

The Lieut.-Governor's Speech.

We have carefully and studiously read over the address delivered by His Excellency, the Lieutenant-Governor, on the opening of the Parliament yesterday, and do not hesitate to pronounce it a document infinitely superior to the generality of addresses hitherto delivered on similar occasions.

Reference is also made to the fact that we have now the administration of our local affairs in our own hands, and consequently, our revenue has enabled us to accumulate a surplus of over four million of dollars.

The debts owing to the Municipal Loan Fund, no doubt, will require serious consideration in order that one portion of the Province may not suffer at the expense of the other.

We are glad to find that His Excellency's attention has been directed to the benefits arising from the drainage of swamp and wet lands in different parts of the Province, and trust that our legislators will give the subject that attention which its importance demands.

The encouragement of immigration demands more than a passing notice. We have enough of unoccupied lands in the Province to give one hundred acres, as a free grant, to the thousands of actual settlers who might be induced to cast their lot with us; and whatever our legislators think to the contrary, we imagine that the most efficient means for the encouragement of immigration would be to adopt the land policy of our American neighbors.

We quite agree with the tone of the address in reference to the educational institutions and the employment of a sufficient number of trained teachers to give increased efficiency to our institutions of learning.

The establishment of an infirmity asylum is a subject well worthy of consideration, and one which will have the hearty approval of every right thinking person.

We are pleased to learn that the joint commission which has been appointed for the survey of the boundary line between Ontario and Quebec has already commenced operations, and the report of their labors will be looked forward to with interest.

The address concludes with a prayer that the Almighty Ruler of the universe may so guide and direct the deliberations of our legislators that the prosperity and happiness of the country may be benefited, a prayer to which we heartily say amen.

Napoleon's Death.

At twenty five minutes past twelve o'clock to-day, the ex-Emperor of the French departed this life, aged 61 years. For some time past his health had been declining, and his death was no doubt accelerated by the second surgical operation which he underwent, although his medical adviser considered him in no immediate danger.

His early life was a scene of constant peril, and occasional privation, until he was permitted to enjoy repose in St. Helena. Twice he escaped the gallows; he was banished, imprisoned, and became a friendless wanderer; he was released; then a member of the Assembly; President of the French Republic, and, finally, Emperor of the French; eventually we find him surrendering with his army to the German forces at Sedan, a prisoner of war at Wilhelmshöhe, a deposed Emperor, banished from France, and for the third time an exile in England, where he died.

The Chairman then proposed the toast of "The Provincial Government of Ontario." Hon. The Chairman proposed the health of the Reform members of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario. Mr. McKellar responded. He expressed his belief that there was every likelihood of the Ottawa Government, in spite of the fifteen millions at its command, being turned out of office before many weeks had elapsed.

London, Jan. 9.—Napoleon died at 12:25, noon, to-day. London, Jan. 8.—While Sir Charles Dilke was delivering an address on the subject of "Land and People," in Derby, last evening, a mob attacked the meeting and attempted to disperse it.

New Orleans, Jan. 9.—The Times contains a narrative of Laville, first officer of the wrecked ship, Golden Hind, who has just arrived from Rio Janeiro. The vessel was wrecked off the west coast of Patagonia, in June last, and fourteen of the crew spent eighteen days in two small boats in the straits of Magellan.

Chicago, Jan. 8.—A heavy storm of snow, accompanied by a gale of wind, has prevailed here since 3 p.m. The thermometer is two degrees below zero. The storm is accompanied by an extraordinary electrical storm.

New Orleans, Jan. 9.—Andrew McDonald died here on Tuesday, aged 104 years. He was a native of Ireland and for twenty-one years a resident of this city.

St. Paul, Jan. 9.—In the Governor's message to the Legislature, he says the total number of miles of railway in that State is 1,906, of which 350 miles were laid in 1872.
