

sion. In order to secure a decisive test, dogs were first brought to a constant weight on dried dog biscuit mixed with known quantities of water. Bovril-from 21/2 to 71/2 grammes-was then added to the food, with the result that the weight of the animals went up as much as 50 to 100 grammes, or, in round numbers, 10 to 20 times the weight of the Bovril given.

Afterwards Bovril was discontinued, and the animals fell back to the original weight. Compared with the effect of hard-boiled white of egg, it was found that from 8 to 10 times as much by weight of the latter had to be given to obtain the same increase in weight, or, taking the dried organic solids in the two foods, from 21/2 to 4 times as much egg white had to be given to obtain the Bovril effect.

In several of the experiments there was a retention of reserve nitrogen. and in all an increased utilisation of

It was therefore concluded that Boyril had both a direct and an indirect nutritive value, the latter by causing a more complete digestion and absorption of the other food giren

London, Nov. 22,-The United Irish party has issued a manifesto against the Lords, calling landlordism and the House of Lords synonymous. The manifesto, which is signed by John E. Redmond and T. P. O'Connor, of Lords, as the only obstacle to Home Rule. It describes Lord Lansdowne as an "Anglo-Irish landlord whose family name is written deen in that coffin ship, the Lansdowne Hospital ward, and in thousands of unmarked graves where perished ou; people driven from the Lansdowne property in the days of the famine." "At the door of the House of Lords," continues the manifesto, "lies mainly the guilt for all those laws for an in-

crease in landlord power and for the rejection of all measures for tenant relief whereof the great famine and great exodus were the plain and direct consequence, and to every Irishman of this generation appeal the voices of a million of our people who died of hunger and five millions driven to exile to dethrone the iniquitboundless suffering. True to its inalone to-day stands athwart the path of Irish victory. Its fall is the rise of Ireland. If this election is won the battle for Home Rule is won."

The manifesto quotes numerous de clarations of Premier Asquith and Chancellor Lloyd-George, committing the Liberal party to the policy of Home Rule. Referring to the "dollar bogey" it says: "No American dollar for the cause of Irish freedom. millions of American dollars for the sacred rack rent, such is the cry of the Tory party."

Train Runs Amuk.

Melbourne, Nov. 22 .- A terrifying railway accident happened at Kilmore Junction. A heavy goods train was approaching the Junction when it got out of control through the brakes becoming defective. The engine driver realizing the plight started the whistle and for two miles the train swept along shricking alarn. The signalman at the station heard the warning and grasping the situation found himself faced with a dreadful alternative. A second train was on the main line near the station and the signalman had either to allow the impending collision or turn the runaway train up a bank 30 feet high at the end of the switch. The man took the latter alternative. The goods train dashed up the bank, turned over, felback to the track, the engine and trucks being smashed, and the dri scalded to death. The fact that the fireman had escaped can only be de scribed as miraculous. The momen before the catastrophe he was stand ing on the footplate awaiting the outcome of the plight in which his train had become involved and the next instant he was walking on top of a bank 30 feet above the track, his staff tightly clutched in his hand and quitunhurt. How he got there he failed to realize for the moment.


Medical Hangmen.

Namely, that in ancient times when doctors were not held in the high esteem that they merit to-day, their occupation (like that of butchers and executioners) was held to be too bloodthirsty to permit of them serving impartially as jurors.

Although it now sounds curious to hear of medical men classed with hangmen, still, in early days their work was much mixed up. Not only were executioners granted a license by King Frederick II. of Denmark in 1579 (which is still in existence) "to set bones and treat wounds byt the public executioner was supposed to be able to perform surgical operations as well. Apropos of this, there still exists, treasured in Mr. Pierpont Morgan's famous library, a book upon the treatment of various diseases by Andreas Liebknecht, a public executioner at Copenhagen, who during the close of the seventeenth century enjoyed European fame as a physician

I suppose, Mr. Editor, there is no other place in the Island of Newoundland that such a traffic is carried on, and such an absurd ferry system exists as that which is existing at the present time on Placentia

Parliament Dissolved.

LONDON, Nov. 28. The second Parliament in the reign of the late King Edward VII. which met on Feb. 15th last, was dissolved to-day in pursuance of the programme of the Liberal Government to go before the country on the question of the prerogatives of the House of Lords. The King's Speech was notable for its brevity, the only reference to the constitutional crisis being a colourless expression of regret that the conference between the leaders of the opposing controlling parties had failed to agree on the reformation of the Upper Chamber. The longest and most interesting paragraph, which immediately followed an allusion to the death of His Majesty's father. dealt with the recent arbitration of the Newfoundland Fisheries Dispute with the United States: "I confidently hope that the questions connected with the North Atlantic fisheries be tween Canada and Newfoundland on one hand, and United States of America on the other, which had been the subject of controversy for nearly a century, have been at last finally settled by the award of the Hague Tribunal. It is a cause of special satisfaction that it has been found possible to solve by arbitration probems of such intricate and difficult a nature, and that the award has been received by both sides in a spirit which must tend to increase good

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 28. Joseph Wendling was called before Judge Gregory in court to-day to answer to the charge of murdering Syear old Alma Kellner in St. John's Catholic Church, Dec. 10th, 1909 Wendling, who was janitor at church, where the Kellner child had gone to Mass, is charged with having assaulted and murdered the girl and then hidden her body in the church basement.
