CHIGNECTO POST AND BORDER

The fact that the rest of the Maritime Provinces was affected by the drought equally with Sackville and that the needed rain came three days before the publication of the above paragraph did not weigh with the Transcript man who is never so well satisfied as when he can say something that will injure Sackville and the Sackville end of the county.

DR. R. O. WELDON's member for Albert is accused of inconsistency by certain party papers because he spoke against the sale of The Thousand Isles and then voted for it. This is hardly fair as the vote was a distinct vote of want of confidence. Dr. Weldon may have regarded his position as between the devil and the deep sea and chosen the course which appeared to him if not the most beneficial, at least the less injurious. It may be less distasteful to him to behold the Stars and Stripes flying on Canadian islands in the St. Lawrence than to see all Canada annexed to the United States as some of our liberal friends advocate. Dr. Weldon deserves praise for explaining his position so clearly and condemning as far as he conscientiously could a measure he believes to be wrong.

The Carter-Hebert Case.

Richard Carter of P. de Bute, a constable, went to Moncton last Thursday with an execution given by Stipendiary Magistrate Cahill of Sackville at the suit of Elbert Taylor against Pascal Hebert of the Queen Hotel Moncton. Carter called on Hebert at the hotel and presented him with the execution. Hebert wished to turn property over to satisfy the execution. Carter believed Hebert had no property but to make sure made enquiries with Hebert's consent. While these enquiries were being made Hebert went from the hotel to the park. Carter having found the hotel empty, returned and insisted on making the arrest. Some bystanders interfered and prevented it, and Carter was arrested by Officer Thompson taken to Moncton and there set at liberty. Carter returned next day with the execution for Hebert and was again arrested on a warrant issued by R. Barry Smith the charging being against Pascal Hebert at the Park. Carter was anxious to proceed with the investigation but the magistrate adjourned till Wednesday 20th when a hearing was to be given. Yesterday morning the result case came up before R. Barry Smith at Moncton. H. Hamilton for prosecution, F. A. McCall for defence. Twenty five subpoenas were served yesterday. Among those examined yesterday were Stipendiary Worman, Pascal Hebert, and P. McManus. The amount in question was \$25. It is said that Carter will take action against all the parties who were concerned in his first arrest.

Dominion Parliament.

THE ROYAL WILLIAM.

In the commons Thursday, on motion to adopt the report of the parliamentary library, Sir Charles Herbert Tupper said that the report referred to a great historical event and to some of the eminent men who had assisted in its commemoration. The act was the Royal William, a Canadian built vessel which was the first steamer to cross the Atlantic. The minister proceeded to acknowledge the prominent part in the commemoration of this event taken by the Nova Scotia Historical society, whose resolution, passed in July, 1893, he read to the house. Sir Charles also alluded to the pamphlet prepared by Capt. Wurtel, describing the building of the Royal William at Quebec, and the incidents of her voyage from Pictou, N. S., to London in 1833. This pamphlet will be printed. The report, which recommended the placing of a memorial plate in the library of parliament, was adopted.

BRAZIL SHOULD PAY.

Dr. Weldon for Albert and Mr. Baird, M. P. E. have this week reviewed the minister of marine respecting the claims of Canadian shipowners for the unlawful detention of the vessels at Rio Janeiro during the late disturbance at that port. The views submitted by the members are in effect that all nations who invite the ships and commerce of other nations to their ports are bound to furnish them with protection against the unlawful acts of their own people, except in case of actual belligerency or recognized warfare. The contention that the fighting at Rio was not rioting or disturbance, and did not reach the dignity of the recognized warfare, is generally conceded. It is understood that the British foreign office has undertaken to secure indemnification for the owners of the British ships which sustained severe losses, and Messrs. Weldon and Baird have urged upon Sir G. H. Tupper the expediency of forwarding the claims of Canadian owners through the same channel. The minister, after giving the matter careful consideration and examining all the authorities on the subject, has called for proof and facts which the Canadian claims are based. Accordingly today Mr. Baird handed him the declaration of Capt. Hayes of the ship Mabel Taylor, one of the R. C. Elkin's fleet. The question is one of great importance to ship-owners, as losses were sustained at it which it is contended should be made good. Mr. Baird and Dr. Weldon desired the good wishes of the ship-owners of the maritime provinces for interesting themselves in this matter.

THE FRANCHISE ACT.

In the house Thursday, Sir John Thompson introduced a bill to amend the franchise act. He briefly sketched its provisions. Its principal features were, first, in reference to the revision of the present year, to bring into force the provisions of the Redistribution Bill, which will follow the revision of the present year. It will be made the basis of constituencies as rearranged by that act, although the act would not come into force until the expiration of the present parliament. But it was the duty of the government to see that constituencies would be ready for a general election, so that, while it is possible that there will be another revision next year and before a dissolution, we must keep constituencies in a position to have a vote taken at any time. In making the revision care will be taken that the polling sub-divisions shall not run from the old, but new constituencies before an election should take place in any of these constituencies. In the meantime, the list of electors for the constituency will be made from the sheets of the constituency as it now stands. Thus the two principles can be held in view in the revision. A change has been proposed also in the basis. The basis of the franchise will be adopted from the franchise of the several provinces. While he was speaking the work was a debate, it was not at all a surrender of any principle. The practical differences between the provincial and dominion franchises are now so few as to render it not worth the expense of keeping them up separately. The adoption of a common system for all the provinces would be a recommendation of economy which was not peculiar to the dual system which has been in vogue for the past few years. The new system should be available for yearly use, and while some difficulty and labor will be experienced in the preparation of the first list, the bill will so simplify the system as to make future revisions easy. The great principle of the act of 1885, however, namely that the revision be made by officers under the control of parliament would be adhered to in the bill, first as regards the franchise itself, and secondly as to the carrying out of the franchise law. The principle is maintained that elections to the dominion house ought not to be under the control as regards franchises of officers of any other than federal authority.

Mr. Thompson congratulated the government on all points of the bill but the retention of the revising barristers, but he hoped that feature would be abandoned in time.

THE CAPES ROUTES.

Mr. Perry moved for a return showing number of trips made by ice-boats between Cape Tormentine and Pictou, Traverses in the season of 1894. Speaking to his motion, he deplored the inadequacy of the service between the Island and Pictou performed by the Stanley, although the government was to be congratulated upon the improvement of the service over that performed by the Northern Light. He thought that the Stanley would give a better service between the capes. He favored the tunnel scheme, but as it would take 20 years to complete it, he thought provision should be made for daily service in the meantime.

Mr. Wood of Westmorland defended the government against the charges of the late speaker that the government had not carried out the terms of union. An honest effort had been made to give P. E. Island the best possible communication with the mainland. The Stanley had been built and was admitted to be admirably suited for the winter navigation of the Northumberland Straits. The question raised by Mr. Perry was worthy of the consideration of the government, and whether the Stanley could not do a better service between Cape Tormentine and Pictou. He contended the government should try the experiment of placing the Stanley on this route. He commended the action of the government in testing the feasibility of the tunnel scheme. It would be some years before the tunnel could be built. In the meantime a summer ferry should be established between the capes. This would give the people of P. E. I. mail twice daily instead of once at present and would also place them in closer connection with the C. E. R. R. lines.

Mr. Davies held that the government was simply bamboozling the people. A proper tunnel would cost from fifteen to twenty millions and a five million tunnel was a farce. Mr. Tupper—Are you against the tunnel scheme?

Mr. Davies declined to commit himself.

—A marriage was quietly celebrated at the residence of the bride's father, Cape Tormentine last Wednesday afternoon. The contracting parties were Mr. Martin Smith, of Port Lawrence, N. S., and Miss Susan Grace, youngest daughter of Mr. Richard D. Allen, of Cape Tormentine, N. B. The ceremony was witnessed by the resident Methodist minister. After the bridal party, with the few friends who were present, had partaken of a light repast, the couple left by carriage for home, amid heartiest congratulations.

—A very pleasant evening party was given at the home of Mrs. Mabel Spence last Friday evening. Over fifty young people assembled and enjoyed to the full boating, music, and conversation. The Methodist choir sang some of the songs of the evening. When the clock had pealed forth the hour of midnight the company began to disperse. Among those present were Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Richardson, Mr. Richard Kinney, of Moncton, Mr. and Mrs. James Gray, and Joseph Harper.
