BOOST IN STREET WATERING AN INCREASE OF

Some Facts and Figures Which Show That Citizens Who Have Streets Watered Will Pay for Watering of Streets Before Public Buildings Schools, Etc., and in Addition Will Hand Over Surplus to Apply to Tax Rate.

There is going to be a really healthy kick against the action of the council in raising the street watering tax from 3 cents a foot to 4 cents, and already complaints have been received on account of the extra charge. This will mean that the citizens must pay an increase of 33 1-3 per centrather too much in the opinion of the majority of the property-owners who

If this bylaw is enforced, as it probably will be, the citizens who have paid for the privilege of having the street watered in front of their residence will also have to pay for the street intersections, public buildings, throughout the city

HOW IT WORKS OUT. It works out something like this. In round figures there are 39 miles of streets to be watered in the city during the coming summer. Of this nine miles are allotted to public buildings, such as schools, city l, etc., parks, and the like. This leaves 30 miles of streets

which the citizens have to pay for watering. The gross revenue from this at 4 cents a foot will be \$12,672. This, of course, does not include the nine miles which belong to the citizens as a whole. This nine miles at 4 cents a foot would yield revenue of \$3,801 60.

In other words, if the whole 39 miles were paid for, that is, if the city would pay its share, the revenue would be \$16,473 60. THE EXPENDITURES.

Now to offset that, there must be reckoned the expenditure. According to the figures submitted by No. 3 committee, the expenditure would reach \$11,000. There is a margin of \$5,473 60 to be applied to the reduction of the As it works out, however, the city does not pay its share of stree

after the citizens who have paid for street watering pay also for the watering of streets before all public buildings, etc. Why should the citizens be charged to pay for the city's buildings, street intersections and the like? The sum is very easily worked out, and the man with a real large

money taken from the citizens for the purpose of laying the dust, has been applied to other purposes. In 1909 the sum of \$9,000 was received from the citizens, and the expenditure was \$6,800. No charge was made for water by the waterworks board, and the city did not pay for the intersections, etc.





Herr Sudekums, the Socialist member, was greatly appreciated that Germany's fleet was not called for by commerce or the colonies, and that Great Britain was justified in the belief that it was directed against her, the chancellor spoke shortly, but vigorously, saying:

"Our relations with Great Britain lie clear and open before everybody's eyes. It is not necessary to repeat that our fleet is not for aggressive purposes, but for the protection of our way as to arouse belief that a threat is intended against anybody.

"Finally, it is our wish to cultivate unprejudiced, straightforward, and themselves too comfortable to desire it. friendly relations with Great Britain. (Cries of "Hear! Hear!") I do not and Great Britain, with whom we are so closely connected, both economically and in culture. No nation on earth can divert or suppress free competition of other nations. We must all proceed on the same lines as an honest merchant, and on this foundation I am convinced that the relation of confidence existing between Germany and Great Britain will develop favorably, and that public opinion of both countries will be influenced in the same way."


