Simard & Co., dry goods merchants, have purchased the large building, corner St. Joseph and la Chapelle streets, and another building adjoining, and will rebuild them in the spring.—It is reported that the Protestant Board of School Commissioners have about decided upon the erection of a new school building to replace the old Elgin street school.

WOODSTOCK, ONT.— McKay & Mahon, solicitors, give notice of proposed application to parliament for the incorporation of the Woodstock and Lake Huron Railway Company, for the purpose of building a steam railway from Woodstock to St. Mary's, with branches to Grand Bend, Goderich and Kincardine. Woodstock capitalists are behind the project.

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

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
