Any even number section of Domin ion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, exception 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, ed at \$10 per acre for soft coal and or male over 18 years of age, to the \$20 for anthracite. Not more than extent of one-quarter section of 160 320 acres can be acquired by one inacres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry or rate of ten cents per ton of 2.000 inspection must be made in person by pounds shall be collected on the gross the applicant at the office of the local output. Agent or Sub-agent.

An application for entry or inspec-tion made personally at any Sub-granted upon payment in advance of \$5 per annum for an individual, and from \$50 to \$100 per annum for a comagent's office may be wired to the pany according to capital. A free miner, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500x1,500 feet. local Agent, by the Sub-agent, the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held un-til the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-

Homestead Regulations. Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected there-with under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by

such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land own-ed by him in the vicinity of his home-Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
