THE LAST NIGHT. At midnight Mr. Gladstone was still alive. Since the bulletin issued shortly before ten o'clock, which announced: 'Mr. Gladstone has been much the same all day, yet with some fluctuation; upon the whole, he is weaker than he was this morning"-nothing had transpired to change that bulletin's story or to show the approach of death save the fact that all nourishment during the day had been given artificially. The doctors did not think at midnight that Mr. Gladstone could outlast the night; but they added that his wonderful power of rallying, which had more than once already surprised them, would make the hour of his decease most uncertain.

RECOGNIZED HIS WIFE. Mr. Gladstone was unconscious, though at times he seemed to recognize for a moment some of the watchers about him. Certainly he did recognize his wife, who was beside him all day, except when the physicians prevailed upon her to rest. Apparently he slept a good deal, and occasionally he uttered a few words in an incoherent, dreamy way, words which those who were watching were unable to catch. Their only consolation was that he was not suffering pain. No narcotics were administered. The silence of the castle grounds was unbroken save by the distant noise of the trains, in strange contrast to the bustle et Hawarden village, with an army of correspondents, photographers and telegraphers. THE END.

After lingering on the threshold of unother world until early dawn, each noment bidding fair to be his last. 



BASEBALL. The Tigers had a terrible revenge at Tecumseh Park yesterday afternoon. They rose in their might and wallopod the locals unmercifully. It was a sweeping victory. The visitors seemed while to hammer the sphere at will, and Pitcher Carson's curves were straightened out with unerring aim. 

A TREE PEST.

Spread of the Spruce Gall Louse-How

to Kill the Insect. Toronto, May 19.-A builetin has been ssued by the department of agriculture dealing with the spruce gall louse. The bullletin says that the insect came from Europe; that it has spread quite considerably throughout Ontario, having been found in Peterboro, Bruce and Muskoka, as we' as about the leading cities, and that it attacks European spruce, black spruce, white spruce, balsam, fir and hemlock. Without any doubt the cherpest and best plan as yet tried in Ontario is to clip off the galls as soon as they are noticed, say in June, and always before Aug. 1, while the producers are in the galls, and immediately burn them up. When a tree is too much infested to be dealt with in this way, it should be cut down and burnt at once. It is recommended that all those having spruce trees in charge should carefully see to the clearing of their trees and the extermination of this fermidable insect pest. As some of our nurseries are affected, buyers of evergreen nursery stock should be very careful to see that the young trees are perfectly free from this insect past.

GAS ENGINE TO PUMP OIL. Petrolia, May 19.-When the Knight well was struck by M. A. Watts, it took the pressure of gas away from the celebrated Milner well, on the Milner or Green farm. The Bushnell people, owners of the latter well, at once set to work to have the same pumped. They have erected a large oumping plant on the Milner farm, on the London road, which will be propelled by a huge gas engine, for which a strong and heavy foundation has been built. "A member of the Church of Engwrites to suggest that there be a Gladstone memorial service in this city, and another correspondent proposes that all admirers of the greatest Englishman of his age should wear mourning till after his funeral. Our cablegrams show that the world is much moved by the passing away of this most remarkable man.

That which most profoundly impresses us is the greatness of the work performed by the dead statesman. Few men, even living to his advanced age, have accomplished so much for their day and generation as has been successfully undertaken by Gladstone. The secret of his success in life, indeed, lay in his never permitting himself to be idle. His view was that it was better to wear out than to rust out, and his career proves the correctness of that course. No man who failed to value the minutes as well as the hours sould have accomplished as much in his time as Mr. Gladstone was able to do. When he was Prime Minister-Administration than any statesman in the history of the British empire-he was accustomed to keep track of the most important debate, while he wrote his daily dispatch to her Majesty on the crown of his hat, that course being necessitated by the absence of desks was able to leave the chamber and go home to rest immediately on the close of the debate, whereas a less energetic man would have been compelled to do the special work after his fellows had Canada, it is because our neighbors inretired. Given as great freedom as her sister church in Canada enjoys, she has prospered and progressed to a much greater extent than when in State tram-

Alien Labor Laws.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's position on the Alien Labor Law will meet with general approbation. While all are agreed that it is the duty of Canada to hold her own, and of her Government to see that fair play is maintained, there is certainly an indisposition to enter into any warfare with our neighbors that can be avoided. We are all aware that at certain points on the Canadian border, United States officials have treated Canadian workingmen entering the States with but scant courtesy. On the other hand, as at Windsor, we know that since the passage of the Canadian Alien Labor Law there have peen no complaints on the subject. As Mr. McGregor pointed out in the recent debate in Parliament, some 600 people living at Windsor cross the river daily to work in Detroit, while 200 persons living in Detroit come to Windsor and Walkerville. This is a kind of reciprocity that it would be foolish to disturb. But, apart from that, while our neighbors are at war, and while the British Government is engaged in promoting an Anglo-American alliance, it would be unwise for our authorities to unduly magnify temporary disagree- those of the British Government. ments at any point on the border.

By and bye, we ought to be able to get rid of all these vexatious exactions, both in the United States and Canada, by a wider and better understanding that would put no restriction on the liberty of the subjects of either counstatute. 



Lightning's Terrible Work in a West London Home.


Mr. J. B. Allenby Instantly Killed in Bed.

DEVASTATION. The storm which worked such devastation in the rich farming counties along the border of Iowa and Western Illinois, started shortly after 3 o'clock in the afternoon, a mile south of Stan-From Stanwood the storm moved rapidly in a northeasterly direcpassing over the northeastern Part of Clinton county and then over the southeastern portion of Jackson county. This section of the state is thickly settled. No towns were in the path of the storm, but farmhouses and barns were torn to pieces by the score. The storm was seen approaching by many of the farmers, and they sought refuge in the cellars. At least 25 were, however, unable to find shelter, and probably as many more were seriously

stock barns, cutting them in two and killing hundreds of cattle which had taken shelter in the sheds from the storm's fury. Half a dozen school buildings are known to have been demore buildings were destroyed than in

any other locality. The wind whirled through the little village with frightful velocity, leaving scarcely a house standing. Five persons lost their lives here, Flora, with his wife and three children had their home torn to pieces and were crushed to death under the falling walls.

FAMILY WIPED OUT. The cyclone crossed to Illinois, be tween Savanna and Thompson . One family of four persons was wiped out near Savanna. Passing to the east much damage was done, but it was confined almost entirely to outbuildings, etc. No lives are thought to have been lost anywhere in Illinois, except those mentioned near Savanna. Telegraph and ephone wires are down in all directions, but it is believed the storm spent its force shortly after passing over Savanna.


ANOTHER TORNADO. formed at Amboy, Ill., shortly before equipped of the newer type of United dark. The storm cloud formed about six miles south of Amboy, and took an easterly course. It traveled about twenty miles without changing its course, and destroyed everything in its path. Orchards, farm houses and parns were destroyed, but no lives are known to have been lost. Owing to the peculiar atmospheric conditions prevailing all the afternoon the inhabitants were on the lookout for just what happened. At the first alarm they took to the cellars, and many of them were imprisoned for hours by the timbers of their wrecked homes. Livestock suffered considerably, and the loss to property generally amount to thousands of dollars. MORE VICTIMS.



The family was summoned at 2 a.m., owing to the perceptible sinking noticed by the medical watchers. From that time until Mr. Gladstone peacefully passed away no one left the death chamber. The only absentee was little Dorothy Drew, who had tearfully complained that her grandfather did not recognize her. Even in that hour of agony, kindly thoughts for others were not wanting. The old coachman, who had been unable to be present when the servants bid farewell to the dying man, was summoned, and remained to the end with his master.

At 8:20 a.m. Dr. Dobie took his leave of Mrs. Gladstone, and returned to Chester deeply affected. Indeed, almost everyone around the castle was in tears. Dr. Dobie said he had been assisting Dr. Bliss and Dr. Henry Gladstone to draw up a statement of Mr. Gladstone's last hours, which will shortly be made public.

A MESSAGE FROM MINISTER HAY. The following dispatch has been received at Hawarden from the United States ambassador, Col. John Hay: "To the Right Hon. Herbert Gladstone, Hawarden: I beg to present to all your family my heartfelt expression of sympathy at your personal loss, and at the same time to reverently con-gratulate you and the English race everywhere upon the glorious completion of a life filled with splendid achievements and consecrated to the noblest purposes. 


