MORTGAGED FORTUNE OF MANY MILLIONS

A Young German Millionaire Can't Spend it Fast Enough

Berlin, Jan. 2.—The Tageblatt today announced that the second son of August Thyssen, the great steel and coal producer, and one of the richest men in Germany, had mortgaged his share in his father's estate to a firm of Dutch bankers for \$2,500,000 to \$3,000,000. The son's legal interest in the property under the father's contract, with the boy's mother in 1885, was established some time ago through Herr Thyssen's efforts to place his son under guardians, so as to prevent him from wasting his proportion.

Golfer in Hard Luck Found Dead

New York, Jan. 2.—The body of Robert Dunlop, the Scotch professional golfer, was found in Vancouver, B.C., beside a bridge today. Dunlop had been missing for several weeks. He was about 37 years old, and came to America from Scotland last July. He played in several championship matches. He was instructor of the New York Golf Club and he disappeared. It is believed he fell into the lake, while walking across the park at night. His body was removed to the morgue.

Numerous inquiries regarding him had been received by golfers recently, two messages concerning him having been cabled from Scotland. It is late he had not prospered financially.

Art Show in Paris

Paris, Jan. 2.—The Parisian art show opened today under auspicious circumstances. The attendance was very large and fashionable, all the well known artists in the city and art patrons being present. The exhibits are all nineteenth century work presented to the nation by Moreau. The collection comprises early and late works of the 1830 school, with examples of subsequent art movements, including the impressionists.

### NO INSURANCE UPON NEGROES

Life Insurance Companies Adopt New Policy

New York, Jan. 2.—The increased death rate among negroes, is the reason given by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company for refusing to accept more applications for policies from them. The company now carries more than one million dollars worth of risks on negro policy holders. The new order went into force yesterday, but the agents assert that the reason assigned by the company is not the sole one. The agents say that the negroes, most of whom have industrial policies with premiums of from 15 to 35 cents a week, frequently permit their policies to lapse, but renew them after a short time. Upon renewals the agents have made a percentage that the company would have secured if the policies had not lapsed. After yesterday all policies held by negroes that are allowed to lapse will be cancelled, notwithstanding that there is a state law prohibiting insurance companies from discriminating against negroes.

FLORIDA HAD GREAT ORANGE CROP

The Season for Fruit is not at its Height

Jacksonville, Fla., Jan. 2.—Upwards of 60 per cent of the Florida citrus fruit has been shipped for the season and 80 per cent of the orange crop had been forwarded to northern markets. The shipments of fruit have been very heavy since the season opened. Pineapples are now being shipped to New York in large quantities via the Clyde line, and celery which is now repeating will be forwarded in large quantities by the end of this month.

Sealskins are Falling in Price

London, Jan. 2.—At Lamson's sale today sealskins fetched \$22, while upwards of seven thousand sold for \$18. All the skins were imported from Japan. The Hudson Bay company is still holding its stock in reserve.

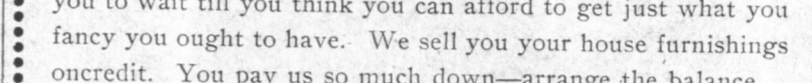
