Paris, June 1.-Lord Charles Beresord returned to Paris to-day after a week's motor car tour on the eastern French front, in splendid health and spirits. His journey extended to recovered Alsace. He said:

"Great courtesy was shown to me by all the generals. I was allowed along full of good spirits, very like men of my nation, the Irish, in that something. I said, 'Now I've seen our Alpine chasseurs, all I can sav is, Pauvres Boches!-Poor Boches.' It was a short speech, but it 'went well,

"I saw many other regiments and places I must not name. I heard Gertheir guns. There is no doubt that this is an artillery war. Where we have one thousand we ought to have five thousand guns. There is no doubt as to the final result, but we

"At one place the Germans sent a Caube to bombard my house. It missed and killed a poor woman a few doors away. The same night, after I left, they made a second attempt. The airman swooned down and dronned two bombs just outside the door. The explosion covered the face of the nouse with mud and drove in the windows, the glass filling the bed I had slept in. The French authorities were of opinion that the attempt was the deliberate result of information

I stayed twice with him and also motored with him to many places in England. I knew him when he was quite boy. I never thought he would turn out such a bad fellow."

In the course of his tour Lord Charles Beresford was introduced to Sister Julie, a heroine of the war, who ursed the wounded while her village was being burned, saved her patients from having their throats cut, defied the German colonel, and stopped further burning.

Lord Charles Beresford has high praise for the work of the British Ambulance Committee. "I found our 250 men working, under strict French discipline, under dangerous conditions. I saw wounded brought in from the firing line and heard their grateful remarks. I was delighted with all I saw, but must refrain from detailed description, having regard to the military situation."

The flour market has come down at last and war prices are no longer asked at the mills. When this low price will strike Newfoundland is another question, for although prices rise here in sympathy with prices at the mills yet it does not always follow that prices decline here in sym pathy with a falling market. However, there has been a good profit made on flour during the last four or five months and the dealers can well afford to lose a dollar or two per barrel now. "To whom much has been given, much will be required."

Wheaten bread came into use in very early times, and the process of its making and baking has advanced with the years, culminating in the good home made product that most of us in Newfoundland at least, enjoy. The greatest compliment thatyou can pay the machine made bread is to remark on the resemblance of it to the home made article. Up to a few years ago bakers' bread seldom tempted householders, owing to its puffed up character, but with new bread factories, baking bread as much like home-made as possible, a considerable number of people have taken to buying bakers' bread. And so it has become one of the causes of the high cost of living. 

He enlisted with the 7th Battalion of
the Canadian Expeditionary Force
and while engaged on the firing line
on the Western Front when practically the entire Battalion was cut up only 40 men being left alive, amongst whom was Nathan Rice. Those 40 surrendered and were taken prisoners on April 24th and were taken by the Germans to Berlin. Nathan man-aged somehow to send a letter to England to the Rev. C. V. Cogan who was a particular friend of his, as he was closely associated with the Rev Mr. Cogan when he was Rector of St. Mary's Church, South Side. The Rev. gentleman, we are informed, communicated the circumstances of Mr Rice to a relative in this city. The young man was favorably known here. Prior to his departure he was for many years a non-commissioned officer in the Church Lads' Brigade, and held a responsible position in the office of the Gas Company. He always took a keen interest in shooting, was a splendid marksman and was a member of the St. John's Rifle Club. He has a brother. Albert, also doing service for the Homeland and Empire.
