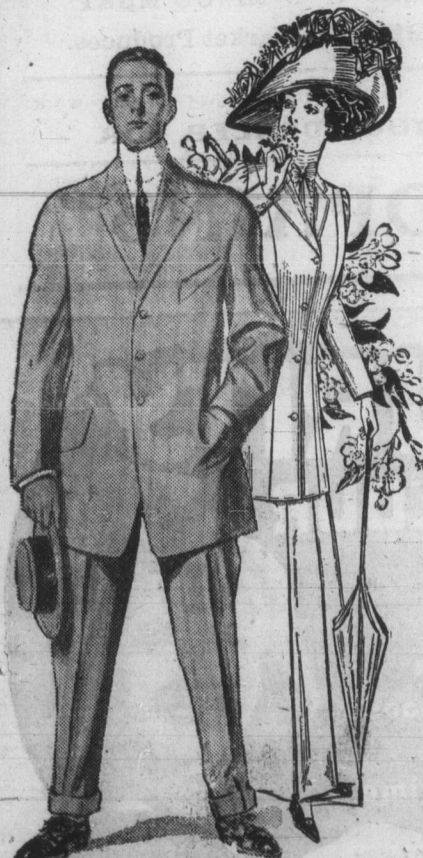

BOARD OF TRADE IS GROWING

Want Twice-a-Day Train to Causapsc ---Technical Educational Discussed.

At a meeting of the Board of Trade held on Monday evening Messrs. W. D. Duncan and George Glennie were elected members. A committee was appointed to consider the advisability of a train to run between here and Causapsc after noon and evening and to report. The committee appointed to look into the question of the train service eastward is reported progress, the main question being left over in the meantime as it was proposed that the Limited would be put on earlier this year. The chairman was authorized to find two substitutes for the original delegates chosen to go to Ottawa regarding Sugarloaf St. and an outlet to the river. The Board will foot the bills of the delegation. There was a long discussion on the question of technical education for Campbellton which was left open until the plans of the school trustees were known.

SMALL CLAIMS ACT

JUDGEMENT RESERVED

The case of Mary Williams against the Government Railways management Board, commenced at Dalhousie on March 29, was finished last week. His Honor Judge McLachy reserved judgement which will be delivered on May 4th.

The action is against the Railway for misdelivery of goods to the value of \$175.00 consigned to the plaintiff who is a Syrian shopkeeper and reseller here.

The defence offered was that the goods were delivered by the Railway to the real owner, another Syrian woman named Mary Heaney. Some interesting family difficulties were aired among the parties. The action is the first tried in this province under the Small Claims Act passed at the last session, giving county courts jurisdiction in cases of negligence against the Government Railways to the amount of \$200.00.

Wm. Murray, and H. A. Powell, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff and Jas. Friel for the Railway.

CAMPBELLTON TOWN COUNCIL ORGANIZES

Hoases Reported Built on Street---Permit for Laundry Refused By Council

The first meeting of the council was held last Friday evening. His Worship Mayor McDonald presiding.

On the meeting being called to order the town clerk read the report of nominations and elections, after which His Honor Judge McLachy swore in the Councillors, all of whom were present. The taking of the oath concluded, the Mayor thanked Judge McLachy for his kindness in attending and swearing in the members of the Council and the Judge acknowledging the compliment then withdrew.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and after a question or two from the new members were confirmed.

The standing committees for the year were then appointed as follows:

Bye-Laws and Legislation—The Mayor, Councillor Mowat and Miller.

Financing and Auditing—Councillor Miller, Alexander and the Mayor.

Assessments and Appeals—Councillors McKenzie, Moores and Alexander.

Police and License, Councillors Lunam, White and Moores.

Public Property and Streets—Councillors Pinault, Miller and White.

Water and Sewerage—Councillors Alexander, McKenzie and the Mayor.

Electric Light—Councillors Mowat, Lunam and Alexander.

Fire Protection—Councillors White, Pinault and Mowat.

Education and Improvements—the Mayor, Councillors Lunam and Mowat.

Public Charities—Councillors Moore, McKenzie and Pinault.

The regular order of business was then reverted to.

Communication read from F. M. Murray re expiration of Liability Insurance. Matter referred to Finance Committee.

Communication read from John T. Reid acting Building Inspector regarding a number of buildings which were built on the street lines, also enclosing a sketch of the proposed laundry for George Sansom.

In reply to questions the Town Solicitor said that under section 3 of the Building By-Laws if in the opinion of this council the laundry as proposed would be a nuisance the permit could be refused.

In the discussion which followed it was pointed out that apart from the fire danger the proposed building would be a public nuisance in that there was no sewer on that street and all waste water would need to drain into the I. C. R. ditch.

It was therefore resolved that the permit be refused and the matter placed in the town solicitor's hands. The matter of the houses built on the street lines was referred to the Public Property and Streets committee.

Communication read from W. D. Duncan re the abandonment of the land on Gerrard street, deeded to the town for a school site.

This was referred to the solicitor for his legal opinion.

Petition from Norman Gray for a license for a Dance Hall in Union street was referred to the Police and License committee, as was also a petition from Howard Harris, for a restaurant at the corner of Water and Victoria streets.

The town clerk presented the accounts from the Board of Health which had been held over from last meeting and these amounting to \$362.53 were ordered to be paid.

Answering a question from Councillor Mowat, His Worship said that the street cleaning of the town was engaging the attention of the Board of Health at the present time.

Councillor Moores questioned the Mayor on the cases of contractors when finishing buildings leaving all their refuse and truck scattered around, and also the disgraceful condition of Gerrard street.

The feeling in the council was that something should be done without loss of time and the streets committee were authorized to purchase a car load of lumber at once and Councillor Pinault promised that the streets most needing sidewalks would have them immediately the lumber was here. The chairman of the streets committee also promised to give his attention to the private crossings laid down to see that they were properly graded and laid.

After desultory discussion on the supplying of goods to the council by Councillors which had no definite finding, Council adjourned.

**RECIPROCITY AGAIN
PASSES U. S. HOUSE**

**This Time the Vote Was 265 to 89 and Further
Reductions Are Favored**

Washington, April 21—President Taft's Canadian reciprocity agreement, supported by all but a handful of Democrats, and opposed by a majority of the Republicans, passed the house of representatives early this evening by a vote of 265 to 89.

With nearly 200 Democrats in control, and their action endorsed by a large body of the Republicans, the bill to put the agreement in force was adopted with no amendments, and in almost identical form as it passed the house in the last session of the preceding congress.

The bill seeks to put into effect the formal agreement reached between President Taft and members of the Canadian cabinet for a reduction of tariff rates on many articles, and free trade in many others, across the Canadian border. Added to it by the Democratic leaders is a section which "authorizes" requests President Taft to make further efforts to secure still freer trade relations with Canada, in the form of additional reciprocity relations.

BILLS PASSED

AT FREDERICTON

SEVEN YEARS' DISQUALIFICATION

To be the Penalty for Corrupt Practice in Provincial Elections.

In the House of Assembly this month the Bill respecting inquiries as to corrupt practices at elections was passed. By its provisions any twenty-five electors, irrespective of party, after an election may, if they believe there has been corruption practiced on one or both sides, file a petition with the Chief Justice and he appoints two judges to try the case. These judges have full powers to summon witnesses and do anything else necessary for a complete investigation. After trial these judges can submit their report to the registrar of the Supreme Court in which they state who the guilty parties are. This report is sent to the clerk of the County Court where the corrupt practices occurred and he then takes action against the parties named. A deposit must be made by those filing the petition in order to insure bona fides. The penalty provided is the disqualification from voting for seven years.

NEW H

Ottawa, April 12—June 3rd the birthday of His Majesty King George and June 22nd, Coronation day, will be proclaimed as statutory legal holidays in Canada. Some time ago His Majesty intimated through the Colonial Office that he would prefer to have his birthday celebrated on the actual anniversary of his birth instead of adhering to the precedent set by his father in keeping Victoria Day.

RITES AND CEREMONIES

Many Chief Actors in Edward's Coronation Have Passed Away

As far as the rites and ceremonies of the Coronation are concerned, the precedent of 1902 will be strictly followed. In that particular respect the duties of the Earl Marshal and the Lord Chamberlain have proved much lighter than they were eight years ago. The greatest changes that will be noted in the pageant that attends the Coronation of King George and Queen Mary will be in the dramatic personae. Of the chief actors in the last great historic event of the crowning of a British King and then Prime and the then Archbishop of York are no more. Lord Salisbury and the Duke of Devonshire have been gathered to their fathers, and among others who figured largely in the brilliant spectacle of eight years ago, and who have gone over to the majority, are the late Lord Derby and the late Earl Spencer—two of the four Knights of the Garter who held the canopy for the King's anointing. Many others who played a prominent part in the public and private life of the late King have been found absent, and the exigencies of political life will have forced many others into the background.

CORONATION TRICKS

Abused Frauds that are Being Practised on the People.

Already many persons have hit upon a variety of tricks and devices for turning the Coronation to account for their personal profit.

One of the most impudent of these tricks is a device adopted by some shopkeepers of selling brooches, satins, lace, and embroideries as remnants of the Coronation robes. These robes are being made by making this absurd claim for their goods. In country districts, where the people are more easily deceived, these robes have been able to trick a number of unwary people into paying for goods, well-manufactured young lady has been collecting funds in London for the benefit of public institutions, stating that the money was to purchase a gift which the institutions in question intended to present to their Majesties on the occasion of the Coronation. The young lady has disappeared recently, and the institutions she pretended to represent have now for the first time heard of her and the Coronation gift from the people who subscribed to it.

There are also bogus Coronation seat syndicates and their agents. Before the last Coronation, numbers of simple-minded people were induced to pay for seats by persons who called at their houses with tickets and represent themselves as an agent of a large syndicate which has bought up so many seats that they are in a position to offer them at very low prices. But, however, the device is worked, the results, so far as the purchaser of the faked tickets for seats is concerned, is the same—he is simply swindled out of his money.

The Coronation year is, of course, being actively exploited by vendors of cheap goods. All sorts of cheap china and metal ornaments are being put on the market in huge quantities, bearing pictures of their Majesties and this year's date. These goods are sometimes being sold at quite a hundred per cent. above the prices normally obtained for them, though the crude figures of the King and Queen which they bear do not increase the cost of their production one fraction of a penny.

It may be noted that a number of people buy the Coronation year's souvenirs under the foolish impression that they will become much more valuable later. They are produced in such numbers that it is inconceivable that they will ever be valuable to collectors.

Roses for the Coronation. One firm in Hertfordshire has planted 50,000 Coronation roses, which are to bloom in June. They are being grown in all sorts of fashions, some in a state of the tree, some of about 3,000 roses.

town.

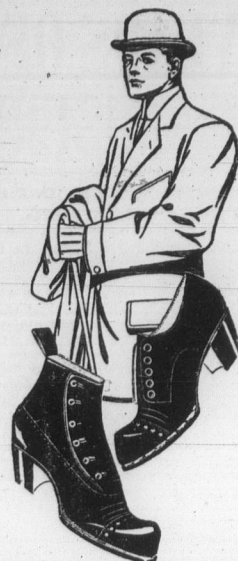

"BRAVEST MAN IN 1910"

The King received recently at Buckingham Palace the bravest man in 1910, Frank Fraser, chief engineer on the Aberdeen trawler Den-side, and presented him with the Stachope gold medal awarded by the royal Humane Society, only one of which is given annually.

It was on that night of August 27 last that Fraser's heroic deed was performed. The Den-side was fishing at the time on the Viking Bank about 225 miles from Aberdeen, and though it was blowing hard with a heavy sea running, the captain decided to shoot the trawl.

Unfortunately a deck hand was standing on a part of the net, and was carried over the side of the vessel Fraser, who was below, rushed up on hearing the shouting, and at once plunged into the seething water, when he discovered that it was his own brother. It was only after fifteen minutes' patient work that both were got safely on board again.

Accompanied by Admiral Sir G. D. Morant (chairman of the Royal Humane Society, General Sir W. T. Adair, Mr. A. T. Hawes, and Mr. J. H. Blackwood, Fraser arrived at Buckingham Palace yesterday morning at 11 o'clock, and was at once ushered into the presence of the King. Admiral Sir G. D. Morant introduced him to His Majesty. Afterwards Mr. Blackwood read an official account of Fraser's brave deed. The King then handed the medal.

EDUCATION AND CHILD LABOR

(Union Advocate.)

The amendment to the Provincial Compulsory Education Act passed this session and providing "That children between 14 and 16 years of age, who secure a certificate showing that they have a preliminary education will not come under the provisions of the act when it is shown to be necessary that they should be employed for the livelihood of the family," is receiving much unfavorable criticism.

The Moncton Transcript, which would have the age limit made 15 years, very truly says that "Too low an age restriction for juvenile employment in a factory is undesirable. It strikes a serious blow at the standard of living—and is probably one of the chief reasons why organized labor is so strongly opposed to child labor. Socialists have frequently pointed out that in industries where all members of the family are employed the aggregate wages of the whole family tend to fall to the level of the wages of the head of the family in industries where only men are employed."

The Eastern Labor News thinks that Hon. Mr. Hazen's amendment was initiated by the factory interests for the promotion of child labor, and there appears to be some ground for such a contention. At any rate the amendment places companies, telephone companies, public utility corporations, banks, and trust companies laugh at remonstrance as out of date and use their position for their own advantage. What else are they there for? It is the supreme test of a system of government whether it is adequate for repressing the cliques formed of special interests and saving the public from raids of plunderers. Thus far the United States has failed under this test.

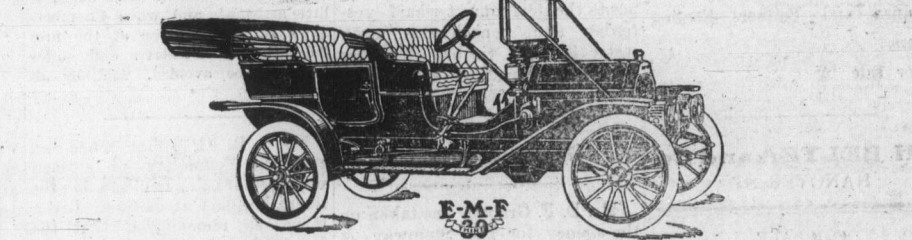

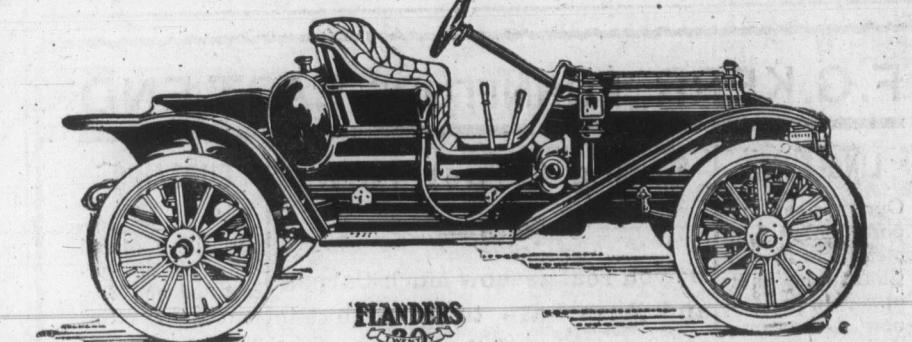

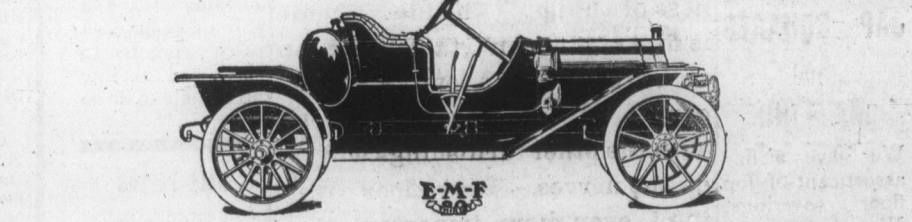

He said they had merchants in his home town who had been induced to invest capital by the prospect for local business; that he himself was holding a position there (in an educational institution) that was made possible only by the setting in the immediate vicinity of a number of farmers, and that he would be unjust to the interests of his neighbors, his town and himself, unless he confined his purchases, as far as possible, to his own locality.

If that is the Western spirit, it is not difficult to understand the phenomenal growth of the country and the enthusiasm the Westerners feel for their towns. It is refreshing to hear one of them expatiate on the merits of his place of residence. Possibly we have not heard the name before, for they are making towns rapidly out that way just now, but we shall not be likely to forget it in the future, after listening to his rapid fire eloquence and seeing his infectious enthusiasm. You can smile at his volubility, but we can tell you friends that in the intense local patriotism of the Westerners lies the secret of the country's marvellous growth and prosperity.

What a change there would be in Gloucester and Restigouche if all our citizens were imbued with a similar spirit. How the place would thrive if all the residents of Gloucester and Restigouche would take as much interest in the welfare of our town as that Westerner does in his. But as a matter of fact what do we find? It is not only that many Gloucester—Restigouche people spend money when away from home for things they might have obtained here before leaving, but they deliberately defer supplying their wants until they go away. Some indeed send their money by mail and receive the goods by express, under the mistaken impression that they can save a few cents by so doing. How our Westerner would scorn such sordid parsimony.

Now, is it not possible for each one of us to emulate that spirit of solidarity—that wholesome loyalty to our own people, to our own town and to ourselves? Can we not see that in doing so we will not only help our neighbors but will materially help ourselves? It would enlarge our business and our social life. It also increases our self respect. It is a mistake to think you save anything by acting in a contrary way. As a matter of fact you can supply your needs in Gloucester and Restigouche just as economically as in any place in Canada, even in the large places. It costs more to do business, where taxes are greater and where the cost of living is higher, with consequent higher prices for labor and help of all kinds.

Let us get together and see if we cannot give Gloucester and Restigouche a new expansion to our town if each individual member of the community would resolve to henceforth do all his or her shopping right here in Restigouche and Gloucester Counties.


