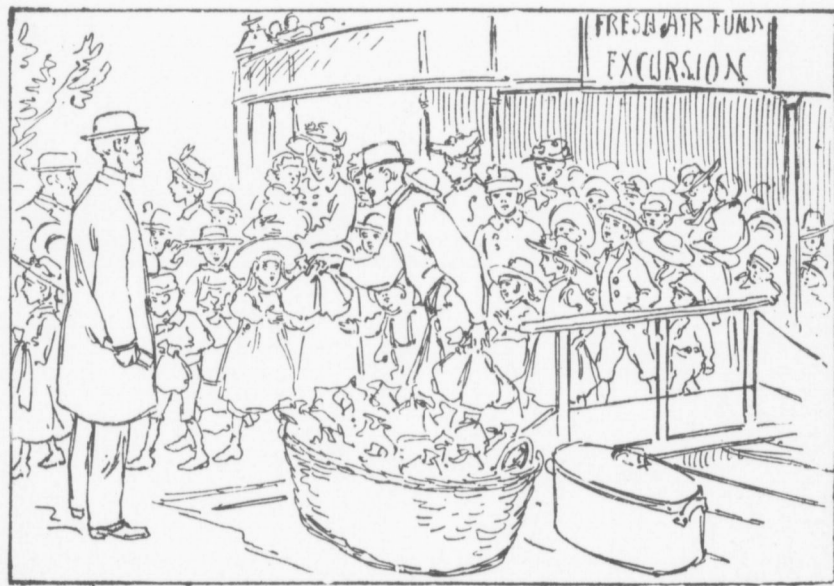

TO THE SUBSCRIBERS AND FRIENDS :—

Another season's work has come to a close ; and, in presenting this Report, we would thank all our friends and well-wishers for the kindly support which we have hitherto experienced at their hands, and which we hope will be as freely continued during the coming season of 1895.

A meeting to organize the Committee for the season of 1894 was held on 15th of May, and the following officers were elected :—

Dr. L. F. MacKenzie was appointed Chief Medical Officer (in the city), his duties being to inspect the homes of applicants for admission to the Fresh-Air Home at Chambly, and to report upon the condition of their health, to the Inmates Sub-Committee.

Miss Ryan was appointed Matron in charge of the Home at Chambly, and, although this was the first year that Miss Ryan worked in connection with the Fresh-Air Fund, we hope it may not by any means be the last, for her duties were performed very satisfactorily throughout the season.

Mr. Wm. Oliver, B.A., a fourth year medical student of McGill University, was Medical Superintendent at Chambly, and deserves our special thanks for his unremitting care and attention to the wants of all who came within the sphere of his duties.



REPORT OF THE SUB-COMMITTEE, ON THE  
SELECTION OF INMATES.

---

This Sub-Committee met as formerly three days each week, at 3 p. m., to deal with applications for admission to the Home at Chambly Canton. Special precautions were taken this year to render the work safe, and to minimise by every possible way the risk of carrying out to the Home any infectious disease that might be lurking in the city. Our experience of last year showed the propriety of taking every possible precaution. Accordingly our Doctor in the city was engaged to devote his whole time to the investigation of cases, to ascertain whether the applicants could be safely admitted, and that there was no danger in the neighborhood in which they lived. To this arrangement we are, no doubt, largely indebted for the very gratifying results of the season. And not only were there no epidemics, but the general health of the Home was very good. As usual, many weak and sickly children were taken down, some of them, after all other remedies had failed ; yet of the upwards of 1,000 children and mothers, there were only two deaths recorded.

After the necessary preparations had been made for their reception, in the way of ventilation and cleaning up, also laying in the necessary supplies, the first of the inmates, in all 141, arrived at the Home on the twenty-ninth of June, and were taken charge of by the Matron and her assistants. The very young and sickly were driven from the Railway Station, and the others walked to the Home, about a mile and a half distant. The same process was repeated week after week, during the season. Part of the wise precaution taken this year was to guard against *overcrowding* ; yet, during the eight weeks—from the commencement of the work on the 29th of June to the close on the 23rd of August,—no fewer than 1,044 mothers and children had enjoyed a possible two weeks' stay at Chambly. The class from which the inmates are drawn is the same year by year. We try to vary the *individuals* as much as prudence will allow ; but the *class* remains the same. They chiefly come from the

lower levels of the city, where the Sanitary conditions are most defective and the atmosphere is most vitiated. They all have to bring a certificate from their Minister or Priest, or some responsible person:—(1) that they need the benefits of the Fresh-Air Fund ; (2) that their general disposition and moral character are such as to fit them to become inmates of such a Home ; and (3) that their circumstances are such that they could not secure such advantages without such aid.

With regard to the great majority of applicants we experience little difficulty in satisfying both ourselves and the great body of the subscribers. Our difficulties lie chiefly with the very poor, those who have fallen so far that they have not much ambition to rise, or perhaps find it difficult to secure the necessary certificates. We have also a difficulty with some whose appearance at first sight might suggest that they did not need such help. There are people living in the lower levels of the city with large families, earning fair wages and doing their utmost to rear and educate their children ; yet who, after paying for food and necessary clothing, making allowance for education and Doctor's bills, find it as utterly impossible to secure a fortnight's fresh air in the country as their poorer and less successful neighbors. But to say the least of it, their lives and the health of their children, are as valuable to the community as many of those who care less for appearances and are doing less for society. Many of the class we now refer to would not know where to go for a fortnight's sojourn, would not know what to do with themselves when they got there, and the expenditure going and returning and providing the necessary supplies, would cost them a great deal more than they cost the Society of the Fresh-Air Fund, with its large number of *voluntary* workers.

The Committee feel thankful for the success of their work during the past year, that so many were taken from the city and returned to their homes without a single serious accident, although the majority of them were very young, and all unused to travelling. We experienced the utmost consideration and help from the various railway employees. They did everything that could be expected to make the journeys safe and pleasant.

### THE EXCURSION SUB-COMMITTEE

Did a very important work supplementary to the work at the Chambly Home. This Committee can reach a class who could not spare so much time from their domestic duties and worries as would enable them to spend a fortnight anywhere in the country. What a boon for hundreds, who are so situated, are the whole day's excursions to Sherringham Park or to any similar place that might be selected! Tickets for the trip are distributed by members of the Committee, who have the city divided into districts, and are expected to go over their districts as far as the tickets at their disposal for the trip will allow, and to begin each time where they left off the time before. The holders of the tickets are on the tiptoe of expectation for some days, and are early at the appointed place, when the happy morning arrives. They spend two hours and a half going and coming in the pleasant sunshine, and about three hours in the park. The materials for a substantial dinner are served as they leave the boat. There is plenty of milk for the little folks and tea for those of riper years. Then come the swings and other amusements, till the bell for the start homeward is heard. In all there were three trips during the past season. The Committee realize their great value, and feel that the only limit to this part of the work is the pecuniary one. There were 1,850 persons who received the benefits of these excursions this year. We could have made at least five trips during the season, had the means been forthcoming. At the same time much was done, and the staff of volunteers, both ladies and gentlemen, did good service, and enjoyed the work.

### THE PURCHASING SUB-COMMITTEE.

In pursuance of the plan adopted last year, this Committee called for tenders for meat, groceries, milk, bread, butter, ice and coal, and awarded the contracts in each case to the lowest responsible tenderer. This plan has been proved to be very satisfactory by the experience of former years, and this year has fully satisfied us of its efficiency.

### THE FINANCE SUB-COMMITTEE

Submit herewith a statement of receipts and expenditures, duly audited by Messrs. P. S. Ross & Sons, Chartered Accountants. From this it will be seen that the gross receipts were \$4,099.21 ; the expenditures \$4,059.65 ; which latter includes the repayment of the balance of Messrs. Graham & Co's loan of 1893, amounting to \$390.00 ; and this leaves a small balance of \$39.56 on hand. We would like to say that the intention of the Committee, in the matter of expenditure, is to keep strictly within the amount received for our work from friends from year to year, and on no account to run into debt ; so that, if the public appreciate the work, and desire its further continuance and extension, they will show this best by continuing and increasing the support which they have hitherto given us.

In conclusion, the Committee desires to record special thanks to all the subscribers and donors of clothing and supplies ; to C. F. Sise, Esq., of the Bell Telephone Co. ; to W. B.
