od de la company Shows Increase.

Production Hindered by Large Number of Enlistments.

The Canadian Mining Institute Buletin for December, 1915, says: The demand for coal continues to show improvement due chiefly to the greater activity of the steel industry and the stimulation that munitions manufacture has given to industry in

Eastern Canada. The production of the Dominion Coal Company for the ten months ending 31st October was 3,782,000 tons compared with 3,708,-000 tons in the corresponding period of 1914, showing an increase of about 74,000 tons for 1915 to date. For November the production of the Glace Bay Mines will probably exceed the outputs of last November by at least 100,000 tons. For the whole year. from present indications, it seems probable the production will exceel that of 1914 by over 200,000 tons. As the outputs were below last year until the end of September it will be seen the recovery has been quite recent and very rapid. For the next six months outputs will compare against a period of very low production in the corresponding months of a year ago. The St. Lawrence shipments from Cape Breton for the summer will reach about 1,500,000 tons, or some 400,900 tons below the shipments of last year. The reduction has been entirely occasioned by shortage of freighting tonnage due to the requisitioning of steamers by the Admiralty. In this respect the prospects of obtaining steamers for the coming winter business and for next summer's shipments is one that is giving the coal operators some anxiety. Nevertheless after sixteen months it is possible to record that the Germans have been unable to interfere with the shipment of coal from Nova Scotia to other Canadian and American ports. This, by the way, is a more remarkable statement than it would seem to be at first thought. We have grown so accustomed to the daily miracle of British control of the seas, to the unseen

protection of the Navy, that we are apt to forget its existence. The extent to which recruiting has gone in the mining districts has seriously affected the labor supply. The production of the Dominion Coal Co., for example has been lessened by 4,000 tons per day, or from 80,000 to 100,-000 tons a month, by enlistments The Militia Department are now, very wisely taking steps to transfer to special miners' or tunnelling battalions the qualified miners who have enlisted in other regimental units and have not yet left for the front. The voluntary system of recruiting has curious effects. Two brothers were ecently killed at the front, both miners from Glace Bay. One left nine children and his wife, and the other seven children and a wife. The gallantry of the men who have given their lives for the Empire under these conditions can hardly be questioned, but the efficiency of a system that allows such a thing to happen

may well be questioned. The production of the Springhill Colleries for the ten months ending October was 326,500 tons, against 343,482 tons in 1914. a decrease of about 17,000 tons. Lack of demand in the early months of the year, and labor shortage during the past three or four months, are chiefly responsible for the decrease in production.


