





There has been a remarkable growth of civic pride in the U.S. and Canada in recent years. Dozens, nay hundreds, of cities have found themselves in exactly the same plight as we are and it is most interesting and useful to learn how they have grappled with

The system of government, which has been evolved, is known as Government by Commission. To us the term is apt to be misleading, as we generally apply it to a body of persons appointed by the Governor in Council for some definite purpose, but Municipal Government by Commission will be found to be the purest and most direct type of democratic gov-

The fundamental principle of Commission Government is to secure the services of efficient men to administer the affairs of the city, and to give der to submit to the Legislature on them full and complete authority, reserving to the electors certain checks

are entirely elective. The work done by the Galvesto Commission was so remarkable that the fame of it spread to other cities, which while spared a cataclysm such as forced a reform upon Galvestor were suffering from the more general and greater evil of mismanagemen and boss rule.



The Marconi **Shares Matter** in Parliament

THE EVENING TELEGRAM SE TORAN NEEDEN AIMAND JUNE 18 1818-11

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, June 18. For the first time for many years British Cabinet Ministers were compelled to-day to defend their personal nonesty before Parliament. Attorney General Isaacs and Chancellor Lloyd George excused their dealings in American shares on the floors of the House, and the final scene in Marconi affairs their political enemies had atempted to magnify into a scandal rivalling the Panama debate, was tense and dramatic. The galleries were filled with Peers and diplomats all seats and standing room on the floors were occupied. The two Minsters admitted they had acted thoughtlessly and mistakenly, although without dishonest intentions and regretted their failure to divulge all facts when they had made their lenials to the House last October, of buying English Marconi shares. Having finished their defense, in deference to the tradition that the House should be left to discuss their conduct without the embarassment and their presence, they walked from the Chamber together. A great cheer from their followers followed, mem bers standing on benches waving handkerchiefs and papers. The resolution, introduced by George Cave Unionist, in behalf of the Opposition which brought about the debate, went no further in its course, than to express the regrets of the House at the ransaction of the ministers and the lack of frankness displayed by them towards the House. By expressing their regret and thereby agreeing with the resolution, the two ministers spiked the guns of their bitterest opponents who regarded the case as an opportunity to make political capital. This course made practically a tame ending to the fierce controversy and was apparently a result of an agreement between party leaders to protect the good name of parliament. Liberals were threatening to resurrect all the buried shortcoming Beachs' sale of Salisbuy Plain to the government formanoeuvering grounds. the Chamberlain family interests in African war and directorships held by other ministers in firms making contracts with governments, from almost forgotten graves. Two more different types than the ministers before the bar, could not be imagined. Life In An Ice Tunnel

British Explorers' Year On A Glacier.

The first account has reached this ountry of the experiences of Mr. Frank Wild and seven companions, all under thirty, who, forming the second base of Dr. Mawson's Antarctic Australian expedition, lived on a glacier for a year, and discovered a great tract of land, with 350 miles of coastline. This land, which probably extends to the Pole itseif, has been named Queen Mary's Land.

Speaking to Reuter's representative, Mr. Wild said: "We prepared for a winter in our glacier home. We dug a tunnel with caves to hold our stores, and this was entered by means a trap-door on the top raised! bove the snow. We had regular outine meals at stated hours, work in morning, and afternoon off, and we amused ourselves with hockey, football and ski-ing in fine weather, and chess, draughts, and cards when unable to venture out. Every Sunday conducted Divine Service in the morning, and we did nothing except essential camp work.

7,000 Emperor Birds.

"In August we again made preparations for sledging, one party of three going eastward and another to the west. The latter surveyed all the coast line to the point reached by the German expedition of 1902. On one trip it did 510 miles at an altitude of from 2,000 to 3,000 feet. This party discovered the largest emperor penguin rookery ever recorded. This was on an island sixty-five miles west of our glacier hut, and here were congregated some 7,000 young emperor birds in addition to innumerable ordinary penguins.

"Falling down crevasses was more or less common and we all got grazed and bruised, while once Mr. A. D. Watson was down a crevasse for 20 minutes before we hauled him out. Our worst experience was in October, when the western party was laid up for seventeen days in a blizzard, the longest on record. I had never before experienced one of more than nine days . It is difficult to imagine what it meant for three men to be imprisoned in a tent six feet across which got gradually smaller with the piled-up snow outside. There was no room to lie straight and nothing to read. Sixteen hours out of the 24, we spent in sleep. At the end of the blizzard we were as weak as kittens, but it is extraordinary how soon one picks up. I have known of cases where a man will gain five or six pounds in weight after one meal."-Daily Mail.

Motor Polo Fiasco

Excitement That Survived Only Five

The roar of open exhausts and the scream of gears instead of the thud of noofs and the creak of saddles resounded over the third polo ground at Ranelagh on Saturday when Mr. R. C. Klegin's team played the first game of motor-polo scen in Europe. A very large crowd had gathered to witness what everyone expected to be the most thrilling thing known since Ranelagh was founded. The excite-

ment survived about five minutes of the game. It was amusing for about ten minutes more, and at the end of a quarter of an hour numbers of the spectators strolled away to the tea

The "teams" consisted of one car each-practically stripped chassis. with a seat for the driver and a long step for the player. A strong hoop over the head of the driver protected him in the event of an upset. This actually occurred only once, when, after a terrific skid round in the attempt to get back to the ball, a car overturned close to the boundary. Flames burst from the engine as the petrol began to spread, but the fire was very quickly put out and the car was soon in action again.

Uncanny Driving.

Though the actual game quickly proved to be quite uninteresting, the driving of the cars will not easily be forgotten as a spectacle of marvellous coolness and almost uncanny skill. At the beginning the ball was placed in the centre of the ground and the two cars rushed at it from their respective ends. Just as the spectafors were holding their breath in exectation of a collision they skimmed past each other "with just daylight etween them," as one enthusiast exessed it.

When, as very often happened, neither man hit the ball, the crowd saw superb exhibitions of lightning turns and reversing. One was forciby reminded of Mr. Kipling's story of the poly pony "The Maltese Cat," who "wheeled like a cockchafer on a pin." These skeleton machines, pouring smoke and making a noise like Gatling guns, spun round in their own length, darted away, wheeled again, and reversed in a wonderful manner. But the game seems scarcely likely to hold the attention of an English crowd, though it might possibly be more successful at the Crystal Palace than at Ranelagh .- Daily Mail.

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
