Washington, Feb. 15.—The McCall reciprocity bill, adopted in the house by a vote of 221 to 89 without change from the form in which it was presented by the speaker and passed by the senate today in the hands of its chief enemies—the "stand-paids," Republican senators.

No definite forecast of the treatment which the measure will receive in the senate has been made, although the friends of the reciprocity programme are claiming a large majority when the matter comes to a vote, despite the opposition manifested by senate leaders.

The attitude of the president is expected to have considerable influence on the senate's action. Within the last few days he has made it clear to members of the house that the reciprocity measure must be acted on by congress before March 4.

It was decided to meet again after the present had had an opportunity to talk the matter over with clients.

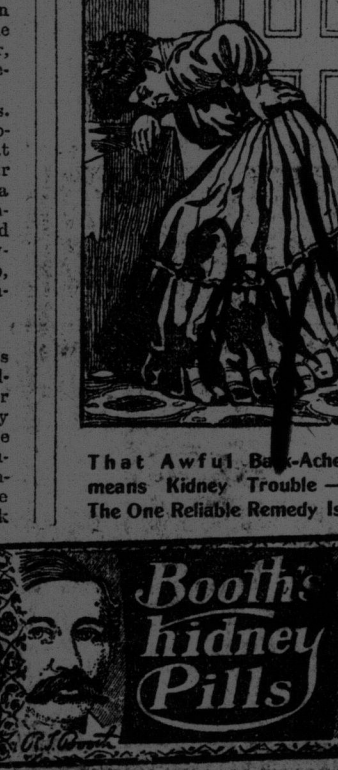

BRITISH SCHOONER IS SEIZED

Dreamought Captain Placed in Jail at Isle of Pines, Jamaica

TARIFF REDUCTION Jamaica Prosperous and May Lower Duties—A Boom for Georgian Bay Canal—Insurrections Fall, Navarro Enters Jurez—Notes from Early Despatches

Kingston, Jan. 14.—Word has been received here of the seizure of the British schooner Dreamought, by the authorities of the Isle of Pines, the vessel, which is of local register, left the Cayman Islands carrying passengers, and on arrival at her destination, was seized for breach of the immigration laws.

Boston, Feb. 14.—Setting forth that the proposed reciprocity agreement with Canada would prove beneficial to all classes of people, both in the United States and Canada, the joint legislative committee on federal relations today reported favorably to the general court of Massachusetts a resolution endorsing the agreement.

Ottawa, Feb. 14.—The federated boards of trade have asked the civil publicity department for a grant for the furtherance of the objects of the federated boards, principal among which at the present time is the Georgian Bay canal.

Mr. Powell said that in the past great mistakes had been made in Canada by lack of care to expedite the location of lines. Roads had been pulled here and there by political parties.

Next, Mr. Powell dealt with the proposed building of the St. John Valley line. It was to be part of a transcontinental system, led the dominion government to build it, but the province of New Brunswick should not do it.

The next phase of his subject was government ownership. He looked forward to an extension of the company system in Canada, with a commission safeguarding the interests of the people.
