

THE ROD.

A GREAT CATCH. One of the most remarkable catches ever made with the rod and reel oc-curred some time ago in the State of Florida. The man who accomplished this extraordinary feat was N. M. George, of Danbury, Conn., a nephew of ex-Governor Roswell P. Flower, of New York. He was fishing for tarpon, in company with a guide, at a little place called Nigger Head, when he felt something pulling at his line. It did not take long to ascertain that the game was even bigger than the silver king, and Mr. George settled down to give the fellow battle. The fish soon came to the surface. He was a mon-ster sawfish, and he slashed his saw about in the water at a great rate. Mr. George handled the fish most skilfully, and proved that he is a thorough expert in the use of rod and reel. The battle lasted one hour and twenty minutes, when the sawfish was brought to the gaff and killed. He measured 14 feet 8 inches in length, and weighed 625 pounds. His saw was 40 inches in length and 5 in width, and his flippers measured 56 inches. This gives Mr. George the record on the Caloosahatchee for the largest sawfish ever caught with rod and reel. The number of those who are now drawing pensions from the United States Government, as the result of the late war between the States is 970,524. Of this number only 682,118 were soldiers in the late sectional unpleasantness. There are 195,879 pen-25,000 navy pensions. It is estimated that 1,125,000 men are still living who fought in the Union army. From the above figures it seems that over 60 per cent of them are now drawing pensions. It is also a fact worthy of note that after a third of a century the number of Union soldiers drawing pensions is greater than the total number of soldiers who entered the Confederate army from the beginning before by it. He put the question, to the end of the war. But the pensioners are now dying off fast, and in the next ten years the large majority of the active participants in the war will have gone.

A German statistician has made a careful study of the census reports of Europe for the purpose of ascertaining the number of centenarians in the old world and also for the purpose of obtaining some information in regard to the causes which have operated in producing long life. 




