed and collectors arranged for, &c. Depository in good condition.

Brussels.—Notwithstanding a dark and disagreeable night, we had an excellent meeting in the Presbyterian church. The ministers of the various churches were present, and all were ready to help in the good work. This branch is in many respects a model.

Rev. E. COCKBURN, —Garden Hill.—Here I was met at the railway station by Mr. James Gray, the energetic president of the branch. During the day rain had fallen copiously. The evening, though exceedingly dark and cloudy, was fair. I felt somewhat discouraged with the prospects, especially as it was my first meeting. You may imagine my surprise on my arrival at the church, when I saw between two and three hundred assembled to show their interest in the good cause. Many I was told had driven several miles through the mud and darkness that might be felt. Dr. Gilmour had been requested to preside at the public meeting and did so with marked ability. I had the assistance of the Rev. Mr. McCamus, who gave a short and excellent address. A pleasing feature which added not a little to the profit and enjoyment of the occasion was the presence of a union choir (the choirs of the Presbyterian and M. E. churches.) Their selections were most appropriate and rendered in a style that would have done credit to any city choir. Here the cause is popular. The president is a host in himself and much is due to his energy and zeal. The officers of the branch resolved to hold meetings at a number of points in various directions, to interest the people in the society, and appoint collectors in order that a larger number may have an opportunity to aid such a laudable enterprise.

Newtonville, Oct. 26th.—At the close of the meeting, the committee was called together and deputations were appointed consisting of the Rev. Messrs. Scott and Leslie, and a layman, to visit Kendal and Zion to hold meetings and appoint collectors. From what I know of the gentlemen who have undertaken this work, I look forward to a very marked increase in your receipts from this branch.

Bowmanville, Oct. 31st. A fine feeling pervaded the assembly. The officers are gentlemen of influence, energetic and thoroughly devoted to the cause. The meeting was fifty per cent larger than last year, which may have been partly due to the beautiful evening, partly to the meeting having been held in the church; but let us hope principally to the growing popularity of the cause. The collection was liberal, amounting to \$18.20 as against \$9.00 last year. The depository is in good condition, very well assorted, and occupies a conspicuous place in Mr. Trebilcock's place of business.

Cartwright, Nov. 2nd.—This branch lies seven miles to the north of Enniskillen. To it Rev. Mr. Atkinson drove me. The drive I enjoyed thoroughly, a pleasing contrast with my experience the day previous. It is but fair to state here, that I received more than ordinary kindness from Mr. Atkinson, as he remained here over night, assisted at the meeting, and drove me next day a distance of ten miles to Tyrone. At Cartwright the meeting was very good. Rev. Mr. Hill was present and gave a short address.

Manilla.—It is always a pleasure to visit this branch. The cause is popular, the officers are efficient and always at their post. Although Manilla stands comparatively well, yet here as in too many other places, the revenue is almost altogether drawn from the village or immediate vicinity. Instead of four collectors as in the past, eight have been appointed, and a larger number than on any previous year will be offered the opportunity of contributing to the support of the Society. The collectors were urged to proceed with their work at once.

In closing my report I am thankful to be able to say, I never had more favourable weather. With the exception of the evening of the first meeting, every evening was all that could have been desired. This added very much to the pleasure of the work, as well as to the success of the meetings. It is but right to state, that as the agent of your Society I was everywhere received with the utmost kindness. With one exception, the officers have been prompt in replying to my communications. In conclusion, permit me to express the prayer that God may enable His people to see more clearly the urgency and glory of this work to which they are called, that they may devise more liberal things, in order that the time may be hastened, when the perishing millions shall have the Word of Life.

Rev. A. A. DRUMMOND. Nov. 2nd.—In Bervie the meeting was presided over by the Rev. Mr. Moorehouse (Episcopal), who is a zealous worker for the Society, together with the Secretary. They had been at great pains to circulate notices of the meeting, which in consequence was well attended. Rev. Mr. Forbes (Presbyterian) gave a short address, after which I set forth the claims of the Bible Society to a very attentive audience. The collectors, who had been previously appointed and notified by postal card of the meeting, received their books and were instructed to visit their districts as soon as possible. The collection here also was double that of the former year.

November 4th.—*Glammiss*. Unfortunately a snow storm swept over this part of the country last night and to-day, making the roads almost impassable. I will not, however, speak of my cold drive in a waggon for nine miles amid falling snow, but will rather praise the courage of the thirty or forty people that came out on such a night to hear your Agent—the first that ever visited *Glammiss*. This village is situated about midway between *Pinkerton*, *Armow* and *Tiverton*. I found the friends ready to organize a branch. The office-bearers elected were willing to take hold of the work, and I have great hopes that this Branch will at once take its place among the active Branches of the Society and push forward your cause in this quarter.

Pine River.—Your agent did the best he could to interest them in the cause of the Society, and was pleased to find, at the close, that some prejudices had been removed, and that they would guarantee your agent a full house on another year. Collectors have been at work and will soon be finished, when it is expected that a good subscription will be made for the Society.

Port Albert.—Here my meetings were brought to a close, and in winding up, let me say: 1st. The Secretaries and other officers of those Branches had given good intimation of the meetings beforehand. 2nd. Your agent has to speak of nothing but kindness from all the Branches. While going among them as a stranger, I have left many warm friends to myself and the Bible Society.

Rev. R. D. FRASER.—*Ayr*, Nov. 28.—Meeting held in *Knox Church*; the President, *John Wylie, Esq.*, in the chair. The attendance was not large, a Missionary Meeting being in progress at the *Canada Methodist Church*, which had been arranged for in ignorance of the Bible Society's appointment. Stirring addresses were delivered by Rev. *Walter Inglis* (Presbyterian), a former co-labourer with *Moffat* and *Livingstone* in South Africa, and Rev. *J. Thomson, M.A.*, pastor of the church. With Messrs. *Inglis* and *Thomson*, I visited the *Methodist Missionary Meeting*. We were cordially received by the Rev. Mr. *Robins*, and given an opportunity of presenting the cause of the Bible Society.

Drumbo, Nov. 29th.—In Baptist church, under charge of *Thomas Passmore, Esq.*, president. Rev. Mr. *Pengelly*, under call to the Baptist church, gave me valuable assistance both in private and in public.

New Durham.—The Society's interests are well cared for here. It has a band of well-trying friends. Although the night was rainy, there was a good meeting.

Washington.—The meeting in the Canada Methodist church, on Monday evening, was well attended and enthusiastic. Arthur Tew, Esq., an old and firm friend of the Society and President of the Branch, presided and delivered an able address. The subscriptions at the meeting were equal to the whole amount of last year. We shall look for an advance of at least fifty per cent. this year.

Rev. JOHN GEMLEY.—*Port Dover*, Dec. 5th.—Meeting in the Presbyterian church, aided by all the ministers of the place. This Branch is well officered and efficiently managed.

Lynedoch, Dec. 12, John Charlton, M.P., in the Chair :—A perfectly dark night, roads almost impassable, yet collection at meeting more than double last year. A good chairman is a good help herein.

Port Rowan and St. William's, Sunday Dec. 18th.—Preached three times. Monday, meeting in Port Rowan ; Tuesday, in St. William's. Had the aid and countenance of the ministers in both places.

Tilsonburg, Dec. 28th.—The attendance at the meeting said to have been larger than usual, but there was room for more. This Branch will, I think, be in the future very fruitful.

Norwich, January 10th.—This growing town takes a deep interest in the welfare of the Society, and the Branch has been liberal in its gifts. Although the condition of the roads has been unfavourable, they expect to be fully equal to former years. The collection at the meeting was in advance.

Langton, March 20th.—A good attendance ; house full indeed. An excellent address from the Baptist minister.

Walsingham Centre.—Meeting in Town Hall ; a large congregation and enthusiastic. All the ministers of the village present, and gave their hearty support. From the Courtland Station to this place and return, twenty-six miles. They were (and perhaps yet are) the *very* worst roads (almost) I ever travelled.

For want of space, I have not mentioned the names of the gentlemen to whom, during these visits, I have been indebted. But I must express my sincere thanks to J. K. McLennan, Esq., of Langton, for furnishing me with comfortable conveyance over these twenty-six miles. I do not think any of these Branches will show a blank in your next printed report.

Rev. JOHN GRAY.—*East Williams.*—This excellent Branch was the next visited. Being entirely a rural section, and many of the friends being at a long distance from the place of meeting, it was arranged that the Annual Meeting should be held during the afternoon. The collection at the meeting was \$13.00. Owing to the illness of the Rev. Mr. McPherson, the venerable pastor of the church where the meeting was held, was not present. The Rev. Mr. Wills delivered a stirring and excellent address.

Forrest.—The meeting here was in the Episcopal Church. Dr. Hutton the President presided, and with an efficient staff of officers will not allow the energy of the Society to languish in this community.

Mooretown, Nov. 1st.—The attendance here was much larger than during any previous year, many being present from the adjoining village of Court-right which may be made an important sub-branch.

Your agent has found that, as on previous occasions, the month of October is well fitted for visitations. For the most part the weather was fine, the roads good, and large meetings secured. Officers were prompt in replying to communications and every facility afforded for the comfort of the agent, and the successful prosecution of the work. If I may be allowed to predict for the future, the increasing interest and prosperity of the Branches this year will manifest itself in more liberal contributions towards the great work of Bible distribution throughout the world.

Rev. T. W. JEFFERY.—*Lakefield* is a most inspiring place. The sympathy and fellowship of all denominations, and the hearty co-operation of every minister of the Church, by their presence and aid, makes the agent's visit here a holiday.

Peterborough is very energetic. The subscriptions and collections are in advance. If each place equalled the two last Branches, it would be health-giving and soul-elevating to labour in the cause.

Omeme owes much of the success of the Society's operations both to the business tact and ability of the Secretary. The meeting and proceeds here are ahead of last year.

South Monaghan.—Had a fine meeting, held in the Presbyterian church. The people in the neighbourhood take an interest in the work of the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Rev. J. KAPPELE.—My next visit was to Elmira, and owing to good arrangement and very good feeling between the English Methodist and German Evangelical churches and people, we had the best meeting for some years. Sales good and contributions improved.

In conclusion, I wish to say that owing to some changes in my arrangements to visit all the Branches, and the revisiting of one, the amount of travelling done was larger than usual.

Rev. C. R. MATTHEW.—*Bayfield*.—The evening meeting took place in the Presbyterian church, Dr. Stanbury, President, in the chair. A very good attendance; audience most attentive. Rev. Messrs. Patteson and McCosh aided most materially in advocating the claims of the Society, and guaranteed an increase of activity in the working of the Bayfield Branch. The Committee promised to set actively about the canvass of the district.

Londesboro'.—The report of the Secretary-treasurer, Mr. Adams, was admirable—clear, concise and business-like, and the management of the Branch appears to be in excellent hands. The depository is well kept and a very reasonable stock on hand.

Clinton.—We had a much better meeting in Clinton, on Thursday the 9th of December. Here the stock is well kept and in a prominent store. Sales have been encouraging, and the stock might be enlarged with advantage, as I urged upon the Committee. Meeting held in Presbyterian Church; Mr. Fisher, President, in the chair. An excellent report was read by the courteous and efficient Secretary, Mr. Stevenson, showing that by raiding into the surrounding country the Branch had doubled its income. Admirable speeches were made by Rev. Mr. Stewart (Presbyterian) and Rev. Mr. Gray (Baptist) to a large and respectable gathering. I may fairly say that the Clinton Branch is in a very healthy and prosperous condition.

Rev. J. L. MURRAY.—*Teeswater*.—My first meeting was at Teeswater, in the C. M. church, and was in every sense a success. It was the largest of the kind held there for many years. The clergy of the town were present and rendered excellent service. The Teeswater Branch is unquestionably one of the most vigorous in connection with the U. C. Bible Society, and its efficiency is due, under God, in a large measure to the intelligent and untiring efforts of the Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. J. K. McLean. He is determined that the village and the surrounding country shall be canvassed for subscriptions. Should any of the collectors appointed be unable or unwilling to act, he rests not till he obtains a willing substitute.

Alton.—I had a little variety in my experience here. Though the pulpit-notices were sent some ten days before the meeting, they were somehow mislaid and neglected, and no intimation whatever was made of the meeting. Fortunately I reached the village in the morning. Determined not to be beaten, I tested the merits of voice and charcoal. I took a coal of fire out of the stove, poured water on it, and used it in lieu of crayon or brush.

Using pieces of wrapping paper, I extemporised hand-bills in so ugly a style that Cartoonist Bengough need not be anxious about his laurels. These I posted up on tavern doors and in shop windows. I repaired to the public schools and advertised myself and my mission there. I paced up and down streets, entered shops, stores, factories, &c., and would talk nothing but *Bible Society*. Before night I was well advertised. The result is that the Alton Branch is still living, and has already more money contributed than was collected among them for the last two or three years. Beyond a doubt the existence of the Branch depended upon the efforts of that day. It was never strong, and the chief office-bearer informed me the following morning that they felt that further struggle for life would be useless. They were quite hopeful for the future when I left them.

Luther.—The meeting in this romantic little village was the largest that I addressed in my district, considering the size of the place and other circumstances. Rev. B. I. Browne was the only clergyman present, but he is a host in himself. He urged on his congregation to attend the meeting and some of them came a distance of five miles, over rough roads, to show their interest in the Bible. The office-bearers are efficient men and the interests of the Society are well attended to.

Clifford.—Weather fine. Roads very muddy. Splendid meeting. Some drove through the mud a distance of five miles. Church full. Interest fervid. Resident clergy spoke briefly and to the point. All the office-bearers alive to their duty. Collectors appointed before my arrival. Collection, \$6.48.

Rev. DR. O'MEARA.—*Milton.*—Here I found myself among old friends, and on the platform of the Town Hall I was surrounded by the ministers of the place, of all Protestant denominations. Addresses on the claims of the Bible, and of the Society as the great machine for its dissemination throughout the world, were delivered by the Rev. Mr. Gillespie, of the Presbyterian Church, and the Rev. Mr. McKenzie, of the Church of England. The meeting was evidently deeply interested in the details that your Agent was able to give them, illustrative of the vast and all-important work that the Society has been doing during the past year for the dissemination of the Word of Life and its translation into the many and various languages of the world. I was most hospitably entertained at the house of H. Watson, Esq., the President of the Branch.

Georgetown, December 7th.—Addresses were delivered by the Rev. Mr. Cook, of the Church of England, and the Rev. Mr. Morton, of the Canada Methodist Church, whose excellent remarks would have been more extended than they were, but that they kindly desired to leave me as much time as possible, in which to illustrate by incidents and anecdotes taken chiefly from the recent reports of the parent Society, the extent and importance of the work that is being carried on through its instrumentality. Though I availed myself of their kind consideration to a larger extent than I had intended, I did not find the attention of the very respectable audience flag in the least during my somewhat lengthened address.

At *Eramosa* post office I was met by the Secretary of the Branch, Mr. James Kennedy, who drove me to his home some miles distant, where I had tea, after which I was driven by his father, a hale, hearty old gentleman of eighty-two, to the place of meeting, which was the Congregational church at Speedside, of which the Rev. Mr. Duff, who was present and conducted the devotional exercises of the meeting, is the pastor. I was pleased to observe that the collectors were all young men, a circumstance to which I alluded in terms of commendation in my speech as presenting a good example, and one well worthy of imitation by the young men in other Branches, instead of leaving the often laborious duties of collectors entirely to young women.

Galt, December 9th.—Early in the morning I started with Mr. Loghrin, so as to catch the early train from Guelph to Galt, and arrived at the latter place at 11 o'clock in the forenoon. Here I was the guest of my excellent friend, the Rev. Canon Hincks, the President of this Branch. He had kindly invited the Secretary of the Branch, and all the Protestant ministers of the town, to meet me in the evening at the Rectory, previously to the meeting, which was held in the Canada Presbyterian church, Canon Hincks presiding, and all the Protestant ministers of the town assisting. Indeed, it is no wonder that the interests of the Society are so well attended to in a place where such harmony and Christian fellowship exists among all sections of the church Catholic as is to be found in Galt.

Guelph, January 5th.—The practice of holding meetings at different points of the district included in the operations of the Branch, which has been carried out this year, as in past years, has evidently a very beneficial effect on the progress of the Branch.

Rockwood.—After I concluded, the President called on an old man, Mr. Black, who was present, to address the meeting; and he, an old man of between eighty and ninety years, deeply interested all present by narrating the cause of the interest that he felt in the Society ever since he was a young man. He first read the Word of God, the message of salvation from a Gaelic Bible (the only tongue he at that time understood), published by the British and Foreign Bible Society. The advance of this Branch during the past year has been very gratifying, and there is every reason to hope that the interest shown at the meeting will not evaporate, but will eventuate in a further increase during the year on which we have just entered.

Rev. W. R. PARKER.—*South Cayuga*.—Here we met a large and attentive assembly. A good choir furnished choice music. The President, Mr. Housberger, proved a judicious Chairman, and the veteran Secretary, Mr. Nash, presented for himself and Mr. Fry, the competent Depositary, a model report. There is here a refreshing vitality and a contagious zeal. This Branch is really an "institution" in the community.

Dunnville.—The annual meeting was held in the Methodist church, the Rev. Mr. Lancely conducting the devotional exercises. The President, Mr. Gash, gave a good tone by his opening address, and the comprehensive report read by the new Secretary, Mr. Coutts, gave satisfactory evidence of the efficiency and fidelity with which the Officers and Committee of this excellent Branch manage the business of your Society. After your Agent, the Rev. Mr. Youmans, Presbyterian, spoke briefly.

Rev. A. M. PHILLIPS.—*East Westminster*.—This is a most perfectly worked Branch, and is a credit to those taking part in it. We have a good meeting, and in addition to the address of your agent and Rev. Mr. Ballantyne, there were practical addresses by some of the lay officials.

Amherstburg.—All the ministers and Churches unite heartily in the work of this Branch. There was a large meeting, and a good deal of interest shown in the work of the Society.

Lambeth.—This Branch has a good staff of officers, and the interests of the Society will not be neglected. The meeting was a failure on account of the pouring rain. They requested your agent to return, but on account of the weather and roads nothing has been done.

Rev. J. V. SMITH.—*Dresden*.—A most enthusiastic meeting was held here in the new M. E. church. All the choirs of the town united, and gave us some grand and appropriate music for the occasion. The church was well filled, and the financial results far in advance of any preceding year. The friends of the Society are legion in this rising town.

Chatham.—Owing to a political meeting held in the town the same evening of the Society's Annual Meeting, the attendance was small. But noth-

ing discouraged in the work, we had a good time, appointed vigorous committees to canvass the town, and I have since learned that the results are in advance of any previous year. Chatham believes in the Bible for the world.

Windsor.—We had a good meeting in the Presbyterian church, and increased interest in the Society's work was manifested all around.

REV. J. G. MANLY.—I review the past year with much thankfulness, on account of my own preservation in travelling nearly 7,000 miles by land and water, and on account of the opportunities so often afforded me of preaching and lecturing to intelligent and attentive audiences, for the great work of the world's evangelization. Death came into my house (as it did two years before), to transfer a loved one from earth to heaven; an accidental lameness laid me up for four weeks; but these shadows have neither benighted my life, nor prevented my work. We walk by faith, not by sight, in a way of Divine sunshine, succour and salvation.

The speciality of the past year, was the visitation of Algoma with Muskoka, in thirty-six consecutive days, and 2,260 miles of travel. The meeting in the Bracebridge Presbyterian church was the largest that has ever been held there for the Bible Society. Parry Sound cannot be effectively visited without Sunday work. The visitation of the great Manitoulin Island, included week day and Sunday services at Manitowaning, the establishment of a Depository at Michael's Bay on the south side, and at Little Current and Sheguindah Bay on the north. and a good meeting at Gore Bay, in the Presbyterian church, attended by the ministers of several churches. By both week day and Sunday services at Bruce Mines, a Bible Society was organized to supply the village, the farming community in the rear, Thessalon River, and the neighbouring island of St. Joseph. At Sault Ste. Marie the Society was revived and reorganized, and its large stock was partly better placed for local supply, and partly despatched in different directions for circulation elsewhere. At Silver Islet, on Lake Superior, an arrangement was made with a leading member of the Presbyterian Church to take charge of Bibles and Testaments for the mining population of about 500. Services were held at Prince Arthur's Landing, on Saturday evening and Sunday, to stimulate and strengthen the branch there; and at a public meeting next evening, in the Fort William Presbyterian church, it was arranged to establish a Depository in the warehouse of a leading merchant and a member of the Baptist Church. From these sources of supply and by means of the Colportage agency just appointed, Algoma will be well supplied with the Word of Life, where previously, for 120 miles, there was no opportunity of getting a Bible, except occasionally in a store at a high price.

As the limits of the Annual Report will not allow a detailed account of my visitations before and after Algoma, I can only specify some parts of the large field. At Kerr's, in Caistor, there was not only increased attendance, but arrangement for more extensive collection, so as to reduce any uncanvassed margins of the branch. The St. Ann's meeting at Mingle Hall, purposed and promised well. At Grimsby, I called on Dr. Wolverton, of the Baptist Church, who had kindly sent \$400 for India's evangelization by the Bible Society, and whose age and infirmities prevented his attendance at the public meeting. The Madoc meeting in the Presbyterian Church resolved on a more thorough canvass of its field. The field of the Roslin branch is large and capable of much help. Mr. John Newton, of the Methodist Church, Tweed, not only continues his annual subscription of ten dollars, commenced at the former time of my Sunday services there, but also promised and duly paid \$50 additional, lest amidst the uncertainties of life and advanced years, he should not otherwise render such help as he wished to so good a cause. Stirling promised well, and so did Campbellford. Stouffville set the good

example of sectional meetings through the year, for the Bible Society. The Goodwood meeting, in the Baptist church, showed life and good purpose. Increase at Markham. A well-known minister at Unionville declared he had never attended such a Bible meeting before, for there was not a word of platitudes or buncombe. The Bolton Society has been bereft of its valuable Secretary, by the death of Mr. Bolton. Collecting staff well increased at Mono Centre. Good meeting in the Anglo-Episcopal Church, at Shelburne, under the chairmanship of the Incumbent, aided by the Presbyterian and Methodist ministers. A better meeting than in the year before at Owen Sound and Annan. Good meeting in Presbyterian church at both Dundalk and Mono Mills. Specially good meeting, in very inclement weather, in North Pelham Presbyterian church. Hastened home from the close of a good meeting at Oakwood, on account of a telegraphed death. Unusually good meeting in the Lindsay English Church, attended by the minister of the place, and by the Baptist, Methodist and Bible Christian ministers, and well addressed by a Christian lawyer. Good meeting in Cannington Presbyterian church, and at Bradford in rainy weather. Good attendance at Beeton. Unusually good meeting in Aurora Methodist Episcopal church, with addresses from several ministers, and at Lloydstown, in the Methodist church, in very unfavourable circumstances. Capital meeting in Rosemont Primitive Methodist church, with addresses by several ministers, Anglo-Episcopal, Presbyterian, Primitive and Methodist. Good meeting in Beamsville Methodist church. Biblical diagrams much appreciated at Waterdown and Appleby, and many other places afterwards. Excellent meeting, as usual, in Grafton Presbyterian church; specially so in the Methodist Episcopal church of Napanee, assisted by Methodist Episcopal, Presbyterian and Methodist ministers, with good collection. First-rate meeting in Ancaster, though overshadowed by the accidental injury (ending in death) of the excellent President, Dr. Orton. Good meeting in Yorkville Congregational Church, well addressed by several. Barrie meeting good, and likely to be followed by progress. Three sermons and collections on Sunday, at Arkwright, Mount Hope and Burgoyne. Durham meeting better than before. Strabane good as before. Though I was officially notified that it seemed useless to visit Lakeside, as no announcement had been made, and successive failures in visitation had killed the Society, I wrote to have the meeting announced as well as possible, though at the eleventh hour; and it was held in the English Church, and unanimously resolved to continue the Society and appoint managers. Harrington, after Sunday services in the Presbyterian church, gave me \$33 as a free contribution, and wished me, with kind assurances, to come again. Good meeting in Kintere Methodist Episcopal church and in Innerkip Presbyterian church. Though Caistorville did not expect me, on account of the bad roads, the meeting was held in the Methodist church, and the organization changed. Jarvis was better than in former days. York good. Jerseyville is likely to renew its activity. Two Sunday services given for Alberton, with extremely bad roads. Rothsay gives us a bequest of \$100, from the late Mr. James Taylor, of the Methodist Church, besides the usual subscriptions of the branch. Better meeting than previously at Drayton, in the English Church, Sunday services and collections at Hollin in the Methodist and Presbyterian churches, and at Glenallan in the evening, followed by a public meeting next evening, in the Methodist church. This should be a fruitful branch in so fine a country. Sunday services in Presbyterian and Methodist churches, at Eglinton, and also Monday evening meeting, evincing progress. Very promising new branch formed at West Flamboro', under a tried and proved President, as well as good Sunday evening attendance at Copetown, to be followed in due time by the work of the collectors.

Agency work at home consists of planning, corresponding and reporting ; and abroad, of the inspection of Depositories, pulpit labour, speeches or lectures, and occasionally of the preparation and despatch of orders for new stock. The work altogether is absorbing and incessant for many months. The last year's work has been marked by better attendance and a better tone, resulting in an increase, from the whole field of Permanent and Provisional agency and self-supplying branches, of about \$1,000. Diminution of sales very often arise from sufficiency of previous supply, and some times from competition in the sale of Bibles ; but this has no effect on income, as our Scriptures are now never sold for more than cost price. The merit of the Upper Canada Bible Society consists in creating pervasive sources of supply for this Province, and partly for the conterminous Provinces, east and west, and in distributing this supply on the easiest and kindest possible terms, as well as in aiding the great parent Society in its catholic and magnificent circulation of the Word of Life. The triple organization for the whole world, is the British, the Scottish and the American, while other Bible Societies are very effectively aiding.

Rev. E. N. B. MILLARD.—*Mitchell*.—The Annual Meeting of the Mitchell Branch was held in the Town Hall, on Monday, October 31st. I visited several officers of the Society and other gentlemen who take an interest in its welfare. Notwithstanding all the efforts that were made by the zealous Secretary, Mr. Flagg, and the great interest taken in the meeting by the Rev. Mr. De Lom, the Church of England clergyman, the meeting was not very large. Your agent received valuable assistance from Mr. Flagg, who presided at the meeting, the Rev. Mr. De Lom, and the Rev. J. B. Muir, M. A., Presbyterian minister. Owing to the serious illness of the resident Methodist minister, we were deprived of his help.

Hibbert.—Your agent received great kindness from Mr. Scott, and is under obligation to him for the interest shown in the work.

Millbank.—The President of this Branch, the Rev. D. J. Caswell, of the Church of England, showed the interest he takes in the work by word and deed. He showed great kindness to me, and gave me much valuable help and assistance. In company with Mr. Caswell, I called upon the Rev. Mr. Croly, of the Presbyterian Church, and went to the public schools, and there made known to the children the meeting to be held in the evening. The minister of the Methodist Church was unfortunately not at home, nor was he able to attend the meeting held in the Methodist church. The Rev. Mr. Caswell presided, and also gave an address. Your agent was followed by Mr. Croly, who gave a stirring address to the meeting. Thanks are due to these gentlemen for the lively interest exhibited in the welfare of the Society. The Depository is in good hands, and the stock well taken care of, and put in a suitable place.

Crediton.—The annual meeting of this Branch took place in the German church and was well attended. One of the best meetings as far as attendance is concerned, it was my privilege to witness. After arriving in the village, I called upon the office-bearers and found that all necessary arrangements had been made for the evening meeting. The meeting was enlivened by the excellent singing of a few German hymns, and by the valuable assistance given by the local clergy. The officers of the Branch are interested in the work, and unless I am greatly mistaken Crediton will not be behind others in their contributions to the work of the Society.

Sebringville was the next place visited, and your agent was made very welcome by the excellent Secretary, Mr. F. L. Menig. The meeting held in the German church was well attended, and several of the ministers of various denominations showed the interest taken in the Society's work by their presence and their addresses. The Depository is in the hands of Messrs. Scarth Bros., and carefully attended to by them.

Zurich, had its meeting on Monday evening, November the 15th. I had a long journey to get to Zurich, and as the train arrived late in Hensall, I could get no conveyance to take me to the place, but was fortunate in getting a ride part of the way, the rest I had to walk. The night was very dark and stormy, and added to these drawbacks we had a heavy rain. And yet, in spite of all these things, we had a good meeting in the German church, at which its minister, the President of the Society, gave valuable help. The Depository is kept by Mr. D. S. Faust, in good order. Arrangements for collectors were made.

In closing this report I desire to express my thankfulness to all the many workers of the Society in the various branches and associations, to whose zeal and energy and prayers in addition to the Divine Blessing, so much is due of the good which not only our own Canadian Society, but which the mother of us all—The British and Foreign Bible Society—has been enabled to accomplish in all the different parts of the world.

EXTRACTS FROM COLPORTEURS' REPORTS.

JOHN LOWRY.—“ August, 1881.—After spending a week of holiday, being permitted by the Secretary, I have made two hundred and fifty-five visits and travelled two hundred and twenty miles. Notwithstanding the universal complaint of the want of money, I have sold fifty-three Bibles and sixty-five Testaments. I gave away three Bibles, one each to two poor men who were labouring under very heavy affliction, and another to a family that had none. In several cases I have sold to poor persons at a reduction in price. I have been laid aside several days from the effects of the very hot weather, being unable to travel. But still I am thankful to a kind Providence that I have been the means of putting the sacred volume into the hands of many young people, and supplying so many families with the Small Pica Bible for family use. I sold yesterday, in two taverns, both Bibles and Testaments, some for the use of their children, and some for their servants. This has been the most oppressive month that ever I remember spending in the Society's service, from the effects of the excessive heat. But the divine command comforts: “ Be not weary in well-doing, for in due season ye shall reap if ye faint not.” O for more of the mind of the Divine Redeemer, more desire to try to lead sinners to a precious Saviour, more of the Spirit's influence.

“ September, 1881.—Although I was unable three times during the month to labour on account of affliction, yet I have travelled two hundred and seventy-seven miles to make three hundred and seventy visits, to sell fifty-four Bibles and seventy-three Testaments. Many have bought pocket Bibles for their children, and I find the seventy-cent. family Bible is still in demand. One most interesting case occurs to me, two children had their coppers gathered together, and bought a Bible for their mother. One man that got a Bible about seven years ago paid me for it a few days ago. Frequently people have expressed to me their surprise at the cheapness of the Bibles. Romanists, as usual, refuse to have the Bible. I am sorry to state that among many of the young there is a greater desire for novels than for the Sacred Volume. I have some valuable and interesting conversation with pious people by whom my visits are appreciated. The railway accident of

Thursday is a loud and important call—prepare to meet thy God, widows and fatherless children left to mourn the loss of a husband and father. Lord so teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts to wisdom. “Behold now is the accepted time, now is the day of salvation.” Let us labour for the honour of the Master. Sin is still abounding; Sabbath-breaking, drunkenness and profane swearing. Let us not be ashamed of Him who was not ashamed to die that we might live, and who pleadeth our cause at the Father’s right hand in glory.

“October, 1881.—I sold one Bible and two Testaments to showmen who said they saw me in Toronto. One of them said they supposed I thought that showmen would not buy the Bible. I said they had precious souls as well as others. One most interesting case—a woman that knew me in Hamilton, when I was engaged in the City Mission, showed me a Bible she bought there, and waited in my son’s house to see me, as she was about to remove to the neighbourhood of Owen Sound in a few days. I intend, if the Lord will, to resume my visits, if my cold gets better, as there is no agency so effectual to reach the railway men, and supply them with Scriptures, as Colportage. There are more railway men in St. Thomas than in any other city in Ontario.

“November, 1881.—I sold a considerable number of the Scriptures among the railway men. A number of women bought the Bible for their children, and Testaments for the Sabbath-school. Had it not been for the dearth of provisions, the working people would have bought many more. I have met with several scoffers—one man told me he was a free-thinker. I asked what he meant by free-thought. Did he need a Saviour? He said not. I told him there was no salvation for him if he denied the Saviour. I sold a Testament to a man in a tavern that was swearing. I told him not to swear. Another scoffer would give little for the soul. I told him the soul was of more value than all the world. By many the Bible was highly valued, by others despised. Left a Testament with a Romanist who promised to read it. A most laborious but a most delightful month in the Lord’s vineyard. O for more of the Spirit of my Divine Redeemer.”

JAMES BADGER.—“February, 1882.—Dear Sirs, I am sorry to have to inform you that through the afflictions of my family, and myself suffering from severe pains in my head, I was not able to leave my home until the 1st of February, but I am thankful to my heavenly Father, I feel strong and hearty now, and have met with some encouragement in the lumber camps, which you will see by my report this month. I never was better received in the camps with the men. Although they bear the name of rough and wild, and in many respects they are, yet they have respect to God’s Word, and to me, your humble servant. I stayed in the camps over nights, and read and prayed and spoke to the men out of God’s Word, and they listened with marked attention. I sold quite a number of copies to the men, but especially to the young men. I never saw them in such earnest before to become the possessors of a copy of God’s blessed Word. Please to allow me to mention the name of Messrs. S. & J. Armstrong, of McKellar, who kindly gave me a note of introduction to their foremen of eight camps, with from twenty-five to thirty men in each camp. The first township I visited this month was Burpee, with three camps and only two families in the Township—one camp in the Township of Ferguson and one in Christy, and four in McKellar, and two in Terry, one in Croft and one in Chapman. You will see, dear sirs, that I have had to travel some long and lonesome roads with my heavy pack this month. But I wish to thank God and take courage that it has been attended with some success. I had intended to continue my work in visiting the remainder of the camps this next month, but the snow has disappeared, and the camps will have to break up.

“ March, 1882.—Dear Sirs,—After receiving your kind and welcome letter of the twenty-third, respecting the Muskoka sufferings, I at once made my way to those townships, where they have suffered the most, but I am thankful to say I did not find it as bad as I expected. Although a great many families have been burned out of house and home, the fire was not a general sweep through the district, but confined to certain localities in each township, and most of these I have visited this month. The Township of Macaulay, on the second and third line, was swept, and the people had to fly for their lives. It was sorrowful to sit and listen to their tales of woe and suffering. One lady told me that all she could save was what she could put in the well, and then run for her life. With another woman they snatched up a trunk with their best clothes, but the fire ran so fast they had to throw it down, and all she saved was a Testament, and many such tales have I had to listen to. In the Township of McLean, eighth and ninth line, near Baysville, the fire ranged from two by four miles, and a sweeping wind carried nearly everything before it. Families in comfortable circumstances were swept out of house and home. You will see, my dear sirs, that I distributed quite a number of copies among the destitute, although many have left the district. Those that remain do express their thankfulness to all those kind friends, who have so nobly come forward and helped them out of their distress with food and raiment in abundance. I read and prayed with most of them and encouraged them to trust in the Lord, and do good and dwell in the land, and verily they shall be fed. The Townships of Stevenson and Brunell have suffered considerably, and in fact, all the districts of Muskoka and Parry Sound, but nothing to the extent that was reported. In the Townships of Foley and McDougal and near Parry Sound Village, the fire raged for three weeks, but no building was destroyed. My own house in Foley caught fire three times, but thanks to a kind providence and the energy of two men, the building was saved. But I must not forget to record the many expressions of thanks to the Upper Canada Bible Society, for again sending them the blessed Word of God, to comfort them in the hour of sorrow. The roads are now breaking up and my stock is getting slim. I have now returned home trusting that God will bless my feeble labours to many souls.”

J. E. TAYLOR.—“ April, 1881.—I have found a great number of poor families this month in this township, who were very glad to get cheap Bibles for their children, and when I told them the object of our Society in carrying God's Word to the poor and those who had it not in all parts of the world, they were very glad. I have tried in this way to awaken a deeper interest in our Society work, by giving them a short history of its commencement. This I find to be a very good plan to introduce the other subject—the personal love of the Lord Jesus.

“ July, 1881.—This has been a very hot month, but there has been a great demand for Bibles in this part of my field of labour. There are a great number of poor people in this part; but they were very glad to get cheap Bibles and Testaments, and when I explained to them the object of our Society in carrying the Word of God to the poor, they were very thankful for such a Society. I have been very much encouraged this month by the people. May God bless His own word, which He has given me strength to scatter this month.

“ September, 1881.—This brings me into the exhibition month. The first show was at Toronto, where we had our large case of Bibles in one hundred languages, and as in the past years, so it has been this, a great many people took a deep interest in looking at the different languages in which the Bible has been printed and circulated by our Society. I also gave away a great number of handbills giving a short history of our work. I also sold a large number of Bibles and Testaments. The man that bought the Polish Bible

two years ago, came again to see me—he wanted some Polish books, and was very thankful for his Bible. My next fair was at Woodstock. There I called on the President, Mr. Grey, and stated to him our object in coming to the fair. He thought it was a good one, and he went with me to the grounds, and we got a good place in the main building. At night the people from the town came, and at this place I gave a great [number of handbills away, and sold a good number of Bibles. My next fair was at Mitchell, where I called on the Secretary, Mr. Flagg. I found him in the main building very hard at work. This was a very small fair, but they took a deep interest in the various specimens of Bibles, in twenty-five different languages, which I had on the stand. My next fair was at Listowel. I called on the President, but he was not at home, and the Secretary was very ill, so that I went to the fair ground and stated to the officers my object in coming to the fair. They said it was a good place to have a Bible stand and gave me the best place in the building, and gave me besides lumber to make a stand for the Bibles. At this place there was a very deep interest taken in the case containing Bibles in twenty-five different languages. When told that we had the Bible in about two hundred and fifteen languages they were astonished. The Society has got a great number of friends all around this part of the country.

“October, 1881.—The first Agricultural Show this month was at Walkerton, where I called on the Rev. Dr. Bell, who went with me to the Committee of the fairground, and they gave us the best place in the main building. The officers were very much pleased with our object in visiting the fair, and the people were very much interested in the case containing specimens of the Bible translated into twenty-five different languages. I distributed a number of handbills and sold a good number of Bibles. My next fair was at Milton, where I called on the Secretary Mr. Taylor, who very kindly gave me a home all the time I was there. We had a good number of people at this fair, also I sold a good number of Bibles, and tried in every way to interest the people in our work. Many thanks to the above officers, for their kindness in helping me to make our society more widely known. We have very practical friends in this part of the country. Many did not know the object for which they were giving their money, only that it was for the Bible Society; and when I told them it was to send God's Word into every land, they were very glad. I spoke to many about their accepting the Lord Jesus and had a word of prayer with some of the families when time and opportunity offered. May God bless the seed which I have been sowing this month.”

A. P. BLOUIN.—“I commenced my work on Thursday, July the 28th, ten miles southeast of Winnipeg, in the settlements situated on both sides of Seine River, named Lorette, Grande and Petite Pointe, Duchesne and Clear Spring. Then in those along the sides of South Red River as far as Emerson called St. Vital, St. Norbert, Ste. Agathe, St. John and St. Pie. I found most people well satisfied with their lot and hopeful. In most places I was pleased to see a goodly number of Protestant people. In Dufferin, four miles above Emerson, I met a comfortable and well bred Protestant French Canadian family. My time has been devoted mostly to the Roman Catholics, equally or nearly composed of French Canadians and Half-Breeds. Though very different, they take very friendly to each other. I have colported through some of the outskirts of Winnipeg, St Boniface, four Mennonite villages, Nelsonville and Carmel City. In Winnipeg I found quite a long street, whose residents are nearly all French Canadians. I sold and gave them a few Bibles and Testaments. In St. Boniface I sold two Bibles to intelligent Half-Breeds, who are fully aware of the opposition of the priests for these books. I found the Mennonites a very religious people and anxious to learn English—some of them bought English Bibles and Testaments.

Around Winnipeg, Brandon and Grand Valley I have met quite a few people who seem to make very little of the Bible. How far in earnest some were I have not always been able to ascertain; I am only too sure that some really were serious in throwing scorn at me for selling such a thing, when I could be up and do labour work which pays better and is in great demand. I suppose they are angry with the Lord for not sending them more labourers and because the Bible folks got the Scott Act enforced in many parts of the country, and are in a fair way of having it enforced in many more; and, also, because some religious folks have competed successfully with them. If only they were thoughtful and could show reason, or a semblance of it, why by right, according to Nature's eternal laws, religion should not form a part of the social economy, I might have patience with them. They are the very opposite, being unscrupulous, disappointed and dissatisfied self-worshippers. All such I commend to the attention of our ministers."

JOHN JACKSON.—"November, 1881.—I am thankful to say that God's Word is valued highly in this township (Huron), and that the young, both men and women, are desirous of possessing a Bible of their own. I have sold a great many of them to young people. I am thankful also to say that I receive nothing but kindness from the people here.

"December 31st, 1881.—Calling at one house with Gaelic Bibles, I found an old man without a Bible that he could read. I offered him one for sixty-five cents, he only had fifty cents, and after searching the house over, he could not find any more. So I let him have the Bible, and he was as pleased as a child with a new toy. I have been pleased also to see children buying Bibles and Testaments with the little money they had saved for Christmas. I was sorry to find one young woman without a Protestant Bible or Testament, and though very desirous to have one, she durst not buy one, because her husband was a Roman Catholic, and would not allow her to have one. I urged her to pray for him, telling her there was great power in prayer. Otherwise this is a very Protestant township.

"January 31st, 1882.—I have finished the Township of Huron. In this township I have sold over six hundred and fifty copies of God's Word; does not this speak loudly of the need of Colportage? And I do not think the store-keeper has sold any the less. I have received much kindness from the people, but I have also had some things not so pleasant. Twice I have been bitten by dogs, and the stormy weather so near the lake has been very much against me. Once I have been stuck fast in a snow-drift, and had to clear the way for near two miles, and then had to put up at a farm-house for two days before I could get to my lodgings with safety.

"March 31st, 1882.—In reference to my work you will see I have given away four Bibles this month. One was to a poor woman sick in bed and a lot of little children, but without a Bible. I gave her one, and with tears of gratitude she received it, and said, "Now I shall have a Bible to read to my children." Another was a poor man who was sick, and very likely sick unto death. He had a Bible, but the print was too small for either him or his wife to read it. Generally the people are pleased to have the Word of God so cheap, brought to their very doors."

JAMES NESS.—"January 31st, 1882.—This being the first work that I have done as a Colporteur, I am not in a position to say whether it has been a success or not. I have endeavoured to do my duty to the best of my ability. I left Toronto for my field of labour on the 5th of January, and arrived at my appointed station late in the evening of the same day. I stopped at Caledonia (as directed), to find out where the former Colporteur had left off. I saw Mr. Elwood and Mr. Old, the Secretary and President of the depository in that place. They informed me that Mr. Taylor had canvassed all of five miles to the east of Caledonia, and that I should go on

to York and commence north in Seneca, which I did. I found the roads in a very rough state, which was somewhat discouraging, but I succeeded in selling many Bibles and Testaments, and finished the canvass of this township on the 17th inst. On the 16th, I met with a family on the town line between Seneca and Canborough, which had no Bible and the mother was anxious to obtain a copy. She went to her husband to try and get the money but failed. She said they never had a Bible and she always wanted to get one. I then gave her a fifteen cent Bible, and urged her to read it to her family, which she promised to do. She seemed very grateful for the gift, and said if I came back and she had the money, she would pay me for the book. On the 17th, the last day of my canvass in Seneca, I met with three professed Protestant families, that had no Bibles. The families were living on the Indiana Road—coloured people—and seemed very poor. One of them was able to buy, to two of them I gave a copy of our 'fifteen cent Bible, for which they seemed thankful. This ended my labours in Seneca. I then went to Cayuga, which I reached late in the evening of the 17th, and by the advice of Mr. Decew, I have canvassed up to this date in North and South Cayuga and Township of Oneida. I have been much discouraged some days in this neighbourhood, many Roman Catholics did not seem to relish my visit, but I must not forget the many kind receptions I had especially in Oneida, where the Rev. Mr. Grant showed me much kindness and was of great help to me in selling the Bible. And now I have, in looking back on the labours of the past month, to thank God for his goodness, and my prayer is that he may water the seed sown, that it may bring forth fruit to His glory."

"March 7th, 1881.—I met with a family on the 16th ult., that had no Bible and expressed a desire to have one, but had no money. The mother said she could not read, but that her little son could. I gave them a twenty-five cent Bible and a five cent Testament for which they seemed very thankful. On the 20th, I met with three families that had no Bible. I was able to sell to two of them, and to one I gave our large ten cent Testament. On the same day I met with a Roman Catholic family, which after some conversation with me, said if they had the money, they would have bought one of my books. I asked if they would read it, if I gave them one, they said they would. I gave them a copy of the New Testament. I pray that God may bless the work that has been done for the good of souls and His own glory."

ANNIVERSARY MEETING.*

The forty-second Anniversary Meeting of the Society was held in Knox Church on the evening of Wednesday, May 10th. Daniel Wilson, Esq., LL. D., Vice-President, in the chair.

After the singing of the hymn "The heavens declare Thy glory, Lord," the Rev. Mr. Parsons read a portion of Scripture and led in prayer.

Letters were read from the Hon. G. W. Allan, President, and the Hon. W. McMaster, Treasurer, regretting their inability to attend as they were detained in Ottawa by their parliamentary duties.

Dr. Wilson then addressed the meeting, referring to the serious inroads made by death since the last Anniversary, among those who had been long connected with the Society, and to the duty devolving upon younger hands as the pioneers of the Society passed away. After mentioning the names of some noted men in the scientific world who had also passed away during the same period, and speaking of the mistake some people make in fancying that science is opposed to revelation, he pointed out that the conception of the character of Christ was a powerful evidence of the truth and inspiration of the sacred record. The union and development of the philosophies of Greece and Rome had resulted in the Augustan ages, in which the Saviour was born, in an Epicureanism which, if distinguished for intellectual power, was prurient in moral tone. In such an age and in such society the Christ of the Gospels could not have been conceived apart from the divinity of His mission.

Mr. Robert Baldwin then moved the adoption of the report, which was seconded by Dr. Hodgins and carried.

It was moved by Mr. John K. Macdonald, and seconded by Mr. Richard Brown:—"That thanks be given to the Officers, Committees and Collectors of the various Branches throughout the country, to whose zeal and energy the Society is so much indebted; and that the following gentlemen be officers and directors for the ensuing year:" (See list on page iv).

The motion was unanimously adopted.

It was then moved by the Rev. Dr. J. F. Stevenson, of Montreal, and seconded by Mr. Henry O'Brien and carried:—"That as it is righteousness that truly exalteth a nation, and as the Bible is the written revelation of the righteousness of God to man, every true Canadian should earnestly desire to see every Province of our Dominion thoroughly permeated with the Holy Scriptures. Therefore this Society will continue in the future, as it has been in the past, ever ready to do all in its power to this end, and after providing for the wants of its own large field, to assist its sister societies which occupy parts of our land where the darkness is more dense."

In moving the resolution the Rev. Dr. Stevenson gave a most eloquent address and it is much regretted that no report of it was taken.

The Reverend gentleman spoke of the splendid Dominion entrusted by God to the Canadian people: of its vast extent, the variety and richness of its resources. He spoke of the glorious future before Canadians as a nation, and of the advantages of having nearly all our history yet to make. He then pointed out the benefits of the characteristics of many of the various nationalities which are going to make up the Canadian people. In doing this he claimed that the French of the Province of Quebec, would be by no means the least valuable element, and pointed out the consequent importance of our doing our best to have that element thoroughly *Biblicised*.

The hymn "O Word of God Incarnate," was then sung, after which the Rev. Dr. Potts moved and Mr. James Brown seconded the 3rd resolution, which was as follows: "That the Bible Society affords so broad and catholic a basis for the co-operation of Christian men in its noble work, that it calls forth our warmest sympathy and support. It is, moreover, the active co-worker with all the Churches,—supplying them for their home work and foreign missions, with the Holy Scriptures in two hundred and fifteen different dialects and languages."

In moving the resolution the Rev. Dr. Potts said:

My aim to-night shall be not to create an interest in the Bible cause, but to deepen and intensify the interest already felt. Why should we resolve to persevere in helping the British and Foreign Bible Society in its vast undertaking?

First.—Because of the Providential character of its origin. That it is a child of Providence, every impartial student of its history must admit. Its subsequent movements, as well as its origin, go to establish the same point. It has been said very truly that it grew out of a want—the want of the Bible in Wales. The Rev. Thomas Charles, a minister of the Church of England, was one of the fathers of the great society. The scarcity of the Bible in Wales where he laboured led to its formation. We have an account of twelve Welsh peasants buying a Bible, each to have it one at a time. An old man who was the last subscriber wept bitterly saying, "Alas, it will be twelve months before my turn shall come, and I dare say I shall be gone before that time into another world." Mr. Charles was accustomed to question the children when he met them about his text. He met a little girl who could not tell him. Again she was asked which brought to light this fact—she had no Bible. There was none at hand. She had been accustomed to walk several miles to where she could get a Bible to read the chapter from which the text was selected. During that week the weather had been so stormy that she could not go. In 1802, Mr. Charles visited London. The subject of the Bible was much upon his mind. One morning while lying awake, he thought of a plan. At a meeting when he gave his views, the Rev. Joseph Hughes, secretary of the Tract Society gave expression to these memorable words,—"Surely a society might be formed for the purpose, and if for Wales, why not for the Empire and for the world." A meeting was called, and on the 7th of March, 1804, the British Foreign Bible Society was organized. Little did Mr. Charles know what he was instrumental in doing, when he helped to form that society. What mighty results have been flowing from the origin to which I have called your attention. Think of the vast circle of Christian influence of which the Bible Society is the vital centre.

Secondly.—Because of its broadening spiritual influence, we should pledge ourselves to sustain this great society. I believe in denominations—I believe in denominational convictions and teaching. The men who have such convictions, are the men who can afford to be liberal; and are the men to whom we look for the prosecution of the work of God in the world; but one of the perils of denominationalism is a tendency to narrowness—to narrowness of Christian thought, and to narrowness of Christian action. It is well

that there should be a process of broadening our spiritual character, without impairing our denominational attachment. You do not find that in loving all churches alike—nor in loving all churches so well that you cannot belong to any. I venture to state that the noble Society under whose auspices we are gathered to-night, enriches spiritual life, broadens Christian character, and yet makes the Episcopalian, the Presbyterian, a more sturdy upholder of his church views, and the Methodist more worthy of the name he bears. For this reason we find all the churches rallying around the standard of this Society—from the mitred bishop down to the humblest evangelist—from the Queen upon the throne and the Peers of the Realm, through all the ranks of Protestant society. Its Catholic and non-denominational character gives it a claim upon all the churches. The Bible Society has erected a platform of such materials, and based upon such fundamental principles that those of every denominational complexion can meet upon it; and independently of their views of doctrine and church polity, can aid in furthering the interests of the Bible Society. The Bible Society stands high and alone above all parties, and to it belongs the high honour, the great glory of bringing together, and engaging in the common work of spreading the knowledge of revealed truth, all those who receive the Bible as the word of God. It matters not to what branch of the Church you belong, there is no compromise of principle in being identified with the cause of the Bible. Lord Bexley, who was for seventeen years the President of the British and Foreign Bible Society, when reproached by a professor of divinity for uniting with Dissenters in the work replied: "So far from repenting of what I have done, I shall less and less repent of it as I approach that state where the distinction of Churchmen and Dissenters shall be no more." Side by side with the testimony of Lord Bexley we would place that of Dean Milner. "I would not for all this kingdom can bestow, have my conscience loaded with the bitter reflection that I had ever directly or indirectly been instrumental in obstructing the free progress of the British and Foreign Bible Society." Great has been the magnetic power of this Society, in drawing all sections of the Church together, and thus proving the true unity, the real oneness of the Protestant Church.

Moreover, the Bible Society is worthy of our most earnest support, because of its vital relation to the missionary organizations of the Church. One of the great purposes for which it has an existence is to evangelize the world. As the Church receives the spirit of Christ she evinces a Christlike zeal in seeking and saving the lost. But she may have men, men of Pauline culture, and men of Pauline consecration, who in the face of all the difficulties manifest in going into heathen lands and, unprotected, into the midst of hostile tribes, can say with that Prince of Gospel missionaries: "None of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself that I may finish my course with joy." But at every step in the progress of missionary work the churches are made to feel, all the churches are made to feel their dependence upon the Bible Society to furnish them with copies of the Word of God, translated into the tongue of the people sought to be rescued from the deep degradation of Paganism. There can be no substitute for the voice of the living Preacher; but what is he without the living word of the living God. All the soldiers on the frontier get their swords from the armoury of this society. Without the Bible Society the missionary operations of the Church would be curtailed to an alarming extent, and without the missionary societies of the churches furnishing through their learned missionaries material in the form of new translations, the scope of the Bible Society would be greatly lessened. They are partners, each essential to the other, and both requisite for the accomplishment of God's gracious purposes in the enlightenment and salvation of the race. As we are interested in the success of our

respective missionary organizations, let us support more strenuously that Society so vitally related to the missionary work of all the churches.

In the next place, the simple but sublime design of the Society places obligation upon us to aid it. It is to put into the hands of every human being on the face of the earth a copy of the Word of God. But what does that mean? What is done in doing so? It is to furnish a statute book for the government of the world, especially in the higher realm of being. Such is the effect of obedience to the law of this Bible that with David each may say of the laws:—"More to be desired are they than gold, yea, much fine gold, sweeter also than honey and the honeycomb." It is to supply the race—the morally hungry race with the true bread—the bread from heaven. They who eat of it look up and say "Lord evermore give us of this bread." It is to invest the human family with wealth which forbids the possibility of poverty. The wealth of the Book is that of the unsearchable riches of Christ. It is to illuminate all mankind with the wisdom which cometh from above. It is to place before every man an infallible guide to happiness, holiness, and Heaven. Such is the aim of the British and Foreign Bible Society. There is inspiration in the design, which lifts the soul to a higher altitude of faith, hope, and thought. No petty boundaries limit the movement of this great Society. God is in its plans; therefore all the race must be before our eyes and in our benevolent purposes. No other organization has so sublime a purpose as a motive to noble deeds of consecrated service.

Further, because of the certainty of ultimate and glorious success. There has been success, but very much remains to be done. There is no doubt about the future of this Divine cause. It is as certain as if the prophetic had already become the historic. I am not unaware of the mole-hill difficulties and mountainous antagonisms which seek to impede the progress of the Word of God. I know how vulgar Infidelity prates against the Bible, and cultured Scepticism insinuates the ice-berg atmosphere of doubt as to its inspiration, while condescending to admire its morality and extol the perfection of its teaching on many points. The present is a mixed state of victory and defeat, of pleasure and pain, of joy and sorrow, of light and darkness, of hope and desponding. But let us climb those Alpine heights of prophecy, and survey the prospect which those refreshing mountain-tops afford. And what a prospect it is! Shall I tell of the visions unfolded from those glorious heights,—the coming of the time when statesmanship shall bow before Him who is King of Kings,—the coming of a time, when learning shall fall in lowly reverence before Him in whom are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge,—the coming of a time, when "Holiness unto the Lord" shall be written upon the literature and commerce of the world. Yes, ye friends of the Bible, there is an era coming when there shall be light everywhere and darkness nowhere, peace everywhere and war nowhere, worship everywhere and heathen superstition nowhere, when instead of the crescent shall be the cross; instead of the Koran shall be the Bible; and instead of the reign of sin there shall be the reign of Him whose right it is to reign, from the rivers unto the ends of the earth. To the realization of all this the British and Foreign Bible Society is contributing a large share.

Finally, because of the Book itself we should support this society with an ever increasing liberality. The Book itself furnishes the best argument for the Bible Society. What a Book! What a history it has had! It claims authorship in God, the Holy Ghost, and bears upon it the image and super-scription of the Divine. It comes laden with unexhausted and inexhaustible treasures of redemption and salvation. Like its Divine author it is no respecter of persons. It knows no restrictions by reason of colour nor of clime, nor of station in life. It comes to man as man. It has lived through all the forms of opposition. It fears not the hammer of the geologist, nor

the fire of the chemist, nor the telescope of the astronomer, nor the development of any or of all science. The Bible professes to teach the science of salvation and the art of serving God. The most herculean efforts to crush it have failed. This Book is wonderful in the intensity of its friends and in the virulence of its foes. It has had a history almost miraculous. Fire could not consume it. Water could not drown it. Infidelity could not overthrow it; and all forms of opposition have had to confess its indestructibility. The Bible is changeless amid the mutations of all things earthly. "The Word of the Lord endureth forever." The Bible can hardly meet in the future greater opposition than in the past. The loftiest and most gigantic Goliaths of Scepticism and Atheism, have confronted this meek but heroic David, and they have fallen with many a mortal wound. Why have we a Bible? Because there was a Saviour to reveal. Why have we a Bible Society? Because man needs to know of the life, and love, and power of Jesus Christ, and the Bible is the infallible revelation of Him. This society sends it forth not because the Bible is a book of beautiful biography, of ancient history, of profound philosophy, of exquisite poetry, of and of unequalled literature,—does this society send it forth to all lands and peoples. The Bible Society is not blind to the literary attractions of the Book. Its beauties of thought and style have entranced the friends of the Bible Society. But it is sent forth because it testifies of Christ. They know in sending it that they are sending the "Desire of all Nations." They are sending light for the world's darkness, joy for the world's sorrow, hope for the world's despair, medicine for the world's healing, pardon for the world's guilt, and life for the world's death. O Book of God! O testimony of Jesus Christ! Thou art more precious than rubies. Thou comest to us breathing benedictions innumerable and inestimable. We think of thy doctrines and promises and of the help and comfort thou hast been to the generations which have passed on before us. Under thy shadow our fathers were screened from the scorching sun. At thy fountain they drew the water of life with joy. In life's temptations thou didst succour them, in life's duties thou didst strengthen them, in life's sorrows thou didst comfort them, and in life's last hour they heard thy voice saying unto them: "Let not your heart be troubled." What thou hast been to our fathers thou art and will be to us, their children. Of thee, this is our testimony:

This Book unfolds Jehovah's mind,
 This Voice salutes in accents kind,
 This Friend will all our need supply,
 This Fountain sends forth streams of joy,
 This Mine affords us boundless wealth,
 This Good Physician gives us health,
 This Sun renews and warms the soul,
 This Sword both wounds and makes us whole,
 This Letter shews our sins forgiven,
 This Guide conducts us safe to Heaven,
 This Charter has been sealed with blood,
 This Volume is the Word of God.

The hymn "Lord of All Power and Might" was then sung, and the collection taken up.

It was then moved by Colonel Moffatt, seconded by Dr. Hodgins, and unanimously carried, "That the hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to the pastor and trustees of this church for its use on the present occasion, and to the precentor for his valuable services in connection with this annual meeting.

The meeting was closed with the benediction pronounced by the Rev. Dr. Castle.
