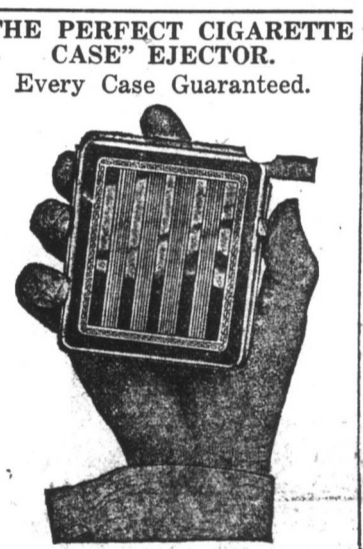

"I am at your service, mademoiselle."

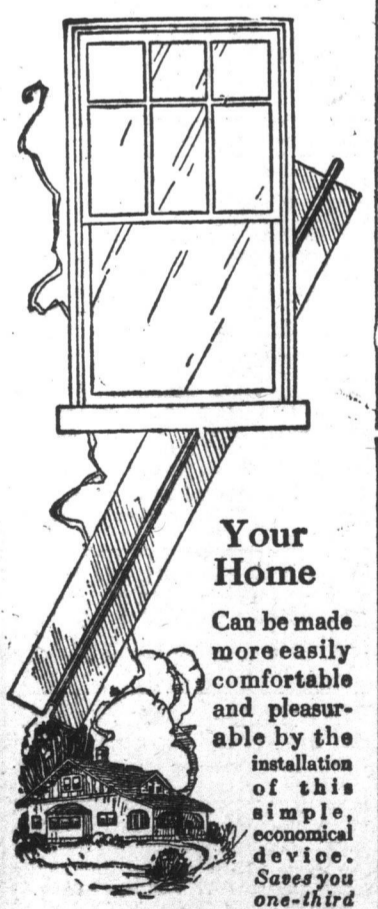
Ada hungrily devoured her features. She was young—as young as Miss Craythorne—and decidedly handsome, though thin and pale.

Forty-Three Years in the Public Service—The Evening Telegram

Europe's Riddle Difficult of Solution

Allied Statesmen Making Attempt—Harding's Suggestion May be Rejected—Marconi Company Removing Clifden Terminals.

LONDON'S MOMENTOUS MEETING.

LONDON, Aug. 7. Allied statesmen, who are meeting here in an endeavor to solve the European riddle to-day, devoted five days to analysis of the conditions existing between Great Britain, France and Belgium. The Committee composed of the finance Ministers of these countries, appointed to examine into specific proposals which have been made public. The appointment of a Committee followed a proposal by David Lloyd George the British Premier to grant a moratorium to the Marconi Company which would terminate the end of the present year, and to receive the outline by M. Poincaré of the measures which France considers should be taken to alleviate the financial obligations. "France has no objection to a moratorium in principle," said M. Poincaré. French, British, Belgian and Italian spokesmen during the session, painted gloomy pictures of the war-ravaged countries and the consequent chaotic trade conditions.

THE U.S. STRIKES.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7. As a "final call" from the movement for the immediate settlement of the rail strike, President Harding today communicated to the railroad executives and heads of the striking shop crafts union, proposals that the management take them back, and that the adjustment of the crucial seniority be left to the decision of the Railroad Labor Board. Though the President is said to consider this the only practical course the Government would take, union spokesmen indicated its rejection.

SOFT COAL SETTLEMENT.

CLEVELAND, Aug. 7. A definite program for the ending of the soft coal strike on a national basis, it is learned here to-day, will be proposed here on Wednesday.

Produce and Provisions.

(From Saturday's Trade Review.)

Codfish.—The exports this week amounted to 18,830 quintals as follows: 692 quintals from St. John's by Silvia to West Indies via New York. Also from St. John's 2,340 quintals by Annie L. Warren from A.S. Rendell and Co. to Trinidad. From the Outports the following cargoes were sent out: 4,100 quintals by General Plummer from S. Harris and Sons, Grand Bank, to Oporto, 2,340 quintals by schooner Nelson T. Walters, from T. Garland, Guisno to Oporto; 2,918 quintals by schooner Patton from W. Horwood, Rose Blanche to Lisbon; 2,200 quintals by schooner Elme May from J. Pettit, English Hr., to Oporto 724 quintals by schooner Ena Moulton from the Burgeo and LaPoile Export Co., Burgeo, to Halifax. The Oporto stocks this week are 5,488 qtls, and the consumption 5,823.

Cod Oil.—The local market is showing more activity and enquiries are being made about new oil. The price per ton is \$11.9 and this is not only likely to hold out but to improve upward as the season advances.

Lobsters.—The outport catch is coming in slowly, as packers are counting on even higher prices. It is unwise to hold on to long, and when those who have good No. 1 pack can get \$30.00 per case as they can now in St. John's from some exporters, it is well to think, advisable to sell.

Flour.—S.S. Sable I. brought in 1,380 barrels from North Sydney this week. The Canadian crop exports continue good and bespeak fair priced flour the coming fall. The quotations here to-day continue at \$9.70 for leading brands and \$9.30 to \$9.50 for lower grades.

Molasses.—The schr. Dazle brought in 168 puncheons and 65 barrels from Barbados to Campbell and McKay, Monroe and Company, and G. Knowlton. The market is stronger and Fancy which is now 30 cents is expected to advance next month. Choice is 70 to 75 cents per gallon and will follow Fancy. The schr. Gaspe also arrived this week from Barbados with 536 puncheons, 285 tierces and 430 barrels to Messrs. Bowring, Winter and Munn.

Oats.—The market is unchanged and featureless. White oats are \$3.90 for large lots at the cost of \$4.00 for small quantities, per sack. The importers are holding off waiting for the bottom price in the Canadian market which it is expected will be reached the latter part of this month. The crop is good and a further reduction of 5 to 10 cents a bushel is counted on by experts.

Potatoes.—All kinds very scarce. The first new grown here were selling in gallon quantities this week at 40 cents. There will be no quarter barrel or half barrel sales until about the 20th inst. P.E.I. and Nova Scotian potatoes are scarce and dear also and the small consignments that have arrived this week were offered at \$4.80 to \$5.20 per 100 lb. sack, and \$2.60 per half sack, 90 pounds.

Sugar.—The sugar market is showing a stronger tone. The Government reports press a short world's crop and there is a run for raw sugar by the Refiners. The wholesale price American white granulated here is still \$11.25 per 100 lbs., but these figures are not expected to hold long. By S.S. Sable I. this week 700 barrels came in to Colin Campbell.

Pork.—The market quotations are about the same as given last week. S.S. Sable I. brought in 450 barrels this week. Fat Back is still advancing and is now \$29.25 per barrel whole sale in the local market. Ham Butt is \$30.00, and Family Mess (grocers) is \$29.00.

Beef.—The imports this week were 450 barrels by the Rosalind. The market is still very favorable to the buyer and prices have reached the lowest point in ten years. Bos Flank is \$23.00; Family Mess \$21.50, and Boneless \$17.50.

Hay.—The local crop will be the best for many years. Most farmers mowed this week and are very pleased with their cut. The price has now eased off to \$45.00, delivered in St. John's. This will influence the price of imported and the next consignment will, we are informed, be \$2.00 per ton lower than the July price. There will likely be a decline in September as the Canadian crop is excellent too.

Fishing Vessel Cuts Down Motor Boat.

TWENTY-FIVE MINUTES IN WATER.

Two fishermen of Cape Broyle, named Michael Kelly and Francis Leamy, had a narrow escape from drowning recently when returning from the fishing grounds in their motor boat. Just outside the harbor a Canadian banker beating in port under parted canvas cut down the motor boat and threw its occupants into the sea. Leamy managed to climb on to the bowsprit of the schooner, but Kelly struck the vessel several times, but though clad in oil skins and heavy boots he managed to keep himself afloat. He was in the water twenty-five minutes before being rescued in a dory by his companion and one of the crew of the banker. But for the fact that Kelly was a strong swimmer and kept his presence of mind, he certainly would have met a watery grave.

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Odd Fishes.

The angler, or fishing-frog with its mouth almost as wide as its body is long, is one of the very queerest of fishes. On its back it has a number of threadlike appendages which others think are the small organisms which form their own food.

Before they have discovered their mistake they have fallen a prey to the frog, which does not miss much, with such a capacious mouth. Its appetite, too, is enormous; for in the stomach of one as many as 75 herrings were found!

The sea-horse of Australia lives amongst seaweeds, being camouflaged by a floating fringe resembling the weeds, which enables it to lure its prey close enough to be captured.

Another instance of camouflage for the sake of obtaining food is that of a prawn and a small fish which live inside the mouth of a gigantic anemone. They are both white, with red lines, and these colors act as a snare to numerous small creatures which the anemone kills, and all three have a share in the spoils.

There is a curious family of fish to which the climbing perch of India belongs. They are constantly in and out of the water, and often travel overland. In the rainy season they pass from stream to stream, and from pool to pool. When the hot weather comes they bury themselves in mud, from which they emit a gurgling sound. If put in an aquarium they will escape if they are not covered in.

The callichthy, found in the rivers of tropical America and the West Indies cannot live for more than a quarter of an hour under water, and has to rise to the surface to breathe. It has been known to live for five days entirely out of water.

The periplophimus, common on the shores of Indian and Australian seas, frequents roots of mangrove trees. When at rest it lies with its body ashore in search of food.

The bleeny quite commonly leaves the water, apparently liking plenty of air. In South African waters swims a fish something like a toad, and rejoicing in the name of billy-blow-up. This is derived from its practice of puffing itself out when caught.

Another of its peculiarities is that of being poisonous. Pilchards—to come back to our own fish—have a wonderful sense of smell, and can detect a favorite food, consisting of the spores of olive seaweed, fully 20 or 30 miles away, especially after spawning, when they are thin and ravenous.

It is a curious fact that, if food is abundant, the fish appears in shoals; but when it is not particularly plentiful, they do not arrive in such great numbers, as if some instinct told them just how far the supplies would go round.

Do the Armstrong people in England mean what they say when they claim a sanctioning of the deal by the electorate, before any capital will be forthcoming and also that no obligations are to be theirs in connection with the Railway, although Mr. Squires would like, as report goes, to have it so.

A split in the Executive government is also reported, and now the deal is at a standstill.

When the public get what is most needed and that is a reduction in taxation, then will the people be ready to listen to speakers and only those who aim at bettering conditions generally. We are tired of hearing about what may be done or will be done, or ought to be done, and unless some actual demonstration is forthcoming and a move made to build up the proposed structures of education, etc., no faith will be placed in those who lecture to public, whether they are true to convictions and working for advancement or whether they are paid spokesmen for a falling political power.

Many promises there have been and the Hunter deal has been talked of long before some of us were born. If men of principle and virtue, step into the arena showing their qualities as laborers for the common good, no doubt but that all would be glad to sit and listen attentively to what the speakers deliver to us.

BOONE in the Advocate calls for comment, and to read about people who claim they would die for the F.P.U. and others who say they would rather sever one arm, than their connection with the Union, seems to give one the opinion that the writer, who severed his connection with the ministry, might tell of more who would die for the true religion.

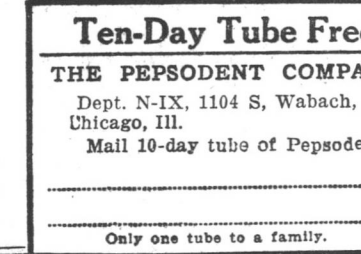

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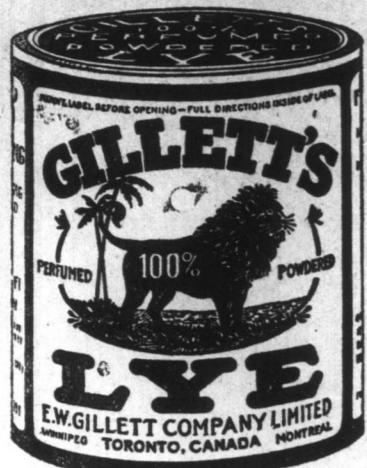

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Dried Fish.

The chief topic of conversation in the fish trade of late has been the weather, says the current issue of the Maritime Merchant. Such bad conditions for fish drying as have obtained this season have not been known on the Nova Scotia coast for several years. As a result all importers have orders still unfilled, and no doubt some of the consumption lost in certain markets will never be regained. So far as prices are concerned, it is hard to say what they are locally, because with no deliveries possible there has been no buying worth while. The sun is shining as we write, so it may be that more activity in deliveries will be manifested within a few days.

The news from foreign markets at present is not very promising for high prices. Porto Rico reports sales that would net local shippers about \$6.25 per quintal; this for fish that cost nearly \$8. But of course Porto Rico is a dumping market and a sort of a law unto herself. Other West India markets with the exception of Cuba are listless, and will probably continue so until after the turn of the summer weather, when stock is more safe to handle. Europe is not a free buyer of dried fish at the moment, but some markets, notably Italy, give signs that they will be interested later if our prices are right. Italy's ideas of values to-day we may say are considerably below those ruling in this market.

It is as yet a bit too early in the season to attempt an estimate of the world's catch of codfish for the year, but it seems likely to be a large one. The French catch this year it is suspected will reach a total of 700,000 quintals of green fish, which we should think must be very close to pre-war figures. Nova Scotia and Newfoundland too will have large catches. Labrador is yet to be heard from, but it seems reasonable to believe that along with her southern neighbors she will also do very well. That the world for the year will get back to pre-war production seems unlikely, but on the other hand, the consumption for the coming season seems likely to be lower than it was in years gone by. The depreciated currency of many fish-eating countries will be a factor of some importance in this connection. Take Brazil, where the miltre in 1913 was worth 20c, and is now only worth 13c, or Italy where the depreciation has been still greater. Of course it is true that wages in these countries are higher than they used to be, but earnings are not sufficiently so to maintain the old purchasing capacity of the people. In view of the facts mentioned therefore it seems not at all unlikely that prices of dried fish are likely to be somewhat lower within the next two months than they are to-day.

The Holy Saints John.

In the Middle Ages, the chief festivals of the Operative or Stone Masons, were those of St. John the Baptist, June 24th, and the Four Crowned Martyrs, November 8th. The latter was discarded by the Speculative Masons and changed to St. John the Evangelist's festival, December 27th. Both these dates have a definite Christian significance, so Grand Lodge, being non-sectarian, after its first meeting on December 27th, 1813, provided that its festival should be held "the Wednesday next following St. George's Day." St. George being the Patron Saint of England.

In Ireland the festivals are still held on June 24th and December 27th. In Scotland the annual festival is held on St. Andrew's Day, November 30th.

In connection with these two Patron Saints of Masonry, it is interesting to note that another St. John who has been connected with Freemasonry is St. John the Almoner, for Beoot, in his Manuel du Franc Maçon, says—

"The true Patron of the Lodges is St. John the Almoner, the son of a King of Syria, who at the time of the Crusades quitted his country and the hope of a throne, to go to Jerusalem that he might generously aid and assist the Pilgrims and Knights. He founded a hospital and organized a fraternity to attend upon sick and wounded Christians, and to bestow pecuniary aid upon the Pilgrims who visited the Holy Sepulchre. St. John whose virtues rendered him worthy to become the Patron of a Society whose sole object was benevolence, risked his life a thousand times in doing good. Neither war, or pestilence, nor the fury of the infidels, could deter him. Death struck him down in the midst of his labors; but the example of his virtues remained with his brethren, who considered it their boundless duty to imitate them. Rome canonized him under the name of St. John the Almoner, or St. John of Jerusalem, and the Masons, whose Temple, overthrown by the barbarians, he caused to be rebuilt, selected him with one accord as their Patron."

There are at present, five events on the program—Hill Climb, Slow Speed Race, Efficiency Test, Speed Test, and One Hundred Yards Dash—car vs. pony. Fourteen handsome prizes have been put up for the above events and are now on exhibition in the window of J.J. Strang's Tailor Shop, Water St. The Committee have decided that the above events will not be open to professional drivers, motor car agents, garage proprietors, and employees and others of the motor trade, but a Grand Extra Trade Event is to be added to the programme for these gentlemen. This will consist of a fifteen minutes' demonstration and will be open to any motor car agent or garage proprietor or professional driver, who will be permitted to use his own car, or, if preferred, a borrowed one. The Skipper From Fortune Bay.

A fishing skipper named Thornhill from Fortune Bay, Nfld., has summer set a pace for the fishermen of Lunenburg which will take some beating. Captain Thornhill is the master of the schooner "Marion Belle Wolfe," which by the way is owned at La Have, and up to the time of writing, this little vessel has taken no less than 5500 quintals of fish and is not through yet. Captain Thornhill we understand expects to report with a record exceeding 6000 quintals for the season. How, you ask, has he managed to get so many fish? Well, one explanation is that he works more dories than other vessels of his own size. He does this by carrying a slightly bigger crew. Other Lunenburg vessels carry an average crew of from 18 to 22, and fish from 7 to 8 dories. But the Fortune Bay skipper takes crew enough to fish 10 or 11 dories. His success suggests the query as to whether, with vessels and outfitting so much dearer than they used to be, the time has not now arrived when all vessels should carry a larger number of dories and men. We suspect there may be another side to this question, but to the average layman it would appear that more dories would be a practical method of offsetting increased capital charges. Of course catching fish isn't entirely a case of either the number of dories or the number of men employed—it's the kind of a fisherman you are. But the more dories a vessel has in the hands of good men the better the chances are. Captain Thornhill not only had the dories, but he also had the boys who made good use of them. That was a combination to set one's watch by surely.—Maritime Merchant.

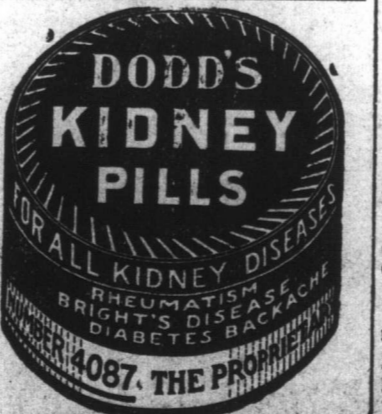

Wounds Cured By Electricity.

A method of destroying, by electricity, the microbes which infect wounds, has been worked out and applied at the Royal Sussex County Hospital, Brighton. Dr. P. C. Collingwood Fenwick, surgical officer at the hospital, who devoted several years research to making quite sure that the electric current actually plays a part in killing the germs, holds the opinion that the electrical treatment will play an important part in combating disease in the future. No other country, he points out, has claimed to have destroyed bacteria by electricity.

The new method of bringing about a speedy cure of apparently hopeless cases was described in a recent issue of the "British Medical Journal" by Dr. Fenwick. In one case a man had a very bad septic forearm, which did not improve under the usual treatment. The arm was placed in a porcelain bath, filled with a solution of salt, and then electricity was passed through it. "The following day it improved, and in ten days, with daily baths, it was almost healed." Deep gunshot wounds, the despair of the surgeon were treated with equal success. Electric baths are being used with excellent results in the cutaneous department of the hospital.


