A better mode than the wholly nominative or wholly elective system would be. he declared, a composite system, halfnominative and half-elective. He would allow present senators to retain their position during life, but would divide each province into districts, and allot from the existing senators one senator to each district. Upon his death his successor in the representation of that district would be chosen by popular election for a limited term. Half the senators would not be allotted to districts, and any vacancies in their ranks caused by death or resignation would be filled by the nomination of the crown, as at present, the crown appointees to serve for life. Vienna, Feb. 5. - Emperor Francis

Joseph's condition is again exciting spite his faults, is "a jolly good felanxiety, and the congratulations offered on the subject of his complete restoration to strength and health after his illness last fall appear to have been somewhat premature. It is not that he is any longer actually ill, but there is such a pronounced decline of vitality and of strength as to have rendered necessary the cancellation of all but the most obligatory engagements, and these are no longer made for more than a fortnight in advance. It is to be feared that the rejoicings in honor of the diamond jubilee of his reign, namely, the 60th anniversary of his accession to the crown will in a similar way be turned into mourning by the close of his long and useful reign ere the present year comes to an end. Warnings to this effect have reached most of the courts of Europe, especial-


