Decide Not to Join Coal Strike-Some 275,000 Men Are Out Some 2/5,000 Men Are Out
London, July 23—The most hopeful
feature of the coal strike situation last
night was a decision by the Welsh
miners at a conference at Cardiff not to
join the Yorkshire movement. There
was no great accession of strength to
the strike movement yesterday. The
men on strike total about 275,000, Yorkshire, Derbyshire, Nottingham and
Monmouth being the counties mainly
affected.

London, July 23—Andrew Bonar Law, the government spokesman, told a questioner in the House of Commons yesterday that as far as the government was aware there was no particular person behind the miners' unrest and that the movent seemed to be a protest against the increase in the price of coal, against the dearness of living, against military interference in Russia and conscription.

The strikers, however, appear to be in rather a bad mood, and seem to fear that troops will follow the naval men in an attempt to break the strike.





Notice to Employers of Labor WHEREAS on the 17th day of April A.D., 1919, His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor and Council did by Order-in-Council bring within the scope of Part 1 of the "WORK-MEN'S COMPENSATION ACT, 1918," from and after

MEN'S COMPENSATION ACT, 1918," from and after August 1st, 1919, the following industries, viz.:

"Persons employed in the woods in logging, cutting of timber, pulp-wood, fire-wood, railroad ties or sleepers, river driving, rafting, booming, or the transportation of logs, timber, pulp-wood, fire-wood or railroad ties or sleepers."

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that all persons engaged in any of the above mentioned industries are required to file a statement of their estimated payroll from August 1st, 1919, to December 31st, 1919, inclusive, with the said board, on or before the 1st day of August, 1919.

AND FURTHER NOTICE that any employer neglecting or refusing to furnish such estimate or information is liable to a penalty not exceeding \$20.00 per day for each day of such default, and is further liable for damages, as provided by Part two of said Act, in respect of any injury to any workman in his employ during the period of such default.

NOTE—Forms for furnishing such information will be supplied on application.





WATCHMEN AND BONUS. To the Editor of the Times:

Sir,—I noticed in an evening paper published here that all government employes do not benefit in receiving a share of the bonus which has been allotted by the dominion government. This bonus I am given to understand was awarded so as to meet the increase in living expenses owing to the increased cost of commodities. Why is it that the watchmen employed on the government wharves at West St. John are not receiving any benefit? Surely it is not the intention of the authorities to omit these men, whose wages are considerably less than \$1,200 a year. Ten million dollars is the sum to be appropriated again, so surely some one will see to it that these watchmen be included so as to make the remuneration they receive something near a living wage. To the Editor of the Times:

No man should get less than \$4 a day in these times but the watchmen are getting only \$2.75 a day and a married man cannot exist on that amount.

It is said that a dollar is worth 100 cents but not when you buy bread, milk and boots, etc., as it buys only about thirty cents worth of these things.

Considering that this port has come through the whole period of the war without mishap when the sheds have had all kinds of explosives in them, is it too much to ask that watchmen receive a living wage—or at least receive ceive a living wage—or at least receive the bonus which the government has set aside for only some of its employes?

U. S. LIQUOR LAW

Drastic Provisions Retained and Bill Goes Through by Large Majority - Now up to Senate

Washington, July 22.—By a vote of nearly three to one, the House, weary of talk on prohibition, today passed a bill for its enforcement, with provisions and penalties so drastic as to bring from the men who framed it the prediction that it would forever suppress the liquor traffic on American soil.

Exactly one hundred member, fifty-two Democrats and forty-eight Republicans, refused to support it. Against this even one hundred the prohibitionists, putting up a solid front to the very last, polled 287 votes. The measure now goes to the Senate, where many of its restrictions may be modified or stricken out. The cloak-room rumor persisted that all of this legislative work might end on the shoal of a presidential veto, although

The bill as it passed the House provides that after January 26, 1920, every person permitted under the law to have liquor in his possession shall report the quantity and kind to the commissioner of internal revenue. This applies to chemists, physicians, etc.

After February, 1, 1920, the possession of any liquor, other than as authorized to lawfully.

After February as a uniform to be illegal to have in one's possession liquor in a private dwelling, and the liquor is used for personal consumption by the owners, his family or his guests. The possessor of such liquors, however, bears the burden of proof that the liquor was acquired and is possessed lawfully.

Registered physicians are authorized to issue precriptions under strict regulations for the use of liquor in cases where it may be considered necessary as a mediant.
