Deceased was probably the oldest Mason in Canada, having been a member of the "mystic tie" for upwards of 70 years.

Hox, Dz. BROUSE, Dominion Senator, died at Ottawa on Tuesday. Deceased was a Reformer, and was elevated to the Senate by the Mackenzie Government in 1878. He represented South Gren-vitte in the Dominion Parliament from 1872 until called to the Senate. There are now three vacancies in the Upper House.






