ANNUAL MEETING, 1871.

MAY 8th, 1871.

The Annual Meeting of members was held in the Lecture Room this evening, the 2nd Vice-President in the chair. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The annual Report was then read by the Secretary, and, on the motion of Mr. Spry, seconded by Mr. W. Lee, that the report be received and adopted. Mr. J. J. Withrow moved, seconded by Mr. Shanklin, that the report as now presented be not received, but be referred back with instructions to embody in the report an account of the change in the *personnel* of the Board and reason for such change. On being put to the vote the latter motion was carried. The meeting then adjourned until the following Monday.

MAY 15th.

The Meeting adjourned on May 8th was held this evening, Mr Fensom, 2nd Vice-President, in the chair.

The Secretary read the Annual Report as amended, according to the resolution passed at the previous meeting of members, May 8th. On the the motion of Mr. J. J. Withrow, seconded by Mr. Davison, the report was received and adopted.

Moved by Mr. Sheppard, seconded by Mr. McCrosson, that all the words after "attending the classes" be struck out in the section regarding evening classes. This motion was lost.

Moved by Mr. J. J. Withrow, seconded by Mr. T. Davison, that in conse-

quence of the errors in the nomination list and the neglect to present a proper constitutional list, that the Provisional Board be requested to prepare a nomination list and that it be filled up in a constitutional manner. This motion on being put to the vote was carried.

On the motion of Mr. J. J. Withrow, seconded by Mr. Davison, the meeting adjourned *sine die*.

JULY 7th, 1871.

The Meeting adjourned May 15th was held this evening for election of officers. Mr. F. H. Medcalf in the chair.

On the motion of Mr. McCrosson, seconded by Mr. Maclear, Messrs. Badenach Crawford and Foster were appointed scrutineers of the ballot.

The Chairman declared Mr. Sweetnam elected as President for the ensuing year, there being no opposition.

ANNUAL REPORT, 1871.

Mr. S. BRODIE, Secretary, read the annual report of the Directors, as follows:—

The Directors of the Toronto Mechanics' Institute, beg leave to present their report for the year ending May 1st, 1871, being the forty-first year of the existence of this institution.

During the year a change occurred in the *personnel* of the Board of Directors, under the following circumstances:—A resolution was passed at a meeting of the Board held on the 6th January, 1871, dispensing with the services of the Secretary, after the expiration of his years services [Feb. 4th]. On the evening of January 19th, a special meeting of the members was held pursuant to a requisition signed by twenty-four of the members, to take into consideration the resolution passed by the Board of Directors, and the propriety of calling upon them to withdraw and cancel the said resolution. At this meeting the following resolution was adopted on the motion of Mr Bunting, seconded by Mr. W. S. Smart, "That in the opinion of this meeting the proposed dismissal of Mr. Brodie, the Secretary, by the Board of Directors, is not desirable at present, and that the Directors be, and are hereby requested to rescind the resolution passed at the last meeting of the Board dismissing the Secretary, and further, that it is the opinion of this meeting that Mr. Brodie has discharged his duties as satisfactorily as could reasonably be expected considering his very recent appointment." The Board of Directors did not deem it proper to take any action upon this until the Regular Quarterly Meeting which was held on February the 15th, the Secretary being in the meantime retained in the service of the Institute. At this meeting the following resolution was carried on the motion of Mr. Graham, seconded by Mr. Brunskill—"That this meeting appoints a committee of five to confer with the Directors upon the subject of their resolution passed at last meeting,

and to investigate the books of the Institute and the conduct of his duties by the Secretary, and to report thereon at the next meeting of the Institute, to consist of Messrs Clark, Murray, Arthurs, Boyd and Bunting." Messrs. Davison, McCrosson, Edwards, Hamilton, Marston, Jones, Walton, Taylor, Sheppard, and Withrow, considering this reflected upon their conduct, presented their resignations and subsequently Messrs. McLennan and Gurney retired, not however until after Messrs. Lewis, Bigelow, Morrison, Sweetnam, Fensom, Graham, Ridout, Turner, Bunting, McMaster and Medcalf had been elected to fill the vacancies Messrs. Frazer and Steiner were subsequently added.

The net receipts of 1869-70 were, after deducting cash on hand at beginning of the year and the amount due Treasurer. . \$6,520 45
 And the net receipts for 1870-71, after deducting amount due the late Treasurer, were. 7,128 64

Showing an increase in the receipts of \$607 59. At the date of the last annual report the floating liabilities and amount due the Treasurer were \$2,916 45. At the present time they amount to \$2,609 97, showing a reduction of \$306 48.

In preparing the statement of assets only one half the amount of members subscriptions remaining unpaid since the first of February was taken in account, which is a much smaller amount than was included in the calculation of last year.

Under these circumstances your Directors have every reason to believe that the affairs of the Institute are in a better financial condition than at the date of their last report. For a statement of assets and liabilities see appendix B.

LIBRARY AND READING-ROOM.

Your Directors have done as much as lay in their power to keep the library and reading-room in an efficient state. The thanks of the Institute are due to a large number of publishers for their liberality in continuing to furnish the reading-room with their periodicals free of charge.

EVENING CLASSES.

The classes during the year have been conducted with their usual efficiency. There has however been a decrease of 106 in the number of pupils attending the classes, and of \$126 60 in the receipts arising therefrom, not including the grant from the Northern Railway Company.

The usual examinations were held, and the distribution of prizes awarded to successful pupils took place on the 19th April. Hon. George Brown presided, and together with Prof. Wilson, Dr. Connon and Prof. Buckland, presented the prizes. Once more the directors have to acknowledge the continued liberality of the Northern Railway Company of Canada, and the generous support extended by its managing director, Mr. Cumberland, to the institution.

LECTURES AND ENTERTAINMENTS.

During the year with a view of introducing popular scientific lectures Dr. Machattie, of London, delivered two lectures.

If it is considered desirable to have a series of lectures under the auspices of the Institute it will become necessary to affiliate with the Lecture Bureaus of the Western and Eastern States as nearly all public lecturers are members of one or other of these associations.

CONCLUSION.

Your directors have long felt that it was highly desirable that the mechanics of this city should take a much warmer interest in the management of this Institute than they have done, and with this object in view circulars were issued inviting delegates

from the various workshops and factories to meet your Board for consultation. The meeting was held in the lecture room on Saturday, the 22nd April, and your Board are gratified to be able to report that they have every reason to believe that the object they had in view will yet be accomplished.

Your directors would also strongly urge upon their successors the advisability of taking some decided action towards the reduction of the debt before entering upon any new enterprise.

In conclusion we have to report that all the officers of the Institution have performed their duties to the satisfaction of your Board of Directors.

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
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


