





# MEXICAN PRESIDENT

(Continued from Page One)

A few hours later in the day Gen Delgado and General Felipe Angeles two of the federal commanders, who wre not in accord with General Huerta's plan were added to the list of

The plan had originally been made without the knowledge of Gen. Felix Diaz, the rebel leader. The word soon, however, permeated through the rebel lines, and then began such a fusillade from the machine gun and such volleys from the rifles, which has been but few times since the opening of hostilities in the very heart of the city. It appeared for a time as though every machine gun and every rifle in the arsenal had been brought into action in the effort to fire away all the remaining stores of ammunition there.

This was, however, merely in celebration of the arrival of the news that peace was near and that the fraternal struggle which had caused so much terror and misery to hundreds of thousands of people for ten days was about to be brought to an end.

The awful din was permitted by the commanders to continue for 20 minutes before the buglers were ordered to sound the "Cease Fire." As the noise of the reverberating reports from the guns died away, the sound of merry peals from all the church pells of the city rang out. They had been ordered to be set in motion by a message from the national palace

It did not take the public very long to realize what had occurred, and long before the details of the formaof the provisional government under General Victoriano Huerta had been completely worked out the resi dents of the capital had begun to give vent to their joy and relief by manifestations all over the city.

The shouts that were sent up were rot those of the partisans of a victorious army, but of people whose nerves had been worn into tatters by their enforced participation in a long and desperate battle which had been fought in the confined space of

In diplomatic circles, where the tension also had been great, the solution which had been found was

Along San Francisco street and it other thoroughfares of the downtown district, extending as far as the big open square in front of the national palace, hundreds of thousands of people pushed their way back and forth, waving banners which had been improvised out of the first material a hand, and on which was printed the one Spanish word meaning "peace." Rt. Rev. Robert Brindle Has Had an

Adventurous Career. A few days ago the Rt. Rev. Robert D.S.O., the Catholic Bishop Nottingham, England, celebrated his sacerdotal golden jubilee. A tes-timonial was promoted and arrangements concluded to honor in a fitting manner the most famous and popular chaplain ever connected with the

Dr. Brindle was born seventy-five years ago at Liverpool, and studied for the priesthood at the English Col-lege, Lisbon. After some experience f missionary work in the Plymouth diocese he became an army chaplain. aign of 1882 and was the only chaplain present at the two engagements of Kasassin. He was not present, however, at the victory of Tel-el-Kebir, for he was lying dangerously ill with cholera. From 1882-1886 he was on active service in the Soudan, and was present at all the decisive engagements. Dr. Brindle accompanjed the Royal Irish Regiment in their trying march across the Bayuda Desert to Metemmeh, and received the

three clasps.

A period of service at home followed, and Dr. Brindle acted as spiritual director of the Catholic troops at Col-chester and Aldershot. When Lord Kitchener embarked on his famous expedition in the Soudan Dr. Brindle again went to the front. He did much to keep up the spirits of the troops when men were being stricken low with cholera and excessive heat. At the taking of Dongola, Lord Kitchener, who has on many occasions testified to his faith in and respect r Dr. Brindle placed the chaplain in charge of the third gunboat conveying a detachment of the South Staffordshire Regiment, and for his heroic conduct on the field at Atbara he was rewarded with the D.S.O. Pocket Wireless.

#### HAMDSTEAD HEATH,

Lover of Historic Spot Has Immortalized It In Huge Book.

Who that has enjoyed the delights of a ramble over the Northern Heights, the bracing air filling out his lungs, the ever-changing shades of green soothing his eye, his thoughts fascinated with reflection upon the great city that darkens the vale so little distant away; who that has experienced the characteristics of the control of the control of the control of the control of the characteristics. ienced the charm over body and mind inseparable from a stroll across Hampsted Heath could resist the impulse to return again and again?

Hampstead has possessed its allurements for myriads of human beings since London was a hamlet, miles away on the bank of the Thames, and probably for many times more ages before. Since the dawn of British history leaders of men, and women of note, kings and queens, knights and ladies, historians and politicians have made their home in Hampstead.
Poets, painters, novelists have lived
there, too, and chosen the scenes of
their romances from their surroundings. The elm where Little Nell rested with her grandfather is indelribly imprinted upon the minds of readers of "The Old Curiosity Shop" throughout the world. "Fashionable London" of a former generation thronged the wells of Hampstead and in the present day Hampstead Heath is the great holiday resort of

London's masses.

Hampstead is essentially people's, and the people owe this great possession to-day largely to the influence of one man, Mr. Thomas J. Barratt, who has just completed and published "The Annals of Hampstead," a work in five volumes, which will probably rank for ages as the highest achievement in local histories English literature possesses. Mr. Barratt loves Hampstead. Though he might not say so in such set terms, every page of his splendid work pro-claims it. His personal interests and large sums of his money have render-

ed valuable aid in preserving the people's right to the locality.

"On his production of "The Annals of Hampstead" Mr. Barratt has brought to bear all the wondrous machinery and science of modern printing and illustration; and, drawing upon his collection of Hampstead pictures, known as the famous Bell-Moor Hampstead Collection he has reproduced in the book about 500 illustrations of local scenes, photographs, etc. These illustrations are of as varied subjects as "The Gibbet Elms, North End, 1819"; "Romney Studio" (now the Hampstead Constitutional Club); "The Bull and Bush To-day"; "Jack Straw's Castle, as it was in 1835," when Charles Dickens used so frequently to entertain his friends at that delightful tavern; the house where Mrs. Siddons, the famous actress, once lived; and the old Hampstead home of the Kit-Kat Club, besides many pieces of local scenery.

LONG DISTANCE PICTURES.

How They Transmit Photographs b

Telegraph In France, In France the transmission of photographs over a telegraph wire is now practical for newspaper work, and pictures sent in this way appear in the the lead, and one station is installed at its Paris office and another at Monte Carlo. The Scientific American has the following account of the process:

Photographs are taken in the after noon at Monte Carlo and quickly developed in the laboratory. Next the direct printing from the negative. The copperplate is covered with narrow parallel lines of insulating substance very thin in the white parts and broad in the blacks, not unlike a half tone. except that lines are used instead of dots to make the picture,

Next they wrap the copper film round a metal cylinder not unlike a phonograph cylinder, against which a small metal point bears. As the cylinder turns the point passes across the lines of the image. In the white places, represented by the bare copper, this point makes a contact that sends an electrical current through the line. In the black spaces formed by the insulated coating the current is cut off.

At the Paris end the operator has wrapped a photographic film round a cylinder contained in a dark box, and the image is transferred to this film by a small spot of light controlled by an electromagnetic shutter that is operated by the electric current that comes from Monte Carlo. The operator removes the film and develops it and after a quick washing and drying makes a half tone from it. The operators at Monte Carlo prepare the plates toward evening and telegraph the pictures during the night for the morning

#### RAKING THE OCEAN.

New Wire Drag That Sweeps the Seas and Locates Obstructions.

Pinnacle rocks, ancient wrecks and other ocean bottom obstructions that have for centuries taken their toll of human life and dollars in ship disasters have been discovered by the United States coast and geological survey at harbor entrances and in much frequented waters of the United States through the use of the new wire drag that sweeps the seas.

This simple invention, simple at least in its operation, has saved and will save uncounted millions of dollars and numberless lives. Already it has been used to sweep the entrances to the Panama canal on the Pacific side in preparation for the opening of this great waterway, and one dangerous rock obstruction heretofore unfound and uncharted has been discovered. This was in the pathway of shipping through a main approach. Had it been found by the costly expedient of running a great ship upon it the world

might have had another horror. Through the old method of sounding with a lead and line it was impossible to find rocks, wreck spars and other similar obstructions, because the lead, even if it struck these bodies standing perpendicularly in the water, would slip from them and find the bottom level, maybe twenty or a hundred feet

With the wire drag even the point of consists of a long wire carried through the water horizontally at any given depth by an arrangement of weights and buoys that keep it taut and evenly stretched.

Under the headline "What Can They Do With Them?" a Vienna paper tells of a number of thefts which were recently perpetrated in churches in that city. From the Church of St. Stanislaus a statue of St. Peter was stolen, of which the account says, "It is made of wood, dark brown in color, many hundred years old and priceless." The thief, who is believed to be a youth who was once employed in a cloister, also visited the Church of the Angels' choir and carried away a wood carving three feet high and of the same length at the base, representing the baptism of Christ by St. John. African Diamonds. The newest diamond field is in the Kasal river district, Belgian Kongo, West Africa. The famous De Beers group of mines at Kimberly, South Africa, have heretofore furnished 95 per cent of the world's diamond supply. Their annual output is about \$44,000,000, and since their discover in 1867 they have produced \$600,000. 000 worth of diamonds. The remaining 5 or 6 per cent of the world's supply has come from India, Brazil, Bor neo and Australia. There are many diamond occurrences in the United States, but none so far of any important commercial consequence. - New York American.

Australia to Save Giant Trees. A popular movement has been set on foot in Australia to preserve the gigantic stringy barks, various species of eucalyptus, of that country, which far exceed in height the famous "big trees' of California and are the tallest trees in the world. These trees sometime attain heights ranging from 400 to 500 feet. Their timber is exceedingly valuable, and for this reason they have been ruthlessly destroyed by lumbermen, while no proper steps have been taken to provide for their reproduction. -New York Sun.
