## OVER 503 PEOPLE DROWNED.

The most borrible catastrophe that has ever oreurred in steamship traffic took place in the early morning of July 4th, near Sable Is'and, off Nova Scotia. The great French liner, "La Burgoyne" was rus into by the iron sailing vessel, "(Yromartyshire," a hole stove in her side, and in half an hour she lay in the bottom of the sea. She was boand from New York for Havre, France. and had on board 725 souls, of whom only 163 were resened. It was during a dense fog that the accident occured. Instead of heroie discipline, which so often has been the one bright feature of such moments, the crew fought like demons for the few lite boats and rafts, battling the helpless passengers away frons their ouly means of salvation, with the result that the strong overcame the weak, and the list of 163 saved contains the name of but one woman.

L, LeB. Milcs will leave in a short time for Camplorllton, where he will at once commence work on the Restigouche and Western railway that will run from Campbellton to Graud Falls. They will build the first twenty miles this year. Malcolm and Ross are building the whole road. Mr Miles is to be the chief engineer. The whole distance is 120 miles. The country is well timbered and watered. Fish of every kind abound in the numrerous streams and the forestis full of big gane. The road will follow the divide between the Restigouche and the Upsalquitch rivers until it comes to the Victoria county line which it follows the St. John waters down to Grand Falls. -Woolstock Dispatch.

The Corporation Drive.
Mr. R. Aiken reached the booms with the last drive of the corporation lumber at noon yesterday. There was $20,000,000$ feet in the drive. A rise of about four feet of water took place on the upper waters the last of last week, taking all the stranded logs off the shore, and making driving easy and rapid.-Fredericton Gleaner.
