

#### Light on Early Man

Eminent anthropologists state that 15,000 years has made little or no changes in the human skull or human form. They base their argument on a careful examination of fossilized bones dating back to the Pleistocene period, which were recently found in Egypt. The bones were found by a representative of the British School of Archaeology in Egypt, at a point in the desert thirty miles south of Assiout, on the east bank of the Nile, near a village called Qau. They were discovered in a pit close to a cave which had probably been occupied by an ancient craftsman, who used both fresh and fossilized bones for ornamentation, for carved bones and ivory were found which belonged to the 19th dynasty, about 1200 B.C. Stone of the skull bones found were very small, but were those of adults, and indicated that a smaller race of people had inhabited the area, most probably during the Pluvial period, when human life was possible in such a district. All the evidence went to prove that the skull of the Pleistocene man did not bear the ape-like characteristics which are usually attributed to it, and that the mental development was day. It was agreed that there was proof that fossil bones had been used for carving and ornamentation during the 19th dynasty.

He advised a second operation, and it was then discovered that the surgical scissors had been sewn in the wound during the first operation. They were removed, and Mrs. Smith partly regained her health. Her heart was ermanently affected by the presence of the scissors, she declares.



#### Our Montreal Letter.

(From Our Own Correspondent.)
THE CITY NEEDS MORE STREET

The streets in many parts of the city are poorly lighted, and the demands for more lights are numerous The city spends at present \$425,000 a year for lighting. The city has incondescent lamps of 40 and 80 candle power to the number of 1,530, making a total of 5,805 lamps of all kinds for the 750 miles of Montreal streets. In 1922 the City installed 265 arc lamps, and since the beginning of 1928, 149 arc lamps were added. The demands for more lighting will cost \$75,000.

CHILDREN SHOULD BEGIN SCHOOL AT FIVE YEARS.

At a meeting of the Woman's Club held recently at the Mount Royal Hotel, the President, Mrs. John Scott. said that children should begin to go to school at five years and that the first year should be taught French exclusively. Quite a number of those present favored the movement and Rev. James Fee, Chairman of the Protestant School Board, promised to recommend the suggestions at the next meeting of the School Board. A few years ago the bilingual system was introduced in the Catholic Schools, from the preparatory class to the highest grade. After a long trial the system was abandoned as being detrimental to the mother congue, and ordered to be abolished in all junior classes up to the second year. The half day system of French and English in three or four grades of the junior departments left the scholars completely at sea, or as the old saying says: "Between two stools they came to the ground." 



#### "THE GREAT COLOSSEUM OF ROME"

is the largest Amphitheatre known. It stands in Rome on the site of Nero's Palace. It was begun by Vespasian in '72 A.D., and finished by Domitian in '82 A.D., but a fourth storey was added by Severus Alexander, 235 A.D. and Gordianus 238 A.D. It was capable of seating 50,000 spectators and afforded room for 20,000 to stand. Externally, the building has four stories, the three lower with arcades; the first is of Etrusean architecture, the second Ionic, the third and fourth Corinthian. It's height is 157 feet. The seats were of marble; the exterior of the building and the chief corridors of travertine stone; the inner walls of tufa and concrete with which all corridors, stair-cases and substructures were vaulted. Underneath the arena were dens for wild animals and appliances for raising them into the arena. The Colosseum was chiefly destroyed in the 15th century, when it was used simply as a quarry for marble and other building material, until Pope Benedict XIV. (1740-58) intervened and saved it from complete destruction
