



HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 3 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the sal/



ARE WARNED OFF

VICTORIA, B. C., April 6—The estimates for the year ending June 30, 1908, presented to the Legislature yesterday show an increase in revenue of \$638,500 over the present year. The estimate for land sales is almost double that of last year, the increase being made largely owing to the recent sale of Government lands in Vancouver, a considerable balance from which is still outstanding. For timber royalties the estimate is raised \$300,000 over that of last year owing largely to the increased activity in the lumber markets. Miscellaneous interest has been raised from five to twenty thousand. The expenditure shows a decrease in the cost of the public departments amounting to \$55,000, while the debt itself will be reduced \$296,530. Salaries are increased over \$20,000, the provincial police alone getting \$10,000 more than last year. The cost of education is increased \$61,000 and \$25,000 is set aside for fighting forest fires.

Concluding a vigorous address Finance Minister Tatlow said the credit of the province is now established on a firm basis and the attention of fellow-subjects has been attracted in our direction, and it will not be long until the province rises to the position it must occupy sooner or later as the wealthiest province of the Dominion.


