We need leaders, we are always in need of them, some of you think seriously of volunteering your service for some particular work. If you do the blessing will be yours. What wonder could be accomplished of all members the world over would remember to ask God's blessing in our work at the noon-tide prayer hour.

We can always depend on her. That is a great help to a president, and come looking cheerful. No matter how things are going outside try and look cheerful when you come to the meeting. TIME TO ACT
