FROM LATE ENGLISH PAPERS per Steamer Niagara at Halifax.

ITALY .- A report was circulated on the Paris Bourse, that there had been an attempt at an insurrection in Naples : it turned loui however, to be untrue, and from the precau tions taken to suppress such attempts, they are not likely to take place .- The secret Li besal prese has, however, just issued another proclamation to the people, calling on them to agitate firmly and quietly. Garibaldi publishes a letter in a Genoa paper, saying that he has just discovered, that the gallant Roman Cecernacchio, his two young sons, and five other victims, who were reported to have escaped, were shot in cold blood by the Austrians in 1849, at La Contarina, and that this measure was concealed. This statement
