



London, July 31.- (Canadian Press) -A campaign against diaphanous dress among women church-goers is being conducted by high church dignataries in England, and it is understood that the question of "sketchy" women's attire may be taken up shortly by a big church association.





Peace was not likely while Polish aspirations were based upon the boundaries of 1772, which embraced not a nation but an empire; aspirations which brought the veterans of Denekine and have given convincing proofs of loyal Yudenitch to those of Trotsky as in a common cause. But beyond the boundaries set forth for Poland by the terms of peace, Russian defence would become aggression. It was nobody's secret that Delegate Krassin's errand in England concerned political quite as much as trade negotiations. Much as Russia needs trade, she needs peace even more after five years of warfare and a slaughter unmatched in history. The prospect of active intervention in Poland's behalf in a plain issue of aid against invasion, is sugarcoated with an opportunity for peace. From the United States Lenine already has the proffer of trade without political undertakings. By much playing of the Bolshevik game the Entente has learned some wisdom. In aiding attacks upon the Bolshevists the Supreme Council merely called Russian patriots of all parties to their defence. It is quite a different matter to raise the standard of peace on the Polish frontier and say, "This is the place to stop." Probably the Russian people also have had enough war for the present .- New York World.

Made Millions by the Get-Rich-Quick Route

BOSTON, July 29 .- The accounts of Charles Ponzi, the dealer in international postal coupons, who has obtained several millions of dollars from the New England public on his promise to pay fifty per cent. profit, will be audited by both the county and federal authorities. United States Attorney Gallagher announced yesterady that he would place an auditor on Ponzi's books with a view not only to learning whether his business was solvent, but also to determine whether his juggling of international stamps involved any violation of federal laws. The rush of people to withdraw their monney from Ponzi's hands, begun after he had concurred in a suggestion by District Attorney Pelletier that he takes no more money in, continued to-day.

"Pi Alley," where he established temporary quarters to accomodate the crowds, was the scene of a day long line of people who wound from the former taproom, where the quarters were located, into City Hall Avenue. Ponzi ordered sandwiches and coffee served those who forsook luncheon to get their money back, or to collect on notes matured with the 50 per cent. interest paid by Ponzi.

All those who applied for their money and who conformed with the simple conidtions laid down by Ponzi, were paid. He said he had paid out several hundred thousands dollars yesterday and thought the run would cross the million dollar mark to-day He has estimated his total liabilitie at \$3,000,000 and says he has \$13,-000,000 in this country and abroad to meet them. Notice to Taxpayers.

Section 7-(1) Income War Tax Act:-

Every person liable to taxation under this "Act shall, on or before the thirty-first day of "March in each year, without any notice or "demand, deliver to the Minister a return on "Oath, in such form as the Minister may pre-"scribe, of his total Income during the last "preceding calendar year. The Oath shall be in the Form V prescribed in the schedule "to this Act.

Section 8—(1):
"If the Minister, in order to enable him to "make an assessment, desires further infor-"mation, or if he suspects that any person "who has not made a return is liable to tax-"ation hereunder, he may, by registered let-"ter, require additional information, or a re-"turn containing such information as he "deems necessary to be furnished him within

NOTE.—Persons to whom forms have been sent under this Section are bound to return them filled in in accordance with their Income for the period named, even though no tax has to be paid.

Section 9-(1): "For every default in complying with the "provisions for the next two preceding sec"tions, the taxpayer and also the person or "persons required to make a return, shall each "be liable on summary conviction to a pen-"alty not exceeding one hundred dollars for "each day during which the default con"tinues."

NOTE.—Taxpayers and those suspected as being liable to taxation under the Income War Tax Act, and who have not yet made returns as required by the Act, are now given Thirty days from the Second day of August instant, to complete and send in returns for the accounting periods of 1917, 1918 and 1919. Persons who are in default with their returns after the expiration of the above number of days will be prosecuted in accordance with the Act.
