It is in this sense we spoke of Pyle and the Wheaton iceman, Obviously, if "Red" was to get 45 per cent. of the earnings, as later reports have confirmed, they both made each other financially. And so far as we know, "Red" is doing no kicking over Mr. Pyle's exceptionally keen guidance. In fact, today he is "made" financially and the majority of sport fans are glad that he is. 


