UNB residences facing major changes

The UNB residence system is facing some of the biggest changes in its history. More residences are going co-ed, the positions of Dean of Men and Dean of Women are being eliminated, and a new Dean of Residences is being selected. What is perhaps most surprising is the lack of publicity that these changes, which directly affect 25% of the university's students, are receiving.

1. The Acheson Report and

the Integration Committee.

Many of the changes taking place originated with the Acheson Report. Over one year ago, History professor Bill Acheson was placed in charge of a presidential committee to look into the future of the residence system. This committee reported back to President Downey at the end of last year. Among its recommendations were the combination of the Men's and Women's systems into a single system.

This system would be run by two people - a Dean and an Assistant Dean of Residences. The report specifically recommended that these positions be divided between a man and a woman.

The University Administration chose to accept this recommendation and set up an Integration Committee to look at the policies and procedures of an integrated committee. This committee did not get underway until January. According

to one of the two student members, Jim Arsenault of Rosary Hall, matters of consideration were the qualification and criteria for Dons and Proctors, what application and re-application forms should look like, and the allocation of single rooms. This latter issue proved to be one of the major problems for the committee. Traditionally, the women's system has allocated rooms based on grade point average and years in residence while

the men's system has placed a heavy emphasis on participation in residence activities. Several complicated formulas were suggested as compromises but the issue still has not been totally resolved.

Questions have been raised regarding how much opportunity there has been for student input. The chairman of the committee, Dean of Students Don Eagle, when asked about this said that "Because we are dealing with day to day type issues, I'm not sure how much those students (on the Integration Committee) went out into the system to get reactions." But he went on to say, "Both Deans did everything they could to make sure students knew what was going on." However, the chairman of the Residences Representative Council, which is made up of the House Presidents, John Dewey of Bridges House, says that he was not kept well informed regarding the Integration Committee. And Jim Arsenault says that he felt that the administration had already formed opinions regarding what was going to happen to the residence system, and that student opinion wouldn't change these anyway.

Jim Arsenault also questions the timing of the integration committee. Due to the lateness in the year before the committee was finally struck, numerous policy changes will not be implemented in time for next year. For instance, the residence application forms had to be sent out before a common form could be created. He also feels that the Integration Committee would be better off if the Dean of Residences had already been appointed since it is the Dean who will have to implement the report. This would allow the committee to work with the new Dean. At least one member of the Dean of Residence Search Committee agrees, pointing out that the new Dean can overturn virtually anything that the Integration Committee does anyway.

2. The Search for a new Dean of Residences.

Much of the controversy over the integration of the residences and the appointment of the new Dean has to do with the way the present system is

Liquor prices to rise

In August of 1983, the Campus Bar Service was granted a special Premises-Cultural License. This replaced the former arrangement under which organizations or persons wishing to arrange bar services had to apply to the board to obtain a separate permit for each event. Under the new

license, the University became directly responsible for arranging bar services in compliance with provincial legislation and the Board's regulations. However, in September of 1984, the University cancelled the bar-service contract with the Board of Directors of the SUB, and became directly responsible for operations as well as controls.

A budget plan for liquor

prices was brought down on March 20. Among other things, the plan proposed that the price of a bottle of beer be raised from \$1.65 to \$1.70. Liquor would stay the same, with house wine being raised from \$10.50 to \$11.10. This plan caused outrage among the student population, whose main contention was that the possibility for social events and pubs would be greatly decreased

due to the price hike. Others were opposed to the inclusion of service development costs, which totalled \$2941.55. This amount includes the purchase of five cash registers (used at bars), (office furniture, the reallocation of liquor storeroom, ice machine, and glassware and racks).

Ric Cuthbertson, Bar Services Manager, stated he received student input and thus drew up a revised draft of the Budget plan and pricing system for the fiscal year 1985-86. This plan is based on his assumptions on sales volumes at cost for a twelve-month period (February 1984 to January 1985). During this period, students consumed 68.6% of the total product and non-student functions accounted for the remaining 31.4%

In contrast to the present format for student events which had a net loss of \$46,117.49, the proposed format (with beer at \$1.25) would have a net profit of \$1154.96. In a breakdown of the \$1.25 cost to student organizations, the cost of the product made up for .723 cents of the total amount. The service development costs, which many people were concerned with, made up .056 cents of the total.

Previously, the non-student functions had a net loss of \$6340.13; with the proposed format, the net profit would amount to \$657.90.

Cuthbertson pointed out that when an organization arranges for an event, the Campus Bar Service provides all the needed materials, with the exception of the band.

Nevertheless, there will undoubtedly be opposition to this revised draft, as the price of liquor will inevitably be raised.

Arson suspected in Old Arts blaze

Early last Friday morning, a fire broke out in the Old Arts Building that resulted in files being scorched. According to Chief of Security Williamson, "The fire looks like it could have been purposely set." Subsequently, the arson squad of the City Fire Dept. is investigating the cause, as well as the City Police Dept. Williamson did not know when the investigation would be concluded.

Downey accepts second term

James Downey, president of UNB, recently announced at a meeting of the university senate that he will accept a second term as chief executive officer of the 200-year-old institution.

The second term, of five years, will begin on August 1, 1985, subject to the approval of the Lieutenant-Governor in Council.

Downey's acceptance follows a joint recommenda-

tion from the UNB senate and board of governors on March 28 that he be reappointed.

Downey was born and grew up in Winterton, Newfoundland, an outpost on Trinity Bay. He earned a BA (1962), a Bachelor of Education (1963), and a MA in English literature (1964), from Memorial University of Newfoundland. In 1966, he received a PhD from the University of London, where he studied as

a Rothermere Fellow.

In 1980 Downey was installed as UNB's 14th president and vice-chancellor. In addition to his responsibilities on UNB's two campuses in Fredericton and Saint John, Downey has also served as president of the Canadian Bureau for International Education, chairman of the board of the Maritime Forest Ranger School, vice-chairman of the board of directors of the Maritime Forestry Complex Corporation, member of the executive committee of the Corporate-Higher Education Forum, and chairman of the Association of Atlantic Universities. He is also a member of the board of directors of the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada and the Canadian Nursing Association, and sits on the Council of the Association of Commonwealth Universities.

SRC review: a year of controversy

This year the Students' Representative Council (SRC) saw the end of John Bosnitch's unprecedented two-year reign as President, a new President, Larry Fox, the formation of new positions on the SRC executive, and controversy in almost every step the council made.

One of the first controversies surrounded Bosnitch. A University commissioned investigation of the operation of the Student Union Building (SUB) yielded the Shaw Report, which found Bosnitch's involvement in the SRC, SUB board, SUB Holdings Inc., and Campus Services Ltd., (CSL) improper. Bosnitch countered that by the SRC constitution, the President is required to serve on every committee. Due to what the administration perceived as a "state of disarray" in the SUB's operations, they first took over SUB Holdings Incorporated's contract to run the University's Liquor Service. Later they dissolved the SUB board and picked their own board of faculty and student representatives.

The CSL store was ordered to close its doors in December after administration and CSL failed to reach an agreement on what goods could be sold. Incoming Vice-president Services Ron Spurles faced the first of many crises to come.

The entire SRC executive who were voted to power in November had to overcome a legacy of ill-will and dissension. As President Larry Fox said, "Being President is not exactly what I thought it would be." Fox faced questions concerning his integrity when he remained on the administration's SUB board after his election. It was felt by his detractors that he was not putting the students' movement ahead of his desire to work with, rather than against, the administration. A joke circulated on campus: "When is a fox like a sheep? When his name is Larry."

The Student Union executive was changed from President, Vice-President, and Comptroller to President, VP Academic, VP Services, VP Administration and VP Finance (formerly comptroller).

Vice-president Academic Michael Bennett named a commission and an assistant, Oliver Koncz, and began defining his post. Recommendations were made to a Univer-

sity committee concerning the campus Ombudsman issue.

Bennett incorporated his VP post with his seat as a student representative on the Senate by proposing and steering through student-sponsored motions to the Senate. Student initiative resulted in amendments to the Academic Regulations guaranteeing students the right to see their examination papers after the marks have been released and of not having to write three exams in a 24-hour period.

Bennett's commission also set up a tutoring system for university and high school students. A list of tutors was compiled and referrals were made. Bennett has looked into foreign student differential fees, sexual harassment on campus and the treatment of handicapped students.

Vice-president administration Larry Long considers his most important job since taking power has been to help the various societies on campus and keeping good relations

between them and the SRC. Long has also served as Chief Returning Officer in the spring by-election. The election ran smoothly this time though Long feels the need to have an Election Act to ensure smooth elections in the future. He hopes to draft an act by the end of the summer. In the next few months he plans to examine the Student Union Regulations and By-laws and bring them up to date. As well, he is working with his assistant VP, Bill Daisley, to prepare a User's Guide for the Student Union computer and a system of signing up for time on the computer.

President Larry Fox has helped the New Brunswick Student Alliance to write a constitution that has taken five years to accomplish. He has also initiated a postcard campaign to increase summer job funding and to lower minimum savings requirement of N.B. Student Loans.

Fox faced a problem in his executive when he reclaimed

the former SRC President's office as his own, though it had been reallocated to VP's Long and Bennett by the previous executive. Many considered to be a low point of his term.

He plans to spend the summer preparing a bid on the SUB Smoke Shoppe space, computerizing SRC files, requesting the return of the rent controls, booking some top entertainment for next fall, and setting up a Summer Homes Finders operation.

The brunt of criticism of the SRC shifted from John Bosnitch before Christmas to VP Finance Doug Burgess after he took office after Christmas. Burgess faced complaints of racism from the Overseas Chinese Students Association and other foreign students' groups but he attributed it to

groups that receive SRC monies now are required to justify its expenses in advance.

Burgess has gotten assurances from the administration that 77% of Stu-

dent Union fees collected at registration will be released to the SRC on October 1 annually, with the rest due on January 10. In the past the administration released the fees in four smaller payments spread throughout the school year.

VP Services Ron Spurles came into a very difficult job as the CSL store was in its death throes. CSL ran out of money, and with its creditors calling, the company has gone to the SRC for help. There is a proposal to have the SRC lend CSL approximately \$50,000, and the administration has made an offer to lend the money.

After the CSL store stopped selling food and stationery items, they continued to operate a photo-copier service but the machines were repossessed by the bank when payments were in arrears. Spurles will be working through the summer to come up with a viable Services plan for the fall.

Residences continued

being run. Dean of Women, Joy Kidd, is generally well liked and respected in the women's system and is retiring. However, many contend that the same cannot be said of the Dean of Men, Reavly Gair. Controversy has surrounded him since his days as Don of McKenzie House. Upon hearing that he was the sole applicant last year for the position of Dean of Men, many of the residents of McKenzie House circulated a petition asking that he not be appointed Dean. Subsequently many of the residents of the house found that they were not going to be allowed back into residence the next year, allegedly for unruly behavior.

Dean Gair has had problems with several of the residences this year. When some of the

men in Aitken House went up to the UNB Woodlot and chopped down a large number of trees to use as Christmas trees, Gair made virtually the entire house go up and work in the Woodlot - even those who were not involved in the tree cutting escapade.

Bridges House has been involved in a more recent controversy. Many of the residents of the house, as part of the Chuck Cosby Day celebrations, took beer down to McConnell Hall. Dean Gair asked for a list of students involved, and Don Linda Dyer gave him a list of all those who she thought were at McConnell Hall. Dean Gair promptly fined each person on the list \$20, although many of them were not drinking and several were not even at McConnell Hall.

Bridges House held a house meeting and decided to take steps to fight the decision despite many of the residents stating the fear that doing so might result in Bridges being cleared out next year like McKenzie was this year. Eventually Bridges House was given a \$100 fine.

The Residences Representative Council, which consists of most House Presidents, even went so far as to present several possible referenda questions to the UNB Students Representative Council. One of those called on the University to publicly censure Dean Gair.

A major concern of many students in the men's residence system is that Dean Gair will be the new Dean of Residences. A search committee has finally been set up consisting of Don Eagle as Chairman, Dons Moira MacLaughlin and Barry Riome, students Kathy Huntington, Suzanne Currie, and Tim Lethbridge, History Professor Bill Ache son and Mary Ellen Tait. When asked whether the search is being so late as to assure Reavly Gair can quietly be appointed when no students are around to object, Don Eagle responded, "That's totally untrue.

Anytime that the University searches for people to apply for

various positions, it is in the best interest of anyone who applies to be chosen because they were the best in a slate of very good candidates. Therefore, it is far from our best interests to have a situation whereby we have a few candidates." However the decision will be an internal search unless no suitable candidate is found.

Both President Downey and Dean Eagle express concern over the level of student input. Dr. Downey says that since the committee has three students on it, there will still be a large input into the selection. And Eagle says that he knows there will still be some students around when there are candidates available.

However, there may not be very many residence students around. The date for collecting student input into the process has been set for April 25 - after many students are finished with their exams. The closing date for applications for the position is the following day, on April 26. Rosary Hall President Jim Arsenault is disturbed by the timing. He says that this is "not showing regard or respect for student input" and that it is "One of the reasons students become so apathetic." The search committee is to meet on May 1 to consider applications. The new Dean of Residences term will start on July 1.

Vienna conference proves successful

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Hardfeel signs auto deal with Delorean

It was announced Tuesday that Premier Ricky Hardfeel had reached agreement with president John DeLorean of DeLorean Motors to open a new automobile manufacturing plant in New Brunswick. When asked to define the terms of this agreement Hardfeel noted; "I've known John for a long

time and I feel a businessman of his competence and integrity can bring prosperity to New Brunswick." Hardfeel went on to note that the plant will be located in the hard-pressed Miramichi region on the North-east shore. The construction contract was granted to Rocca Construction of St. John. Although it was open to tender

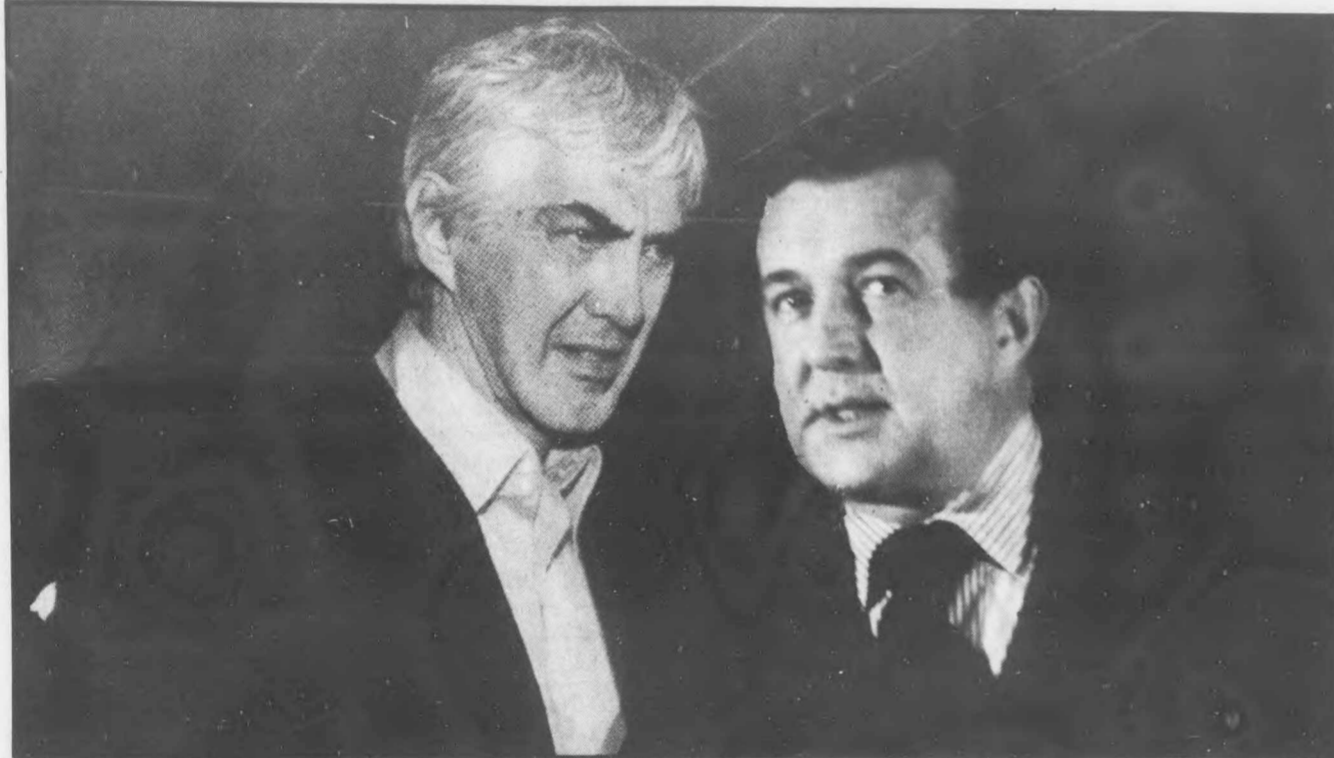
all other interested companites mysteriously withdrew their bids before a decision could be made. DeLorean and Hardfeel met last week in New York to hammer out the terms of this agreement. DeLorean operates plants in Bogata, Colombia and Lima, Peru and said New Brunswick would be a perfect spot to market his special edi-

tion "Snow-mobile". This car is known to travel at speeds beyond the sense of reality and comes equipped with dual turntables and a wide selection of Lionel Ritchie video discs. Hardfeel personally test-drove the car with DeLorean while visiting his plant in Bogata. As the premier noted; "the altitude in Colombia is hard on my

breathing but the higher I get the better the car performs.

Critics of the agreement noted the failure of DeLorean's first car plant in Dublin, Ireland and his subsequent arrest for trafficking in cocaine were grounds for not accepting an auto plant financed "by this crook." Hardfeel was adamant in his refusal to accept these

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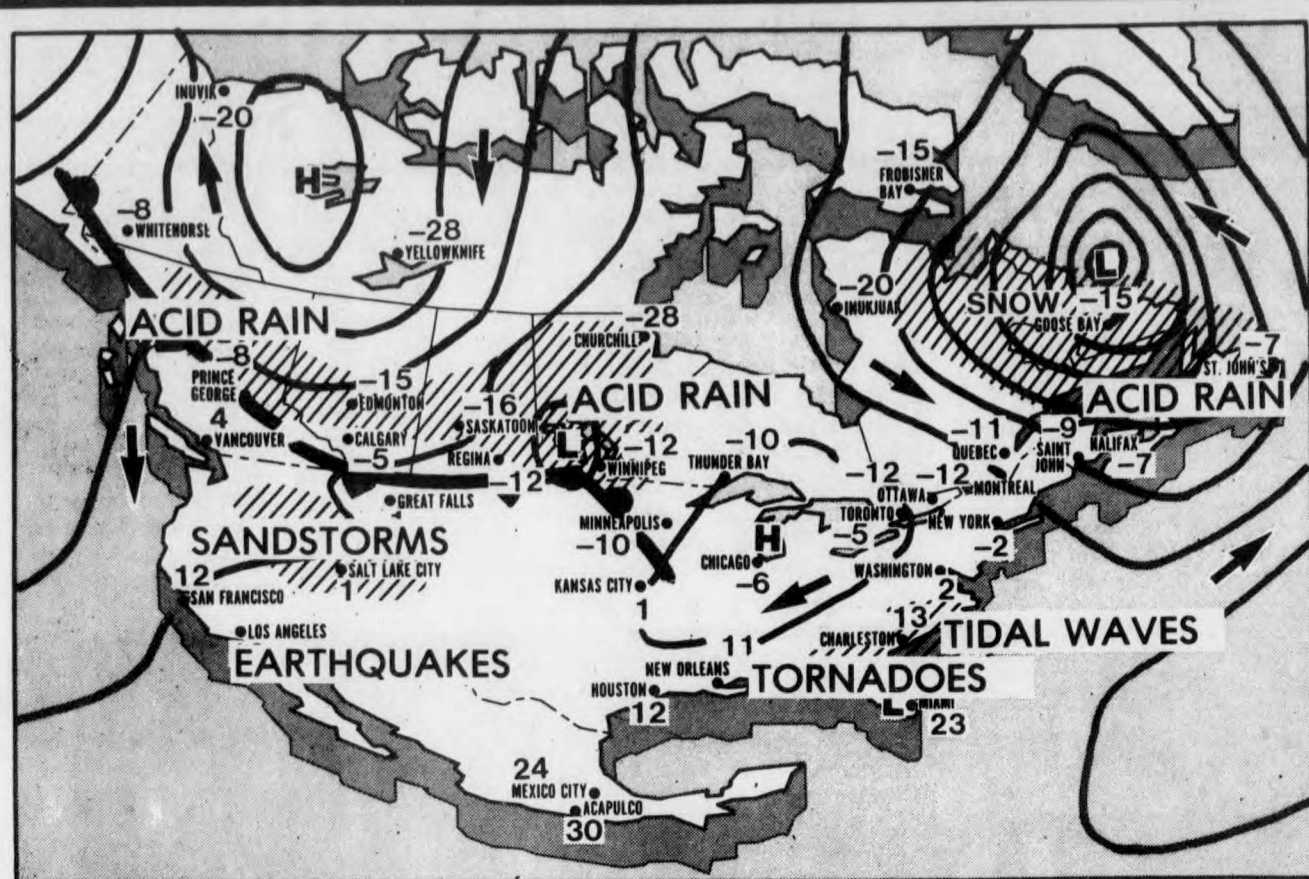

U.N.B.

The Senate of the University of New Brunswick voted at its last meeting to have separate Senates for its Fredericton and Saint John campuses.

The separation was one of the many recommendations of the report of the Committee to Rationalize Another Concealment of Key External Revenue (CRACKER).

Separate Senates will allow each campus to chart its academic course independently of the other. As a result, observers feel that the two campuses will soon have less in common and will eventually become two separate universities.

The CRACKER report arose from a dispute between two family corporations in New Brunswick. For years, UNB

has been begging for money from the Irving and the McCained families.

In recent years, there has been some ill feeling between the two families, supposedly because of the Irving's decision to add potatoes and other food products to their portfolio. As a result, neither family wants to give money to the same institution.

To accommodate this concern, the CRACKER committee proposed a step-by-step division of UNB. Since the head office of McCained Foods is in central New Brunswick, they will be responsible for the Fredericton campus. Similarly, the Irving head office in Saint John will dominate the campus there. In short, each family will have its own little university to play with.

The Saint John Campus will serve Cavendish Farms Food

Canada for sale

OTTAWA(BS)—In what has been described as the greatest real estate deal since the selling of Alaska to the U.S. by Russia, Brian Mulmooney has put Canada up for sale.

Mulmooney, president of CANDU Real Estate Unlimited, explained the move is to be undertaken due to the severe financial woes of the present owner. Although Mul-

mooney refused to reveal who the new potential owner is, sources in Ottawa claim there is a strong possibility the U.S. will be interested in purchasing Canada as a fifty-first state.

The source, who prefers to remain unidentified further revealed that CRE Unlimited has been aiming their sales campaign at the U.S. Ads are to be placed in major U.S. papers and aired on major T.V. stations.

Though refusing to acknowledge that the U.S. is considered the most probable purchaser, Mulmooney did admit that Canada would be an important acquisition and that Romy Raygun, has on more than one occasion expressed interest in Canada. It is no secret that owning Canada would

greatly enhance Raygun's chances of further testing the Cruise missile, a fact that has alarmed peace activists. Ned Broadbent, leader of the NDP (Nukes Destroy People) expressed concern that selling

Canada to the U.S. would seriously jeopardize the country's chances of remaining a

nuclear free zone, stating "the sale of Canada would allow those American war mongering imperialists to store all their nuclear weapons here, making us the prime target of Soviet missiles." Slow Clarke

denied this however, stating that "Mulmooney already kisses up to Raygun and does whatever he wants. There is no necessity for the U.S. to purchase Canada."

Of course, if the McCained sphere of influence is to be in Fredericton, the Harriet Irving Library will have to be moved to Saint John. "We'll move that sucker brick by brick," declared UNB President James Fabric-softener. This is in keeping with the university's policy of space reallocation. Buildings on the Fredericton campus will be moved to the Saint John Campus until both campuses have roughly the same number.

The first edifice to go will be the Student Union Building (SUB). For many years there has been talk of having a SUB in Saint John. However, the

only work done there has been to clear land for a site.

Meanwhile, in Fredericton, the SUB Trustees appointed by Dr. Fabric-softener can be seen digging at the SUB foundation late each night. Student traitors Larry Fix, Suzanne Scurre, Joel Legered, and Gordon Mortgage confirm rumors about the move. "We gave all control of the SUB to the administration, and the students didn't say a peep," declares Mortgage. "I don't think they'll mind if we take away the building."

Suzanne Scurre was quick to add, "At least this way John Snitch will never be able to regain control of the SUB because there will be no SUB to regain!"

The administration has not revealed what other buildings it intends to reallocate to Saint John.

Mulmooney has denied allegations he was offered a position as governor of Canada should the sale go through.

The leader of New Brunswick's Liberal opposition Jackie Vautour said; "although the plant will create jobs it may also have adverse effects on our already depleted salmon stocks." When the Grope and Feel asked him to elaborate Mr. Vautour responded, "something's fishy about this and it's not right to direct the Miramichi river just to supply running water for a car plant!"

The final arrangements will be made sometime next week and Hardfeel is confident that there will be no complications. New Brunswick taxpayers will be footing a large part of the venture capital (roughly 85%).

As of now no purchase orders have been filled out but DeLorean noted that; "many of my friends have promised to buy these cars once they are produced." Hardfeel also said that; "New Brunswickers will be more likely to buy a home built auto, even if the cost is a touch high at \$125,000 (without options). Hardfeel and DeLorean are presently in Las Vegas trying to drum up some more venture capital and they hope to have enough money to hire a management staff in the near future."

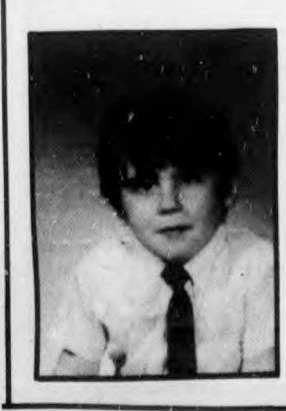

To the Editor:

The *Political Perspectives* column in *The Brunswickan* of March 29, 1985, touched three subjects i.e., Pakistan, Islam, and Amnesty International, requires few corrections and clarifications.

Mr. Patton, the author, wrongly states Pakistan (95% Muslim) is a secular country and present government of President Zia is transforming it to an Islamic Republic. Actually Pakistan was always officially an Islamic Republic and not a secular state. The so-called progressive elements (communists and semi-communists) in Pakistan are with ambivalent manifesto whose aspirations appear to be to

rule/or otherwise create chaos in the society.

Regrettably, Mr. Patton writes that the Islamic Republic means institutionalization of barbaric punishments. To me this suggests either Mr. Patton's utmost ignorance of Islam or his deliberate attempt to distort the facts about Islam. Islam is a *Deen* which means a way of life. It constitutes a religion, a political system, an economic system, a justice system etc. and it provides guidelines to societies and individuals alike in their everyday dealings. The Islamic punishments cannot singularly be applied in an unIslamic system or society. The society has to be fabricated into an Islamic framework before the implementation of punishments. Practically however, Islamic punishments are a scaring tool rather than harming strokes because the pre-requisite conditions such as certain number of eyewitnesses etc. are difficult to meet. I also find it very unjust to hide the fruits and beauty of the Islamic system and just mention the punishments. After all God does not want to harm his own loving creatures. Further, the thought of harshness of punishment is subjective, just for the sake of argument for example, I may find it barbaric and uncivilized to imprison somebody for 20 years or to imply capital punishment (which by the way 85% Canadians support).

Islam is not by force and I am a Muslim by choice like majority of the Pakistanis. If the majority of the Pakistanis went to see the Islamic system in their country why it creates uneasiness to some people. After all democratic rules should take precedence. I as a free thinking person oppose any kind of punishment to political opponents (if true) in Pakistan by President Zia's regime but support severe penalties on those who prefer violence and disrupt public peace.

I agree with Mr. Patton about the unfortunate sufferings of human beings in several countries because of their political beliefs, and appreciate Amnesty International's campaign to save humans from horrible tortures. However, I would like to point out that AI's campaign, hopefully not intentionally, does harm the targeted country's image. AI also campaigns to cut off economic and other aids to such countries, thus scourging the nation and the people as a whole, and not the individuals responsible for degrading acts. I will suggest to upgrade the human values

around the world, AI should have struck the roots and not the branches. Sources should be contained. This can be done by public awareness campaigns by unveiling the countries or secret services (if any) involved in bringing in power such degraded individuals. Hopefully public pressure in such countries will help to restrain their governments in playing with the lives of the people in the underdeveloped and developing countries. The principle should be that if you cannot do good for someone, don't do the bad either.

UNB English Department

Dear Sir:

The Department of English wishes to inform both students and faculty members about two matters which have given rise to a good deal of misunderstanding in recent years: our introductory writing courses and the University's Competence in English Test.

We offer two introductory writing courses, ENGL 1013: Fundamentals of Clear Writing and ENGL 1123: Fundamentals of Effective Writing, both of which, given their purposes, are limited-enrolment courses. During the current academic year, we have taught 19 sections of 1013 and 5 of 1123. We would have offered more sections, but did not receive the funding from the University administration that would have enabled us to do so. Therefore, at Registration, we had to turn away some 250 students who wished to improve their writing or who were advised to do so by their faculties. This rejection angered numerous students, as it did certain deans and directors who seemed to believe that we had the resources to lay on as many sections of 1013 as were called for. I wish to forestal further outbursts of this sort by explaining what is in store, come next September.

As of now, we have the teaching strength to offer 8 sections of 1013 and 2 of 1123, and it seems probably that we will receive funding for four additional slots of 1013. Of the 8 of 12 sections of 1013, it will be possible to provide in 1985-86, six are reserved for students for whom the course is compulsory, they being students in Physical Education, Forest Engineering, and Geological Engineering. If you belong to another faculty, and

wish to try to reserve a place for yourself in an open section of 1013 at a specific time in the timetable, you must either visit Professor William Cragg, Director of Introductory Writing Courses, in Room 325, Carleton Hall or write to him during the summer. We can do nothing more. Obviously, hundreds of students who would benefit from these courses will again be refused entry at this fall's Registration. There is no point in complaining to the Department of English, either now or in September. If you are concerned about this state of affairs, you should direct your animadversions to Dr. R.E. Burrige, Vice-President (Academic), as it is he who determines the teaching strength of every department on campus.

We are also held accountable by many for the Competence in English Test, and are blamed because many students who fail the test are left with no adequate opportunity for improving their English so as to meet the University's requirements. In fact, this test is administered through the office of the University Secretary and is governed by the Vice President (Academic). It was created by the University Senate, not by us. We did not design the Test, we do not give it, we are in no way responsible for it. I can assure all readers that if we were responsible for such testing, we would not permit illiterate students to reach their graduating year. It may not be widely realized that the regulations of the Test are such, that a student who has failed it one or more times, or who simply refuses to take it,

can progress to his or her final year at UNB still incapable of composing a grammatically correct sentence. This bizarre dispensation invites very obvious questions, questions of a sort that should never be raised in a self-respecting university.
