"The department of justice runs one of the largest stationery concerns in the country," said a clerk of that department to a Star reporter. "We have to do that we supply the various officials of the department throughout the country. Not many years ago our stationery bureau was run solely for the benefit of the immediate department. Judges, clerks of courts, marshals and other officials throughout the country purchased their supplies from stores in their cities and towns and sent us the account to pay. By this method we paid the retail price for everything. Under our present system we buy in bulk and we send out at a price that is a great deal lower than the retail price. As we buy everything at cost prices we save to the government thousands of dollars each year over the old method of doing business."

"We carry a stock worth at least \$2,000 at all times, and all the judges, marshals, clerks and others send to us for their pencils, writing paper, etc. It's a great deal of business, and we do a lot of it. For instance, there is a certain western judge who won't have a pencil unless it's a red pencil which is paid off when it is sharpened. We carry this pencil in stock for no other person, but we carry it for him. He has a fancy to it. I suppose he loses or misplaces all the other kinds of pencils, but this one he likes because he can sharpen it so easily. It's right here in the District of Columbia in a judge who listens to arguments with his pencil in his hand. He rolls these between his fingers while he is busy, and never has less than a half dozen. He is not particular about the kind of pencil he has. Other officials have peculiar ideas about the kinds of paper, pens and ink they want, and they send us orders for them. As you see, we carry a very varied assortment of goods than a stationery store."—Washington Post.

IRELAND'S VANISHED GREEN. Few Trees Remain of Her Once Scarcely Supply.

There is perhaps no feature of Irish scenery more characteristic and depressing than the almost universal absence of countries south the outlines of hills and valleys. The traveler, gazing on such a landscape, and seeing the bare, treeless hills and valleys, hardly believes that Ireland was at one time covered from shore to shore with almost uninterupted succession of trees and shrubbery. So numerous are its place names derived from the growth of woods, shrubs, groves, oaks, etc., that, as Dr. Joyce says, "if a wood were now to spring up in every plain, the name of its kind, the country would be almost unrecognizable."

"This and buried in the deepest bog are to be found the roots, stems and other remains of these ancient woodlands, mostly in the form of peat, some of the bog being literally full of stems, the splinters of which burn like matches."

The destruction of these woods is of comparatively recent date. Cambrensis, who accompanied Henry II into Ireland for a number of years, noticed the enormous quantities of woods everywhere existing. But their extirpation was begun by the gradual use of English machinery in the land, the object in view being mainly to increase the amount of land available to the natives of the country, to provide food and to open the country for military purposes.
