

upon different occasions, upon the subject of the fisheries, but in 1852 they assumed a firmer and more manly attitude than formerly, and their desire to have those fisheries protected, corresponded upon the subject had resulted in having the same more closely watched and eventually in the reciprocity treaty. He thought it was now a reproaching history, and he hoped the result would be the same. He believed that one result of the sitting of the Commission at Washington would be that American fishermen would be more fully indoctrinated with the principles of Free Trade. He did not approve of treating cargoes of fish caught beyond the three mile line as contraband. To do so might well be stigmatized as unfriendly. He believed that a great and proud nation like the United States was not to be coerced, and the course taken last summer was better calculated to estrange the American people than to bring about a mutual agreement.

FRIDAY, MARCH 24. A Bill was brought up from the House of Assembly by Mr. Monaghan, and the Act to procure a steamboat for Georgetown Ferry.

Hon. Col. Secretary, on rising to move for the second reading of a Bill to incorporate the Merchants' Bank, said it was only 15 or 16 years since the first Bank was established on the Island, and if there was sufficient trade and capital to justify the organization of an additional Bank in Charlottetown, it must be a strong evidence of the growth of the Colony.

Hon. Mr. GORDON thought the effect of the Bill would be to throw the monetary affairs of the Colony into the hands of capitalists. Farmers and others complain now that they could not get Treasury Warrants as they could formerly.

Hon. Col. Secretary said the Government could not regulate its finances, so as to make Warrants available to farmers or any other class; but Warrants could be, and often were, obtained through the Banks.

Hon. Mr. HATTHORNE said he rather sympathized with the remarks made by his honor from Cardigan (Mr. Gordon), but he thought the Savings' Bank offered a better means of investing money than Treasury Warrants, as the latter were liable to be called in at any time. As Treasury Warrants are in such demand, he thought the Government might obtain a premium on them.

Hon. Mr. BEZEL supported the Bill, as he thought it would have a good effect, but he did not think a premium could be obtained upon Warrants, as they were liable to be called in so soon after they were issued. He thought, however, that a premium might be obtained on debentures.

Hon. The PRESIDENT approved of the Bill, and thought its provisions might have been enlarged further.

Hon. Mr. DUNN took the same view of the Bill as his honor from Cardigan (Mr. Gordon).

Hon. Mr. BEZEL agreed with the Colonial Secretary, that Treasury Warrants were a very poor investment for them, as they were liable to be called in, and if parties did not watch the Royal Gazette, they might not know when they would cease to bear interest. He, at one time, held £200 in Warrants, and he thought it was very well that they were called in nine months had elapsed.

Hon. Mr. BEZEL could not understand how it was that Warrants were called in a few months. The Colonial Secretary had been told, independent of the debt incurred for the purchase of lands, and he would like to know what portion of that debt was represented by Treasury Warrants.

Hon. Col. Secretary replied, that by referring to the Tabular Statement in the Auditors' Accounts' it would be seen that a comparatively small amount was represented by outstanding Warrants. They had all been called in up to the 30th of October last, and any that were out beyond that time, were not bearing interest. Part of the debt of the colony which was formerly represented by Warrants was now represented by Bank annuity debentures.

That Bank afforded much better means of investing money, because if the interest were not drawn at the end of the year, it would be added to the principal. The Bill reported from the Committee agreed to without amendment, read a third time, and passed.

Hon. Mr. BEZEL thought the Bill would effect men who kept Dr. Storrs in the country, and who sometimes gave advice to their customers. It would apply to men in the country who extracted teeth for 1s. 6d., and for which a doctor would charge a dollar or more, and it would also effect those who applied the cancer plaster.

Hon. COLONIAL SECRETARY said the Bill would not apply to such cases. It was not intended to give a necessity to employ non-professional men, as there were some years ago, because the supply of doctors was greater than the demand. In fact they were almost as numerous as lawyers.

Hon. Mr. GORDON believed a law to prevent quacks from imposing themselves upon the country was required, but thought the Bill too stringent.

After some further discussion, the House resumed and progress was reported.
