

Ladies' Princess Slip.

This design is fitted by bust, underarm and shoulder seams and side back darts. It may be developed with a circular or a straight gathered flounce, and without sleeves or with short or long sleeves. The Pattern is cut in 6 sizes: 32, 34, 36, 38, 40 and 42 inches bust measure. It requires 5-8 yards of 36 inch material with 2-1-8 yards extra for a straight flounce, or 2-3-8 yards extra for the circular flounce for a 36 inch size.

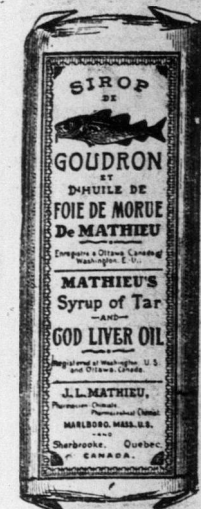

### Amundsen at the Pole Dec. 14th.

Two local papers have received despatches from Amundsen, announcing that he reached the South Pole on December 14th, and remained there three days, probably for the purpose of taking accurate observation. The honours, therefore, must be given to the Norwegian until Capt. Scott is heard from. Amundsen says he made no reference to the Scott expedition reaching the South Pole.

### Widespread Rejoicings.

Rejoicings over Amundsen's success are widespread. The feeling of the people was voiced in the Storting by the President amid cheers.

### Excitement in England.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
LONDON, March 8.  
Interest in Britain over the race to the South Pole somewhat resembles the excitement in America over the Cook and Peary claims. Amundsen's claim is not disputed here, but Britons hope that Scott may also have reached the goal, and discuss the possibility that he may have been there first, unknown to Amundsen. When Amundsen's expedition was first launched, unexpectedly, with the object of competing with Scott, some criticized his action as unsportsmanlike. He will, nevertheless, be warmly received in Britain. Disappointment is keen, however, after hopes being raised yesterday of Scott's victory. These were based on a despatch from Wellington, New Zealand. Amundsen's announcement that he has reached the South Pole has increased the interest with which an authentic report from Captain Scott is awaited. Speaking at the Mansion House yesterday, Sir Ernest Shackleton, who is in close touch with news from the Antarctic, said that the statement that the Norwegian expedition had reached the Pole was a literary fact, but "we do not know whether Scott has accomplished the feat or not."

### 200 Criminals Driving Autos.

New York Police Say It is Conservative Figure for City—Cases Cited.

New York, Feb. 22.—There are probably 200 licensed chauffeurs, every one of whom has a criminal record, operating taxicabs and other types of motor vehicles in the city of New York to-day. This is the substance of a statement made at police headquarters by one of the highest ranking officers in the department, who said that 200 was a very conservative estimate.

In an investigation of the murder of Adolph Stern, the clerk who was shot by thieves who had robbed the Jacobi jewelry store at Thirteenth street and Sixth avenue, the police found no less than twenty licensed chauffeurs who had been in state's prison.  
That the taxicab, as a means of "get-away," has made the detection of crimes such as hold-ups of the East River National Bank messengers in which the thieves got away with \$25,000 in cash, and the Stern murder case, more difficult than ever before, is the opinion of every man in the police department as well as the heads of the various private detective agencies.

The last report of William J. Burns to the American Bankers' Association, referring to the automobile as a means of escape, says that it has rendered the detection of crime so difficult as to furnish a subject worthy of the most careful consideration.  
Within the last three weeks, the police of New York have been called upon to run down the men responsible for three of the most daring hold-ups in the history of the city. The first was the case in which several highwaymen held up Beckerman, the paymaster and after robbing him of nearly \$1,000 in cash escaped in an automobile of the touring car type. The second was the East River National Bank case, in which the booty was \$25,000, and the third, the holding up of George W. Horth, the John street jeweller, who was beaten and then robbed of diamonds worth \$10,000, after which the highwaymen, according to Mr. Horth jumped into a taxicab and sped away.




